SCHOOL BOND ELECTION ORDERED

The trustees of the Brownfield Independent School District met Wednesday, and after a long discussion of the matter, it was unanimously decided to submit to the voters of district a bond issue for \$25,000.00 for the building of a modern fire proof school building.

They were in conference pretty well all day with Contractor Scott, who has probably built more school buildings on the Plains than any other man, and is now finishing up the Post City school building.

Mr. Scott also inspected the sand bed in the draw, and was in agreement with Contractor Nowlin, who is erecting the State Bank building that the sand is as good as the Justiceburg or any other sand, but the gravel in it is hardly as good, but will do and save us at least \$500 or \$600. on sand alone in the building.

The building under consideration will be three stories, including the basement, two wide stairways, one in and one outside the building. There will be nine class rooms and an extra large auditorium. The auditorium will be a radical departure from regular buildings, in that it will be on the first instead of the 3rd story. It will be balconied and thus give a seating capacity of close to 1000.

FROM CAMP TRAVIS.

Just now the carpenter shop is completing twenty-five ice boxes to be used at Camp Bullis the target range camp about twenty three miles from San Antonio. Over at the Veterinary Hospital a concrete soaking vat ten by twelve feet and one foot deep was constructed for the hoofs of the draft and saddle animals. The Camp Travis steam laundry, which is the largest laundry in the world, needed one hundred trucks for the carriage of laundry within this great building which houses the plant, and the Utilities branch is to construct them. With as many as two hundred baseball games going on at one time—as it is not uncommonly the case on holiday afternoons—window lights may be expected to suffer and the Utilities people used to come and replace the panes, but one month there were no less than one thousand panes of glass

to be put in, and it looked so like monopolizing the force for this one service that the office now merely issues the glass and the soldiers put them in themselves.

Now I know it is possible for all people to use less flour than the allowance because I am doing it in my own family. You are advised that when the present supply that no more can be procured until the next harvest and unless there is a decided reduction in the amount of flour used in this county I may find it necessary to ask merchants to restrict flour sales except as concerns invalids and children.

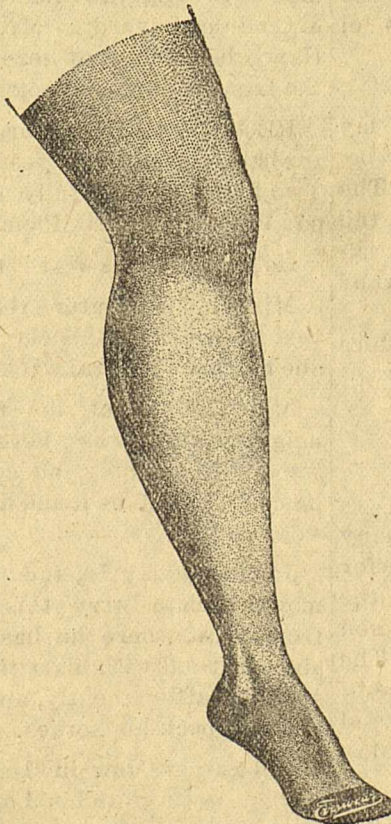

JUNE 5TH DESIGNATED AS REGISTRATION DAY

All men having come 21 years of age since June 5 1917 are required to register for military service on the 5th day of next June. Failure to do so will cause one to be classed as a delinquent and subject to heavy penalty.

SOME LIBERTY LOAN PURCHASES

It is estimated that the Americans of foreign birth or extraction purchased \$350,000,000 of the Third Liberty Loan; the number of such bond buyers is estimated at over 5,000,000.

A consular telegram from Shanghai, China, states that subscriptions to the Third Liberty Loan in in Shanghai amounted to over \$600,000.

The American Embassy in Mexico City states that the subscriptions in that city are more than \$384,000, more than double the quota set for the Americans living there.

The Shah of Persia purchased a \$100,000 Liberty Bond.

THE PINTO BEAN RECOGNIZED

The Pinto bean has been placed on the nation's bill of fare by the the Federal Food Administration New Mexico and Colorado produced this bean in large quantities in 1917, but failed to find a ready market for various reasons. The Food Administration came to the relief of the bean growers by agreeing to buy their beans at eight cents a pound, provided that 75 per cent of the crop was subscribed.

