Thirty years ago last Monday (14th) is known as "cold Friday."

This blizzard caused great loss of stock as well as of human life. It was just such a storm as we had last Thursday, except that it was mist, instead of dust and snow. "Cold Friday" served to break the great drouth of '86-'87, for there was plenty moisture after that date to make the range and good crops. By the tenth of March in 1888, the stock was getting plenty of weeds and in April there was fine grass.

During the year 1888 the people got plenty of prairie hay, only for the harvesting.—Sterling News Record.

Old timers in Big Springs remember "Cold Friday" in 1888; this cold snap making its appearance during the afternoon. A sheep herder was found frozen to death near Sweetwater. The

dead body was in an upright position, leaning up against a tree.

## Plant A Garden.

By T. O. Walton, Acting Director, Extension service, A and M. College of Texas.

Soldiers to fight well, must be well fed, and it is the duty of those remaining at home to provide food not only for our soldiers, but to help feed the Allies. Staple products must go to the front, consequently it behooves us to produce every ounce of food possible, and consume that which is perishable, and in so far as possible, leave the balance for the army. There is no reason why everyone in small towns and rural communities, and many in larger towns should not raise a garden. Work the garden during your spare hours, as a part of your contribution to the great cause of Democracy. Make the garden an extra production. Many who have been devoting their time to raising of food and feed have been called to the front. We must use all our spare moments to make up for the drain on production which their absence caused. By this means you will not only serve your country, but you may save yourself many a dollar and the garden may prevent your family from suffering for the necessities. Think it over and utilize every effort toward the production of every article of food possible for the coming year.

Raise a few chickens, a pig, calf, goat, sheep, pigeons, or anything else which will make food or feed. Utilize all spare time in this manner. Do not wait. Do not depend on others. Do your part. Talk to your County Agent about the matter, and if there is no agent in your county write to the Extension Service of the Agricultural and Mechanical College for further particulars.

The Plant Industry Division of the Extension Service of the Agriculture and Mechanical College is now preparing a leaflet on "Spring Gardens," giving details regarding plants and dates of planting in different sections of Texas, also other valuable information. This leaflet is for free distribution to all requesting a copy of same.

### EXTRACTS FROM GERMAN DIARIES

The 94 page booklet "German War Practices" published by the Committee on Public Information, devotes one section to extracts from German war diaries, among them being the following:

"A shell burst near the eleventh Company, and wounded seven men, three very severely. At 5 o'clock we were ordered by the officer in command of the regiment to shoot all the male inhabitants of Nomeny, because the population was foolishly attempting to stay the advance of the German troops by force of arms. We broke into the houses and seized all who resisted, in order to execute them according to martial law. The houses which had not already been destroyed by the French artillery and our own were set on fire by us, so that nearly the whole town was reduced to ashes. It is a terrible sight when helpless women and children, utterly destitute, are herded together and driven into France." (From the diary of Pvt. Fisher, Eighth Bavarian Regiment of Infantry, Thirty-third Reserve Division.)

## Texas Loses A Character.

In the passing of Bill McDonald, the state of Texas has lost a character that not only gave a breath of the early days, but lived them. He represented the Texas of pioneer days when the bandits roamed the border, and he represented the Texas of the days when the bandit was driven from the border.

While many ranger were engaged in the service, it fell to the lot of Captain McDonald to lead the force that finally broke up the gang and stopped the terror on the border. It required fighting, because they were

meeting fighting men. Captain McDonald and his force came back victorious. When President Wilson made his first campaign for president, the Texas ranger was his bodyguard.

The fact that he was a captain of the Texas rangers, bodyguard of the president of the United States and a United States marshal pales into the insignificance when we remember the man. Those who read of him in the metropolitan papers would have thought him a terror of the Plains. On the contrary, he was a small man who loved home, loved humanity, loved his country, and he was as quick to shed a tear to an urchin on the street as he was to send a bullet into a bandit. In the passing of Bill McDonald, Texas, Texans, and the inhabitants of the great southwest have parted with a friend, and that parting has been with regret.—Beaumont Enterprise.

Yes, yes, Texas editors in general, and East Texas editors particularly, love to tell about the lawless bands Captain Bill broke up in West Texas, but forget to mention the worst lot of night riders and cut throats he broke up was right in the heart of East Texas. We refer to the bunch that hung the Humphries.

## Baptist In Educational Campaign

The Baptists of Texas own and operate more than one dozen schools located in different sections of the State. They conduct a Theological Seminary at Ft. Worth, the second largest Baptist Theological Seminary in the world. They conduct a Medical College which is in Class A, allied with the Baptist Sanitarium at Dallas. They conduct two nurses training schools of the first grade. The other schools are all correlated with Baylor University and are from the academic grade to the college grade.

Two years ago, the Executive Board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas resolved to raise \$1,000,000 to set all of these schools forward, the same to be raised in four separate campaigns, one quarter of a million a year. The first Campaign resulted in \$265,000 cash. The second, resulted in \$282,000 cash. The Baptists in every section of the State are now in a sixty days campaign, beginning January the first, to raise the third quarter of a million dollars. No notes are taken.

