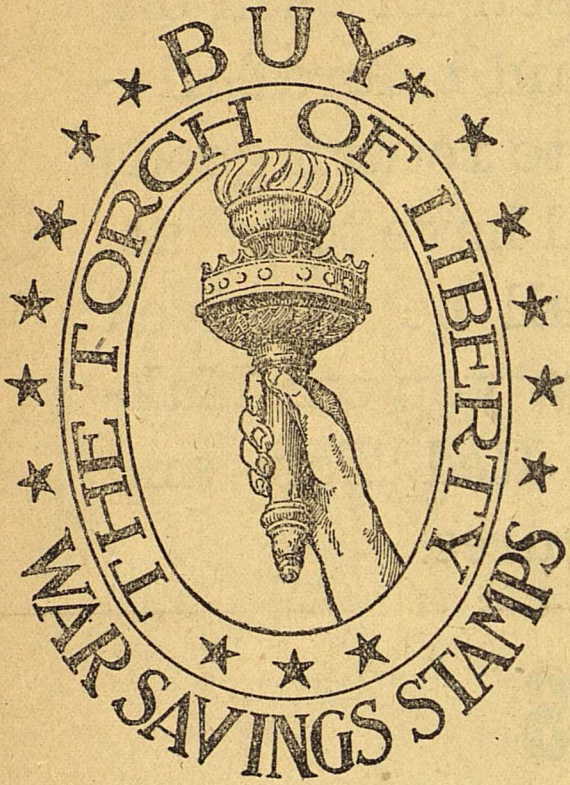

FROM CAMP TRAVIS

The 165th Depot Brigade, Camp Travis, is host to forty five continuous objectors' whose conscience object to any form of labor whatever. They won't put on the uniform, they won't drill, they won't use a broom or shovel or drive a wagon. They eat. Indeed they have been said to be among the hartiest eaters in camp. Although they have been assured of non combatant places in the army of democracy, they decline to show any sign of industry. As a result of their refusal to obey orders these men are now facing court-martial proceedings. There 120 other men now in the Depot Brigade who do not believe in smiting the Hun, they have seen their way clear to work for their keep while they are in Uncle Sam's pay, and are making themselves useful in a variety of ways at the war garden of the Depot Brigade, as wagoners, as cooks, stable guards and the like.

GASS MASKS FOR HORSES

The Gas Defence Service is now manufacturing about 5,000 horse gas masks per day. These are being sent to France, and it is expected that within a short time every horse connected with the American Expeditionary Forces will be equipped with the new masks.

The Gas Defence Service has a completely equipped factory for the manufacture of the masks. In less than three weeks a building was selected and the factory was producing masks. The introduction of reviving machinery has done away with the heavy hand sewing of the frame which supports the masks on the face of the horses. The masks are so constructed that no metal or chemically impregnated parts can chafe the horse.

SCRAVENGER EMPLOYED

The citizens of Brownfield have chipped in to pay a man to make the rounds of all cess pools twice each month, and to keep the town generally clean and disinfected. This is only a starter for the people can give able assistance, and make this one of the cleanest unincorporated towns in Texas, or elsewhere.

If you have not already done so, go to W. S. Daniels and give him your name, and tell him how many cess pools you have, and their location, as he has charge of the financial matter for the present. You can also fix, and so place your cess pool, or pools so that they will be easily accessible to the man that cleans them, and always have some disinfectants handy.

Now if your premises are nasty, for goodness sake prepare to clean them for your own protection if nothing else.

BEGIN BUILDING GIN JULY 1ST

Brownfield had the pleasure of having with them this week two prominent men of West Texas, Messrs. R. R. Gilliland, of Quanah, Texas, Manager of the West Texas Gin Co., and J. B. Overton, the Lubbock district manager of the same company.

In conversation with these gentlemen, they said we could say to the people of Brownfield and trade territory, that they would begin the construction of the most modern gin systems on the plains July 1st, on their property in Brownfield, and would have it ready for the crop this fall.

Mr. Gilliland said it would be a seventy saw, five stand outfit, all on the first floor, and that while they advised the people to pick their cotton, as they would get so much better grade, they would be able to care for the bollies with the very latest machinery.

Also, we might say in connection, that the people in or near where the gin is to be located, need have no fear of being bothered with flying dust and lint, as their gin will be provided with

the lint and dust box, into which all waste will be blown.

The boiler of this big gin is already stored on the grounds of the company.

THE COUNTRY NEWS PAPER

Like everything else these days when so many young men are called to service by Uncle Sam and so many women and girls are called to fill their places along various lines, and difficulties in producing a good country newspaper are multiplied in many vicinities it seems almost impossible to overcome them, yet there was never a greater need for the country paper. The following is an extract from an address of Arthur Brisbane, the editor of The Washington Times, who in a compressive way gives his ideas of the value of the country press:

"Sixty millions of Americans, more than half the nation, live in the smaller towns and villages and read the smaller newspapers.

"And those sixty million of Americans are the backbone of the United States.

"They are the farmers and those with whom the farmers deal directly.

"They are the men and women

that feed the rest of the United States and a great part of the world.

"The sixty million of thinking, influential Americans, living far from the great centers of population, make up the constituency of the smaller newspaper editor they say belong to him, and he belongs to them.

"Because the editor of the country news paper has this powerful, prosperous, constituency, with its great purchasing power, the local newspaper's advertising, in proportion to the cost and circulation, is by far the most valuable in the United States—to the man who has anything WORTH WHILE FOR SALE.