The work of contracting the beans was done by H. M. Bainer of the Santa Fe and O. H. Liberes of the Burlington, who were especially commissioned by the Food Administration. They have succeeded in a very short time to contract the required 75 per cent of the bean crop in the two states. The total will exceed 50,000,000 pounds. The beans are already moving east and the eastern consumer will soon learn that the pinto bean is equal to the Navy bean in food value and that the Pinto cooks more rapidly being more tender in flesh.

The food Administration is also advertising the Pinto bean to create general use. The success of the bean growers to obtain a good price for the 1917 crop through the aid of the Food Administration, will stimulate the production in 1918; and provision has therefore been made to provide seed at a reasonable cost.

The Industrial Department of the Santa Fe plans to make a strong bean campaign in the southwest under the direction of H. M. Bainer and L. L. Johnson industrial and agricultural agents. It is a good crop to grow on land where wheat has been killed. The Pinto bean produces well with a minimum of moisture and in northwest Texas may be planted late in the season.

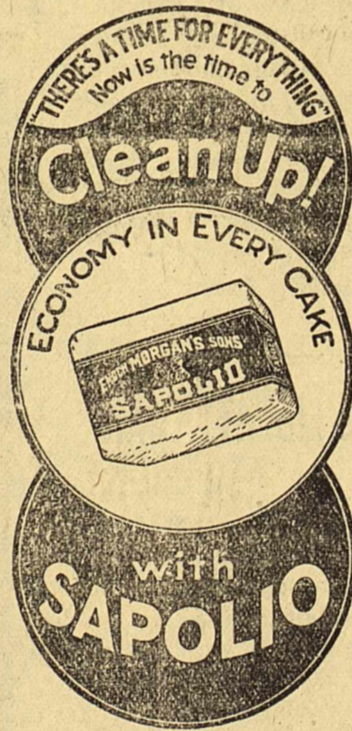
less years and yet in the face of these conditions you have successfully financed a loan for this District much larger than either the First or Second Liberty Loans.

EVERY TEXAN SHOULD JOIN SAVING SOCIETY

FOR EACH COMPANY OF FIGHTERS THERE SHOULD BE A THRIFT ORGANIZATION AT HOME.



That Texas shall not be classed among the lagging states, all forces are now being concentrated upon the organization of war savings societies. Washington has set March 15 as the day for the count and it is desired that every Lone Star dweller be enrolled as an active war savings club member by that date.

"For every company of soldiers on the battle field or in training there should be a war savings society here at home," says Louis Lipsitz, State Director of the National War Savings Committee. "Let's make every fighting man know and feel that he has this country behind him, backing him up to the last ditch. Only by becoming a war savings club member and investing regularly and intelligently in the little Government bonds will we be performing in part our duty as true, patriotic Americans.

"By enrolling ourselves as active members of war savings societies we will be helping the men in the fighting ditches of Flanders, making it possible for them to do their job thoroughly, quickly and with greater safety to themselves. Every household should be a thrift center, every citizen a saver and a society member. It's time to quit talking and get down to business. The job of

the stay-at-home is to increase the efficiency of the fighting machine and aid the Government in winning the war. It's the least they can do.

"That Texans shall not be classed as slackers it is our personal duty to see that we have joined a war savings club and have gotten someone else to enroll. The Ides of March must not find Blue Bonnet State residents classed as non-Americans."

War savings societies may have as few as ten members and as many as desired. There are two officers for each society, a president and a secretary. When it is desired to organize a society the County Chairman of War Savings, or the State Director, Dallas, Texas, should be asked to supply a sufficient number of postcard pledges to enroll the members and a war savings society application. In joining a society the sole requirement is that the applicant shall sign a pledge to be thrifty and save as he can.

The purpose of war savings societies are:

1. To awaken a realization among men, women, and children of America that in their hands lies the key to the successful prosecution of the war; that they can render the most far-reaching patriotic service through refraining from the purchase of unnecessary articles, confining themselves to the use of such things as are necessary for health and efficiency, thus releasing labor and materials for the support of our armies in the field; that there is not enough labor in the United States to produce the great variety of articles needed to support our soldiers and at the same time provide all the comforts and luxuries we enjoyed before the war.

2. To lay the foundation for thrift and economy throughout the United States and to bring home to the people the fact that intelligent and consistent saving is not a dry problem in economics, but is the most vital step toward personal success.

3. To obtain for the Government a large amount of money through the sale of Thrift Stamps and War-Savings Stamps—little Government bonds—the safest and best investment in the world, and at the same time provide a method by which the small investor may put his savings at the immediate service of his country.

