BROWNFIELD BRANCH TO BE TURNED OVER 1ST.

In conversation with S. C. Ross, Assistant to the Chief Engineer of the Brownfield Branch of the Santa Fe, one day this week, he informed us that the road bed was 100 per cent complete, although there was some work to do yet, and that regular service would start Monday, probably, though he could tell us more about the matter after the inspection trip by the officials, which is to be Thursday of this week.

Among the officials expected, will be S. J. Parker, General Manager, Mr. Sears General Supt., Albert Ewing, of Slaton, Supt., Avery Turner, Tax-Commissioner, and F. M. Bisbee, Chief Engineer of this branch.

Mr. Ross informed us that that this is one of the best branch lines in the United States, and it is our opinion that it is far ahead of some of the main lines of this state, and Brownfield and this whole territory is real proud of their road, and thank the Santa Fe for building it when this was a short line they are building out from Shuttock, Okla. are the only roads in construction in the whole country.

BACKS UP THE ARMY AND NAVY

Success Wife of the Fighting Man
and Makes His Own Surroundings
as Pleasant as Possible.

The people of the United States only now are beginning to realize the force for good represented by the American Red Cross.

This statement is attested by the fact that 16,000,000 of the citizenry of this country joined the organization in the Christmas membership drive. But few of these, however, realized what the Red Cross is, doing to help win the war for the United States and its allies.

The four principal divisions of the Red Cross are Woman's Work, Junior Membership, Civilian Relief and Military Relief.

Woman's work consists of the various activities which result in furnishing sweaters, helmets, wristlets, socks, surgical dressings, etc., for American soldiers who either have gone to France or who are preparing to go. It has been estimated that the work women have done in this department since America entered the war would have cost the Red Cross \$59,000,000, exclusive of material used. Of course, all the work has been done gratis.

What Women Have Done.

In the seven months ending Nov. 1, 1917, the Red Cross sent to Europe 13,000,000 separate articles, surgical dressings, hospital supplies and clothing. In addition to these, large quantities of similar supplies have been sent to camps and cantonments in the United States.

The American people will not, of course, permit families to suffer want because their bread-winners are fighting for their country.

The Red Cross chapters can and will provide also the friendly services which may be needed and acceptable because of ill health or other misfortunes or because of family conditions which, if neglected, would result in need and suffering or disaster to the home.

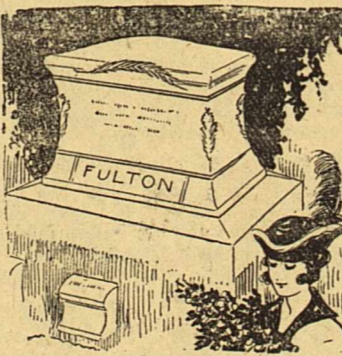

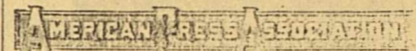

SKETCH LIFE OF REV. JOHN M. LANE

The following article, written by a friend, appeared in a recent issue of the Dallas News and will be of interest to many. Rev. Lane was well known to most of the old timers here, he having visited here a number of times in the and had many friends in this section of the state.

"The subject of this sketch was born May 22, 1848, in Walker county, Alabama. He was the son of J. M. Lane and Phoebe Walton Lane. He came with his parents to Texas in 1867 at the age of 19 years. He was married to Miss Lou Meek in Bell county Texas, on July 20, 1873. Eight children were born to them three of them died before their father. The Rev. J. M. Lane moved to Stephens county Texas, in 1877, then to San Saba county where he lived until 1884, when he moved to Cisco, Texas.

He then moved to Terry county in 1902 returning to Cisco in 1906, where he continued to live up until the time of his death, which was on May 26, 1918. He is survived by his wife, three sons and two daughters, as follows: Joe Lane Caprock N. M., Marvin Lane, Almagro, N. M., Doswell Lane, Cisco, Mrs. M. S. Leveridge, Paducah, and Mrs. M. S. Doss, Seminole.