"The man who reads the small newspaper is the man who buys everything—unlike the man who lives in the small flat of a big city depending chiefly on the openor and the moving picture theatre next door."

The country is soaking wet, waving fields of grain and cotton deck the landscape, the cattlemen report the best range in years. Surely the goose hangs high in matchless old Terry.

With a cotton crop well under way, a first class gin assured, we are now getting ready for that wave of prosperity headed our way and due this fall. And our genial station agent assures us that he is going to keep on the trail of the Santa Fe folks till they build a cotton platform.

Ferguson in his Paris speech said he was in favor of letting the "poor soldier boys have his booze. The U. S. Government had already forbidden the saloon man from selling intoxicants to men in uniform, and the ten mile law stopped the bootlegger. Now comes Farmer (?) Jim and wants the ten mile law repealed and the bootlegger turned wild loose with our soldier boys to poison and debauch them. Fathers, mothers, sisters, brothers, you hold the great power of the ballot in your hand; are you going to let such a man as Jim Ferguson receive your franchise? Echo answers NO.

Jim Ferguson say that Texas had no credit and that he stepped in and borrowed money in his own name. The president and cashier of the Union National Bank of Houston deny this from shoulder, and go further by saying they latter refused to make Ferguson a private loan. However, to quote the Dallas News, no one is denying that Ferguson is a goor borrower. It is only too well known that he borrowed the entire capital and surplus of one bank, with a margin of the depositors money thrown in for good measure. Yet Jim had sworn to uphold the law. Ferguson's diplomacy fully equals that of the Boy-Ed variety, in blunders, at least.

There are more things than the delinquencies of his opponent to recommend Hobby for Governor of this great State. In the first place, his morals in his home town are unquestioned. He is a successful financier, having built up a great daily paper in a town where critics said there was no territory, and this is a man's job under the most favorable circumstances. He layed down a splendid position with the Federal Reserve Bank to take the Governors chair when Ferguson was ousted. He put down all personal feelings in the matter—if he had any—to give the people of Texas some real wholesome laws, among them the ten mile law, the Statutory State-wide Prohibition law, the enfranchisement of 600,000 women and

girls, and other good laws too numerous to mention that will help win the war.

On May 31st, 1918, Clarence Martin went to Burnet to speak in behalf of Mr. Ferguson and appeared in the county court room where he formerly presided as District Judge. Before he an opportunity to say much, he was challenged by Hon. Adam Johnson, Jr., of Burnet, who is chairman of the Exemption Board. Mr. Johnson alleged and supported his allegations by original affidavits and statements, that the firm of Martin & McDonald accepted fees from certain persons anxious to keep themselves and relatives out of the United Army under the Draft regulations. In the face of these facts, Mr. Martin left the rostrum in court room where he formerly presided as District Judge, and the meeting was at once turned into a rally for Governor Hobby.

The Slatonite editor has had a premonition as to what is going to happen to Jim Ferguson this fall. At the press association convention in Amarillo some charitably inclined friends thot to promote us to the presidency of the association and at nominating time presented our name. Some politicians of the fraternity who had their pencils sharpened for the Slatonite man, immediately framed up to see how quick they could take him to a cleaning. They picked on a lady candidate and the way they rolled the steam roller over us was a caution to behold. They rolled us out as flat as a German wafer. This woman vote has a sinister foreboding the transgressor, and we have a hunch that Jim Ferguson will wonder what has happened to him next July when the women get thru voting.—Slaton Slatonite.

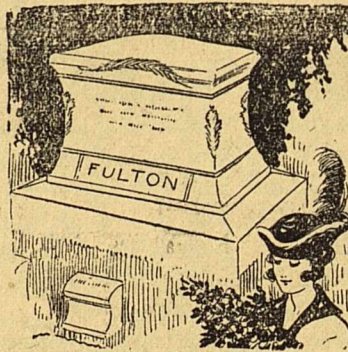

PROCLAMATION

State of Texas, County of Terry:

Know all men by these presents: Whereas, the President of the United States of America has designed June 28, 1918, to be National War Saving Day, and has authoritatively summoned every adult male and female to attend meetings to be held that day in their respective school districts and pledge the United States Government the greatest amount they can save and invest in War Saving Stamps: Therefore,

I, W. W. Price, Judge of the County of Terry, State of Texas, do at the request of the United States Treasury Department call upon and direct all adult males and females resident or present in the County of Terry on said 28th day of June, 1918, to be in attendance upon such meetings to be held in the particular school districts in which they reside or may be present and solemnly pledge to the United States Government the greatest saving they can make this year and invest in United States Government War Saving Stamps.

Fail not in a punctual response to the authoritative Federal summons. By order of the United States Treasury Department such meetings shall be held at 2 o'clock of the afternoon of said day. Under instructions from the said United States Treasury Department the duly accredited persons who shall hold said meetings for the Government shall cause an accurate roll to be kept of the persons present and those absent. The names of absentee residents of any district shall be certified to the United States Treasury Department for official record and disposition.

I do most earnestly appeal to every resident of Terry county to take cognizance of the bloodshed and loss of American life on the foreign battlefields and by their pledges to keep unsullied the fair name of Terry county, showing to the United States Government, the other counties of the State of Texas, and to those men of this county who are now in the armed service of the United States Government and fighting for the retention of our liberties that the citizens of Terry county are loyal and steadfast here at home in the service of our Country.
