Austin, Texas. March, 9, 1918. From the many inquiries reaching this office, it seems that there is still great confusion throughout the state about filing reports of income, required under the new Revenue Law passed by Congress.






A report has gone out over the country that Arnett Bynum, who is in the U.S. Navy had

A LAND MARK MOVED

Workmen are moving the old Rippertoe building off the north west corner of the square this week, to make room for a moderd brick for the Brownfield State Bank. This old building was the second to be erected in Brownfield, and the first store building.

J. R. Hill built a three room hotel, and soon afterwards, Mr. Rippertoe built this store build ing, and opened a small stock of groceries. In 1904, the Herald, tl.en the Terry County Voice, was moved from Gomez to Brownfield, and occupied this building from the year the coun. ty was organized to 1913, and old building came to be better known as the old printing office. Spencer&Spencer bad their law office in it until the Judge was appointed District Judge with the formation of the 72nd Judi cial District, after which he moved to Lubbock. Percy Spencer, his nephew kept a law office in it until he moved to Lubbock about four years ago.