"The Rev. J. M. Lane was indeed a typical Texan, a successful ranchman and at the time of his death had considerable means. His life was spent in activity, and a great portion of it was given to the church and to the work of better morals. He was converted at the age of 21 years and united with the Methodist church; was licensed to preach on April 12, 1873, and ordained deacon by Bishop McTyeire in 1879. He did work as an evangelist and thousands were converted under his ministry. He was elected as delegate to the general conference in 1896, which met in Richmond, Va., at which time he voted for Bishop Key. He was ordained elder and had work in the conference one year, serving the Bell Plains Mission. He served many years as steward and did other active work in the church. He was the first man to preach a sermon in Terry county. He held the service in his homesoon after moving to that county. His work among the ranchmen placed him in contact with the roughest men at that time, but he constantly held the high standard of morals and accomplished a great deal of good among his companions. During his active life he taught a Sunday school class. He was a pioneer in the fight for prohibition and had a great deal to do with its success in Eastland county.

"He was a man of shrewd business sense, and for many

A GUIDE TO BAKING

A guide to baking with helpful facts briefly told has been issued by the Office of Home Economics in the form of a card to be hung in a convenient place in the kitchen. It carries the message of saving wheat by the use of substitutes and gives amounts of substitutes, equal to one cup of flour. Good combinations of substitutes with cautions to be considered in their use in baking, are also given. An old recipe for making bread is compared with a new one in which 1 1-8 cups of barley and 1 cup of corn flour take the place of 2 cups of wheat flour.

Confusion and missending of mail at army postoffices due to partial and incorrect addresses has reached such a point that the First Assistant Postmaster General at Washington has had to issue the following order:

Postmasters are hereby instructed to withhold from dispatch in the mails all ordinary, insured or C. O. D. parcels which are addressed to members of the Regular Army, National Army or the National Guard, but

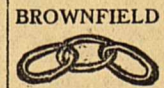

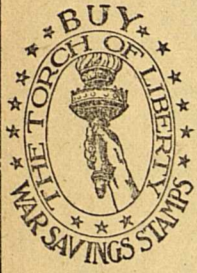

WOMEN VOTERS MUST REGISTER

Attorney General Looney has recently handed down a decision to the effect that all women who aim to vote in the primary must register, regardless of the fact that they live outside of a city of 10,000 population or over.

Therefore, our Tax-Collector, J. N. Lewis, has received his register receipts, and is now ready to register all lady voters twenty-one years or more, who has resided in the State one year and the county six months, the same law applying to them as men. You can register up to within 15 days of the election and Mr. Lewis says he will either be in his office all the time, or have some one there to wait on you. He is forbidden by law to register anyone outside his office. There will be no fees whatever but next year the ladies will be required to pay poll taxes the same as men to vote.

Now come in ladies and qualify you have been given equal sufferage in the primaries and convention the same as men whether you desired it or not, and your interest in this election will determine with the law making body whether you desire full sufferage or not.

Several ladies have already qualified, our efficient County Treasurer, Miss Dora Daugherty being the first woman to qualify for a vote in Terry county.

UNFORTUNATE PARTY THUNDER

It is unfortunate that it should be necessary for a spokesman of the administration to make a public statement that President Wilson and Mr. McAdoo do not countenance the use of their names in connection with 1920 presidential booms.

In the case of President Wilson it is especially unfortunate, and in Mr. McAdoo's case the impropriety of these booms is heightened by the fact that he is the President's son-in-law.

It is conceivable that a situation might arise which would make it unwise to change Presidents in the midst of war. But if such a situation did arise it would be apparent to the bulk of the American people and would not stand in need of a boom to make itself felt. In any event no such situation has risen as yet, and the motive of the booms for a third term for President Wilson is not to call attention to such a situation. It is to bolster up a political party and in such a time as this all such purely political activities are to be frowned upon. In Texas most of us adhere to the Democratic party and in normal times would desire to have a Democratic President instead of a Republican. But in such times as these we should forget all partisanship, especially partisanship of a character that would appropriate to our political party things that are heritage of all America.

Nobody thinks of Abraham Lincoln today as a Republican merely and future generations will care very little what political party Woodrow Wilson belonged to.

Woodrow Wilson stands forth to day as the greatest living American. Let's not in our party councils talk about him as if his greatness consists in the fact that he is a member of the Democratic party. The need of the times is unbroken national unity, and President Wilson has become the rallying point for all Americans irrespective of party affiliations. If the time should come when it would be deemed necessary to keep President Wilson at the head of the nation after the expiration of his second term because of the continuance of the world war or negotiations for peace, it will not be as a Democrat that he will be kept there. He will be kept there as an American, as our greatest American, and it will be at the demand of the American people and for the safety of the American nation. In such a situation party lines would be wiped out. It is unfortunate, therefore, and uncalled for that he should be talked about in party gatherings as the next "Democratic" nominee for the presidency.—Star Telegram.
