#### BUILDING OPERATION IN BROWNFIELD

Besides the bank buildings announced two weeks ago, there will be quite a lot of other building operations in Brownfield in the near future, part of which we are allowed to give to the public.

The Brownfield State Bank is not ready to announce definite plans this week, but will likely be ready next week. They have several cars of sand and gravel on the ground.

Dick Brownfield has let the contract for a reinforced steel and concrete building on the northeast corner of the square 50x110 ft. with three openings facing the north, and one west, with plate glass front. Two of these stores are 40x50 and one 30x50. All are rented. A Lubbock man got the building contract, and Cicero Smith Lumber Co. the material contract.

Tom May is contracting to build an ice house 16x24, after the most approved formulas, for icing and cold storage. It will easily accommodate two cars of ice, and have ample room for storing perishable products. Tom will not only cover this territory, but will wholesale to Seagraves and territory.

Cleve Williams, the popular grain man, bought the lot between the postoffice and the Winston land office last week, for \$1400 00, and will erect thereon a building 24x100. We are not at liberty to announce the nature of the business just yet, but he assures us that it will be something that Brownfield will be proud of.

Annie Hamilton has accepted a position with the Merc., Miss Rhoda Barrier taking her place with Barrier Bros. Elmer Mosley goes to the Smith store with the Merc. stock of groceries.

#### SOME DEALS

The biggest deal pulled off lately, was when the Mercantile and the M. A. Smith Dry Goods Co., got together last week, and in their deal, the Mercantile takes all Mr. Smith's dry goods stock thus making the Mercantile an exclusive dry goods house, and Mr. Smith taking the entire stock of Mercantile groceries, making him an exclusive grocer. Both men seem to be well pleased with the deal, and we believe it will operate to their mutual advantage. The invoicing started last week, and the exchange is being made this week.

The Williams & Bowers Grain & Coal Co., closed a deal last week, in which they became possessors of the Brownfield Coal & Grain Co., lock, stock and barrel. Mr. Aikens, manager of the latter informed us that he was not enjoying good health, was his reason for selling out.

With its new possessions, the Williams & Bowers Company is now probably one of, if not the largest outfit of its kind on the south plains.

Frank Martin purchased two lots just south of the Herald office some time ago, and is now moving his boot and shoe making shop to its permanent location, this week.

J. R. Lindley closed a deal with T. M. Flippin this week, and is now the possessor of the home that L. McDaniel built in the east part of town. We are glad to see him become a home owner.

### RED CROSS HAPPENINGS.

A large crowd of people were disappointed last Sunday afternoon, when they gathered at the Church of Christ, and found no lecturer there. However, about the time the crowd left, Geo. W. Briggs and wife of Lubbock, drove up and it was reported around town that he would lecture at the Baptist Church that night, there being service anyway.

Mr. Briggs is a good lecturer, and after the talk, the Brownfield Chapter was enthused to even greater tasks of duty.

About the first thing Monday morning, Messrs Jno. King and W. F. Winston circulated a petition among the business men for donations toward buying a couple of new Singer Sewing machines for the sewing room over the bank, and by noon, one of the machines was delivered, and the other one the way. The Singer agency let them have the machines at cost. So you see, the Brownfield Chapter is ready and prepared for a long and serious war, and hundreds and thousands of garments, bandages, and other supplies will go out from here to the needy in war ridden countries.

The people of Brownfield have quit talking about their "bit" and substituted the word "duty" the word "bit" means "little."

### HIGH SCHOOL NOTES.

Last week was Thrift Week. We made a big drive for Thrift Stamps. There was to be a man to lecture on this subject, but he did not arrive. However, the teachers pushed the movement and got results. Counting the total number of Thrift Stamps in each grade, we found that there were 1000, that had been bought up to the present time, which was Friday March 1. There was one \$100 Liberty Bond bought in school, thirteen \$50 bonds bought by pupils and

teachers, and there were twenty-two owners of War Saving Certificates. Totalling the amount, the School has been very Patriotic in that the teachers and pupils have bought \$1010.

Friday closed the sixth month of school. There were many examinations held in the upper grades, this was averaged on the monthly reports. Good work must follow from now until the close of school on the part of the pupil. The pupils must get to work and a close record will be kept of the work in each department.

The girls are doing the same thing. They are going to do their share. Willingness has been shown by the girls to get in line and win some of the contests that will be held here a little later on.