RED CROSS TO GIVE FIRST-HAND NEWS OF CASUALTIES OF WAR

Persons in the Southwest who have sons, brothers, husbands, fathers and sweethearts at the front will be especially interested in the announcement that the American Red Cross has organized a Bureau of Communication at Washington to give them details of casualties at the front. The bureau will supplement in a personal and humanitarian way the reports of the Statistical Division of the War Department, which gives to relatives official notice when a soldier is reported killed, wounded or missing.

The bureau will be ably presided over by William R. Castle, Jr., formerly assistant dean of Harvard College and editor of the Harvard Graduates' Magazine. The information which it will base its reports is gathered through a central office in Paris under the direction of E. Gerry Chadwick of New York, aided by the Rev. Robert Davis of Englewood, N. J., and 30 assistants stationed at the base hospitals and rest camps to which soldiers are generally returned following important engagements.

The bureau will advise in detail the nature and extent of the wound, and will gather evidence from comrades in arms and at the hospitals and rest camps regarding those reported "missing."

Relatives will be given any information of interest or consolation through personal letters. It will be possible for the wounded to send messages in the same way.

The bureau is reporting on all cases that come to its attention. It is probable, however, that with the increase of reports from the front information

will be sent only to relatives requesting it, except in cases of those imprisoned or reported "missing."

Through the International Red Cross office at Geneva, Switzerland the list of American prisoners supplied officially by the German government will be sent to the bureau.

ODD THOUGHTS OF CHILDREN

There is a Mental Region Into Which the "Grownups" Have No Right to Enter.

This is a region into which the "grownup" has no right of entry and no key to turn the lock, says London Spectator. Only now and then a flash may disclose the inner recesses and throw a sudden light on an entirely surprising line of thought. A child frequently cherishes a theory of its own, which appears quite reasonable, for the enchanted precincts within, where the supernatural obtains as ready an acceptance as the commonplace. A little thoughtful boy of my acquaintance was asked the usual question, what he was going to be. He answered with great decision: "Oh! a land agent of course, like daddy." And I think "daddy" and the land agency profession scored a compliment.

Time does not exist for children, who worry over no human limitations. A little girl saying her hymn, "There is a green hill far away," was thrilled to hear that her mother knew the lady who wrote it. Then she repeated her psalm, and added gravely: "And did you know David, too?" The train of thought is rather charming which led a little boy, when told not to mention a guest's amputated foot, to say: "No, and when I get to heaven I won't say anything to John the Baptist about his head." Surely politeness could go no further. Often an entirely different mental image is conjured up in the child's mind from that suggested by the grownup story teller. One mother, recounting at great length the details of the illness of a little dog to her small girl, several times mentioned "the dog doctor." She was surprised, at the very end, by the question: "What sort of dog was the dog doctor?"

HOW THE RED CROSS SUPPLY DEPOTS AID THE WAR HOSPITALS

What the American Red Cross hospital supply service means in increasing the effectiveness of many of the war hospitals in France is shown in a message recently received by Dr. Harvey Cushing of Boston, in charge of a base hospital behind the British lines in France. Major Cushing wrote in part:

"I cannot tell you how cheered I was when I found how well organized the Red Cross was in Paris and what a great start you had made.

"When an American officer could actually walk into the warehouse you had taken over and find Squibb's and Mallinckrodt's ether, bathrobes, adhesive plaster, aspirin, surgical instruments, kerosene lamps, canvas aprons, aspirating needles and many other things which our camps happen to need, I for the first time began to realize what the Red Cross might be able to do for waifs like ourselves over here.

"It all goes to show what an enormously important part the Red Cross will undoubtedly come to play as more persons come over and our affairs overseas get more and more complicated.

"Unquestionably countless emergencies will arise and sudden calls such as ours will be made for odd and diverse things; and I hope that we may see huge storehouses established under you where those in need can get the supplies which are absolutely essential to their work—whether it be an automobile or a hypodermic needle.

"Certainly the people at home will subscribe with their accustomed liberality to an organization of this kind and you will do as much toward winning the war as the men who carry the rifles."

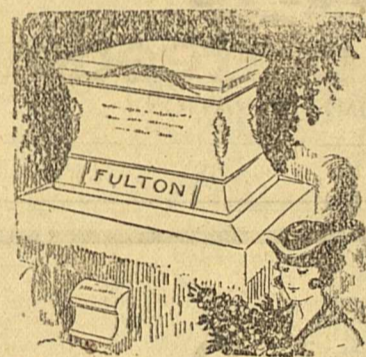
