Wichita Falls Gets Insane Asylum

Austin, Nov. 28.—The board to Northwest Texas Insane Asylum consisting of Governor Hobby, W. A. Johnson, president pro tem of the Senate, and Attorney General B. F. Looney, to day, after hearing the claims of the four cities seeking the location unanimously selected Wichita Falls on the first ballot. The other applicants were Fort Worth Mineral Wells and Sweetwater.

The board indicated that its intention is to have the contract let as soon as possible and to have work of construction begun early next spring, the asylum to be completed and ready for occupancy by January 1, 1919. The Thirty Fifth Legislature appropriated \$400,000 for the establishment of this institution.

Paying for Liberty Bonds

On November 15, which was the date on which the first installments on Liberty Loan Bonds was due, approximately \$2,400,000,000 was paid in, although less than a third of that amount was due.

In other words, nearly two-third of the aggregate subscriptions to the Second Liberty Loan have been paid in full, the purchasers not availing themselves of the right to wait until December 15 and January 15 to make their other payments.

We rec'd the news last week that there would be no furloughs issued for Xmas, except in case of serious sickness or death. Most of the boys report that their folks were never in better health so we have about come to the conclusion that if there is any visiting done that you will be the one to do it.

I have not seen all the boys this week as they are all quarantined, either against the measles or mumps, but from all reports they are getting along O. K. There just three boys from Brownie in my company, Skinny

Williams, Jack Wright and myself. I guess we are making pretty good soldiers as Uncle Sam has raised our wages to \$36 per.

The Government issued us our winter underwear, a good overcoat and a heavy duck suit last week. We are beginning to think that they are going to move us some where pretty soon. We are expecting to get our O. D. before this week is gone.

We had a nice Thanksgiving dinner and we are now whetting appetite for that Xmas dinner. Nearly every boy got a cake from home so we had enough cake to last nearly a week, and believe me it was certainly appreciated to. The Lieut. made us a nice talk and said he wished we could have that kind of a dinner every day, but I am afraid he is mistaken for there would not be much drilling.

To give you some idea how we are fattening I will tell your our weights, I tip the scales at 175, M.E. Williams 189, and Lawrence Green at 200 lbs.

As we have just returned from the Y.M.C.A. and is near bedtime, I will bring this to a close, so girls, if you want to spread joy in Camp Travis, just drop us boys a line once in a while.

Some Facts About War Insurance

Any man or woman in the active military or naval service of the United States can obtain Government insurance. It has been ruled that members of the Officers' Training Camps are under the act and can obtain insurance. The cost for each thousand dollars of insurance is from from sixty-five cents a month to one dollar and twenty cents a month to those of the age of fifty one.

The beneficiaries are limited to wife, husband, child, grandchild, brother, or sister, step-brother or stepsister, adopted brother or adopted sister of the insured, as well as the parent, grand parent, or stepparent of the insured of his or her consort.

The insurance is not compulsory, but the cost is low and the protection great, and not only are all persons eligible afforded every opportunity to obtain this insurance without trouble or extra expense but they are specially urged to do so.

Gen. Pershing and thousands of other officers and tens of thousands of soldiers have already taken out insurance. Up to date policies of insurance have been issued aggregating \$1,032,938,000.

The Case Against Rats and Mice.

Rats and mice are among the worst animal pest in the world according to biologists of the United States Department of Agriculture.

From their home among filth they visit dwellings and store-rooms to pollute and destroy human food.

The rat carries bubonic plague and many other diseases fatal to man and has no doubt been responsible for more untimely deaths among human beings than all wars of history.

In the United States rats and mice destroy each year in homes in factories, stores, and warehouses, in cars and on ships, crops, poultry, and other property valued at more than \$200,000,000—an amount equivalent to the gross earnings of an army of 200,000 men.

Grain eaten and wasted by rats and mice on many farms would pay all the farmers' taxes.

Rats and mice breed from 6 to 10 times a year, producing their destructive kind at an alarming rate.