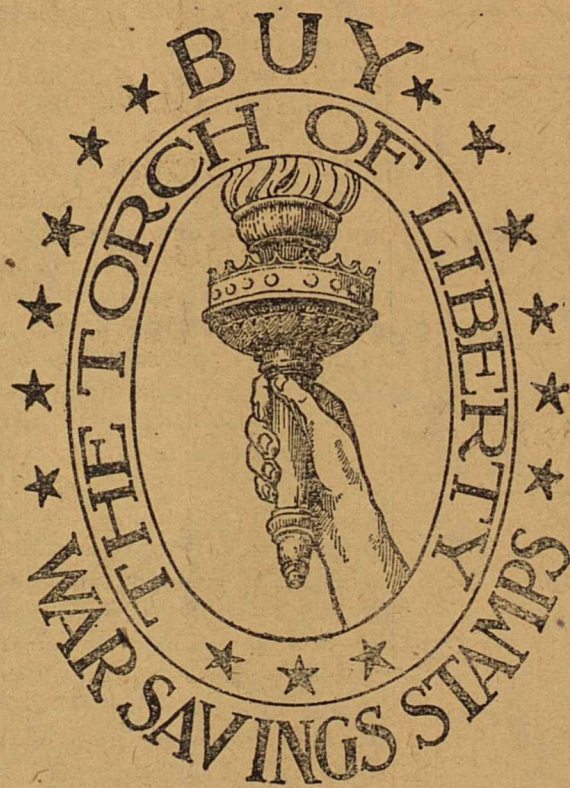

### PLENTY RIFLES AND AMMUNITION.

Rifle and cartridge production in the United States has developed in volume and in quality on a scale assuring the satisfactory equipment of the Army, according to a statement authorized by the Secretary of war.

To achieve the rifle and ammunition production program the Government has expended or has obligated itself to expend during 10 months of war, \$400,000,000, and 200 officers, 80,000 men, and 10,000 women have been engaged exclusively in the manufacture of rifles and cartridges. Two Government plants and three privately owned plants are engaged in making rifles and one Government plant and nine privately owned plants are engaged in cartridge manufacture. Ordnance experts in this country and in Europe are in agreement that the United States Army is being equipped with two of the best three rifles in the world.

"Unlimited resources, unlimited men! What is the Army today?  
"As ex-President Taft aptly puts it: 'It is a cross section of the great American People. The son of an ex-president of the United States and the son of a bootblack, and every grade and walk of life shoulder a rifle in the ranks. Such material for fighting troops the world has never seen.

"And with this great army, what is required to whip it into an invincible fighting force? The only answer is, officers--but not amateurs. The officer can select and make the non-commissioned officer; he can make the platoon, the company, the regiment, the brigade. But only God Almighty can make the officer; and after He has done His part, the man so made must devote his brains, physique, energy, and time to the cultivation of what God has given him.

"You may be an amateur now, but not always. American manhood has dominated the world in finance and in science. It can dominate the world in the science of war. But not without stripping from the body and the mind the habit of complacency and

inertia--the earmarks of amateur--and clothing it with energy and work."

### SPIRIT SHOWN BY AMERICAN PRESS.

The following are extracts from an address delivered by Hon. Josephus Daniels, secretary of navy, before the Baltimore Press Club, Baltimore, Md., in which he praised the spirit displayed by the newspapers of the United States during the past year.

"The press of America has won national gratitude by its splendid spirit of service during the past year. With few exceptions, the newspapers have put service of country above everything else. News has been secondary to service. During the days after relations were severed with Germany it was to the papers that the people looked for a clear presentation of the duty of this country. It rang clear and true, and when the declaration of war was made in solemn assertion of national duty the press was almost a unit in support of the noble utterances of the president. And from that hour whether it was in support of the selective draft, the recruiting campaign, propaganda for the Liberty Loan, food and fuel conservation; the drives for Red Cross and the Y.M.C.A., or leading in community honors paid to youths going to war—whatever the call, the press has responded with a cheerful 'Aye, aye, sir, and has led in the enthusiastic support of every measure for national unity and national victory. The splendid way in which the press as a whole has risen to the occasion and measured up to its responsibilities has given me an added pride in the profession.

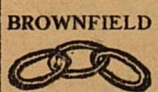