There are 5,000 students in all of the Baptists schools of Texas; Theological, Medical, Literary, and such like.

The Executive Board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, selected as a campaign

Committee to Carry this third effort to success: J. B. Gambrell, Corresponding Secretary of the Board; S. P. Brooks, President of Baylor University and L. R. Scarborough, President of the Southwestern Theological Seminary.

The campaign is well underway. All the forces of the Baptist denomination in this State are enlisted. The pastors, the school men, the missionaries, the women workers, the B. Y. P. U. s. and the Sunday Schools are all in. It is the purpose to carry the question of Christian Education into every Baptist church in the State and to appeal to the intelligent devotion of Baptists to help the great cause of Christian Education. The campaign opens auspiciously. The school centers are responding nobly and the committee is hopeful, though not unmindful of the difficulties of the times we are now in.

## Advice To Gardeners.

Clean culture plays a most important part in the fight which must be waged against the insects which menace the success of the home gardener's efforts. Says the entomologists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. "Cleaning off all the rubbish left over from last season's gardening aids materially in reducing the overwintering forms of insect enemies of the vegetable garden, whose activities are only too great in any case.

"Cutworms, which hide in the soil in the daytime and come out at night to feed on the tender growth and cut small plants entirely off, wireworms that damage the tubers of potatoes and other root crops, and a host of other insects, winter under brush and rubbish on the earth a few inches under the ground, where they can find protection during the cool weather of winter, conditions are ideal for their survival, and the warm days of spring will bring them out in countless numbers to feed on the tender foliage of the young garden truck. Neighboring weed patches shelter many forms. In the Gulf region and westward some insects work practically the year round.

"Aphids' or plant lice, are as active during the winter months in the more southern sections and find food on ornamental vines and shrubs and on growing weeds which affords them food and shelter when other plants are not available. Much may be gained by keeping the weeds down in neglected corners.

"Leaves, stems, and other litter should never be allowed to accumulate up to the time of planting, or there will be thousands of insects the following year where there were hundreds last season. Weeds should be cleared up and burned, together with all garden rubbish.

"The soil should be thoroughly worked over during the winter to destroy such insects as may be spending the winter on, or a few inches below, the surface. This is best done at least a month before the seeds are planted.

"If chickens are available for the purpose, they ought to be allowed free access to the newly turned over soil for a time, as the fresh meat in the form of insects which they will find there will prove a very welcome addition to their diet, and its removal will go far towards insuring a fair start to the garden crop."

**HIGH SCHOOL NOTES.**

On last Friday, there was organized a Thrift Saving Club in each of the respective rooms. Each pupil is to make or save 25c per week and get a Thrift Stamp. There are sixteen Thrift Stamps which amount to \$4.00 and when the last one is placed on it, 12c will be added to that and in five years at 4 percent interest compounded the Certificate is worth \$5.00 on Jan. 1, 1923. There were forty-five who pledged themselves to buy a Thrift Stamp on this plan and Friday afternoons all pupils march down together and secure said Stamps. The shoulder loops of a general bear the coat of arms of the United States and two silver stars; lieutenant general, one large and two small silver stars; major general, two silver stars; brigadier general, one silver star; colonel, silver spread eagle; lieutenant colonel, silver leaf; major, gold leaf; captain, two silver bars; first lieutenant, one silver bar; second lieutenant, no loop insignia.

The shoulder loop of a chaplain bears a Latin cross.

### UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

Registration of Alien Enemies; Suggestions and instructions to Registrants.

Persons required to register should understand that in doing so they are giving proof of their peaceful dispositions and of their intention to conform the laws of the United States.

Every registrant should read carefully the form of registration affidavit handed to him and ask the registration officer for explanation on all points not clear to him before attempting to fill out the blanks. Registrant officers are instructed to give all the registrants all the possible aid in the way of explanation and advice.

Each registrant is required to furnish four unmounted photographs of himself, not larger than 3 by 3 inches in size, on thin paper, with light background. All four photographs should be signed by the registrant across the face of the photographs, so as not to obscure the features, if the applicant is able to write.

Three blank forms of registration affidavit must be completely filled out by the registrant or his representative (with the exception of the blanks indicated to be filled out by the registration officer and the description of the registrant and the placing of finger prints on the blank) and must be produced by the registrant personally to the registration officer and be signed and sworn to by the registrant in the presence of and before the registration officer, who will fill in the description of the registrant and supervise the fixing of the finger prints and the attaching of the photographs. If the applicant cannot write he must make his mark in the signature space and affix his left thumb print in the space provided opposite the signature space.

The finger printing is a method of identification and follows the practice observed in the military and the naval service of the United States.

The registrant is hereby informed that he must again present himself before the registration officer who took his oath after 10 days and before 15 days from the last day fixed for registration in his registration district to obtain a registration card, upon which he must sign his name, or make his mark, and place his left thumb print in the presence of the registration officer.