They are parasites without a single redeeming characteristic.

SOME MARKS OF BRIGHTNESS

Intelligent Boy and Girl Declared to Be Conscientious, Moderately Robust, Athletic and Popular.

In summing up his conclusions on the relationship of intelligence to the size and shape of the head, Karl Pearson is quoted in the Journal of Heredity as making these statements about the intelligence of children:

"To sum up, then: While no characters in schoolchildren so far dealt with show very high correlation with intelligence, we may yet say that the intelligent boy is markedly conscientious, is moderately robust, athletic and popular; he tends rather to quick than to sullen temper. He is more self-conscious and quieter than the dull boy; he has a slightly bigger head, and possibly lighter pigmentation than those of more mediocre intelligence. His hair has a larger percentage of curliness.

"The intelligent girl is also markedly conscientious, moderately robust, athletic, and popular. She, too, tends to quick and rather sullen temper. She is less self-conscious than the dull girl, and noisier than the girl of mediocre intelligence. It is the slow girl who is quiet and shy. The intelligent girl has a slightly bigger head than the dull girl, and her hair is more likely to be wavy and much less likely to be curly.







Thrift Thought

Spread the meat flavor over other foods, and so economize on the quantity of meat consumed, says the United States Department of Agriculture. Here is one way to spread the flavor.

Meat stew with dumplings.—Make a stew from a cheap cut of meat cut into small pieces, potatoes and such other vegetables as are desired. Thicken with a little flour diluted with cold water. Serve with dumplings made as follows:

Mix and sift one cup of flour, two tea-spoonfuls of baking powder, and one-fourth tea-spoonful of salt. Work in with the fingers one tea-spoonful of butter; add gradually one-third of a cup of milk, or a little more if needed. Roll out one half inch thick and cut with a biscuit cutter or in square pieces. The dumplings may be steamed, baked like biscuits, or cooked with the stew. In the latter case remove enough liquid to permit the dough to be placed on the meat and vegetables.

The meat supplies available for European use are short. Meat must be supplied if the war is won—by the forces who fight for freedom. The war will be won if we fail in food production but not won by us. We must understand that what will happen if we do not provide the enormous quantities of foodstuffs that the allies cannot produce for themselves.

Are we going to feed our Army on chicken and eggs? Of course not. But by greatly increasing our production of chickens and eggs, and by eating those chickens and eggs ourselves we will, naturally, eat that much less beef and pork. In turn, that beef and pork can be sent to Europe.

The United States Department of Agriculture calls upon the country to double poultry production next year. That can be done if the farms will keep an average of 100 hens instead of an average of 40 hens, as at present and if every family in town will keep enough hens in the backyard to produce all the eggs used by that family, or two hens to each person.



"By My Grace, Ruler of The United States of America."

Out of the archives of the British Government, comes a secret report of a speech made by the Kaiser at a war council in Potsdam in 1908. The All-Highest said:

"Even now I rule supreme in the United States, where almost one-half of the population is either of German birth or German descent, and where 3,000,000 voters do my bidding at the Presidential elections. No American administration could remain in power against the will of the German voters who, through that admirable organization, the German American National League of the United States of America, control the destinies of the vast republic beyond the sea. If a man was ever worthy of a high decoration at my hands it was Herr Dr. Hexamer, the president of the league, who may justly be termed to be, by my

grace, the acting ruler of all the Germans in the United States."

Hexamer was President of the German American Alliance, member of the Executive Committee of the National Associations of Commerce and Labor, the oddly named "dirty work" bureau of the United States Brewers' Association, and Supervisor of the Beer Lobby in Washington.

Hexamer was decorated by the Kaiser with the Order of the Red Eagle.

It will be decades before this country realizes the immeasurable debt it owes to its loyal German-American citizens who refused to follow the brewers and the Kaiser, standing steadfast for America and the flag.—Board of Temperance Clip Sheet.
