Now there is not much joke to this when one takes into consideration that this rain, which amounted to 2.15 inches came within 3.85 inches Do you get us? of being as much as the entire precipitation, snow and all of 1917. Compared with six inches of rain and melted snow of 1917, we have already this year had eight inches of snow, which the weather experts claim will melt Therefore, adding the .80 inch of the Lord bless you all. melted snow to our 3.09 gives us three and eighty-nine one-hundredths inches of rain this year, or near two thirds of the 1917 precipitation in the first four months of 1918, all of which are generally our dryest season. This record thus far compares well with the first four months of 1914-1915, in which 30.00 inches and 24.85 inches fell respectivly, and is much better than 1916 in which year 18.82 inches fell.

Results: As the more than two inches fell, the optomism of the inhabitance of this glorious county went up-not two inches -but between five and six feet. It fell for a period of about 30 hours and every drop went in where it fell.



When the bread was served to the inmate of the institution Several of them suffered lacerations of their lips. No more serious injuries resulted.
