TO THE PUBLIC

Plains Texas, July 15th, 1918.

We take this method of announcing to the Citizenship of Brownfield and Terry County, that we find it impractical to open "The First National Bank" of Brownfield Texas on date of July 30th., as contemplated and in view of Notice of Issuance of Charter, and some preliminary arrangements with reference to the Interprise, having appeared in the local paper as news items, at various times we deem it not amiss to make a short Statement.

Our application for charter, was duly Granted by the treasury department, after we had furnished satisfactory evidence showing the vast amount of territory, and Resources tributary to Brownfield as the local rail road point for said territory.

However the continued drouth throughout a vast amount of the

New Mexico country, which is tributary to Brownfield, as a railroad point, together with a "General Tightness" of money with which the cattle industry must be financed, makes the opening of the bank at this time impractical.

Also the business of the United States, together with the individual efforts of her citizens, is the Winning of the War against "Kaiserism," and unto this business all other matters must be left in abeyance, until our objects are accomplished. Therefore our Assistant Cashier (Mr. E. B. Free) whom we purposed to promote to the Cashiership, of the Bank at Plains, so that our active services could be expended in promoting the interests of the First National Bank of Brownfield, has decided to volunteer his services to his Uncle Sam, at the earliest opportunity, and we find our selves unable to replace him with a

suitable person.

In view of these conditions, we have decided to leave the matter in abeyance for the present, and when matters have readjusted themselves, we will then proceed with the enterprise, doubting not that Brownfield is destined to be one of the leading cities of the great South Plains country.

LETTER FROM CALIFORNIA

Verice, California, (near Los Angeles)

Hello, Mr. O. P. Gayman:

"You asked me to report about Terry or Lubbock counties, Texas. I was not in either county but I made special inquiry as I passed through to the southeast of these counties. I was informed each time that they were very stony and rough; also dry and grazing proposition pure and simple. I shall call on you when I return and tell you my full opinion of Texas."

The above is an extract from a letter written after the party arrived in California from his home in Ohio, and addressed to Editor O. P. Gayman, of the Canal Winchester (Ohio) Times, who owns land in Terry County. It is needless to say that those southwest Texans "loaded" this traveler, and instead of being

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CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

SPECIAL TAX FOR MAINTENANCE OF PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND FURNISHING FREE TEXT BOOKS.

House Joint Resolution No. 27.
Proposing an amendment to Art. 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by changing Sec. 3, providing for a thirty-five cent tax levy for the maintenance of the public schools of Texas, and providing free text books in public schools of the State of Texas, and making an appropriation therefor.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution, be so changed as to read as follows (creating a new section 3):
Sec. 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and a poll tax of one (\$1.00) dollar on every male inhabitant of this State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and, in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollar valuation, as, with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State, and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general or special law without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation; and all such school districts, whether created by general or special law, may embrace parts of two or more counties. And the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts, and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such district, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties. And the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school

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districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school building therein; provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the district, voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax, not to exceed in any one year fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1918, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for the maintenance of the public schools of the State and to provide free text books in the public schools of the State of Texas," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for the maintenance of the public schools of the State, and to provide free text books in the public schools of the State of Texas."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. That the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

(Note.—H. J. R. No. 27 passed the House of Representatives by a two-thirds vote, yeas 108, nays 22; and passed the Senate by a two-thirds vote, yeas 23, nays 4.)

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Taking of Testimony in Criminal Cases.

House Joint Resolution No. 2.
To amend Section 10, Article 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for certain rights of accused persons in criminal prosecutions, and the manner in which the case may be prosecuted, and providing for the procuring of the testimony of the witnesses for both defense and prosecution.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section (10) of Article (1) of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended that the same will read and hereafter be as follows:
Sec. (10). In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall have a speedy public trial by an impartial jury. He shall have the right to demand the nature and cause of the accusation against him, and to have a copy thereof. He shall not be compelled to give evidence against himself and shall have the right of being heard by himself or counsel, or both, shall be confronted by the witnesses against him and shall have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, except that when the witness resides out of the State and the offense charged is a violation of any of the anti-trust laws of this State the defendant and the State shall have the right to produce and have the evidence admitted by deposition, under such rules and laws as the Legislature may hereafter provide; and no person shall be held to answer for a criminal offense, unless on an indictment of a grand jury, except in cases in which the punishment is by fine or imprisonment, otherwise than in the penitentiary, in cases of impeachment and in cases arising in the army of navy, or in the militia, when in actual service in time of war or public danger.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of this State at the next general election for State and county officers.

Sec. 3. The qualified electors for members of the Legislature shall vote upon said amendment at said general election and at which election all persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot the following: "For amendment to Section 10, Article 1 of the Constitution, providing for prosecution of criminal cases by information, or indictment, and taking of testimony of witnesses by deposition, under certain circumstances," and those opposed to such amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "Against the amendment to Section 10, Article 1 of the Constitution."

Sec. 4. The sum of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds of the State Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of publishing, proclamation,

and election.
(Note.—H. J. R. No. 2 passed the House of Representatives by a two-thirds vote, yeas 123, nays 4; and passed the Senate by amendments, by a two-thirds vote, yeas 21, nays 4; and the House concurred in Senate amendment by a two-thirds vote, yeas 123, nays 0.)

SHERIFF'S NOTICE OF ELECTION

The State of Texas; County of Terry:
Notice is hereby given, that an election will be held on the third day of August A. D. 1918, at the Meadow store, in Common School District No. 16 of this county, as established by order of the Commissioners Court of this County on date the 11th day of February A. D. 1918 which is recorded in Book One at page 569 of the minutes of said Court, to determine whether a majority of the legally qualified property tax paying voters of that district desire the issuance of Bonds on the faith and credit of said Common School District in the amount of \$2500.00 the bonds to be of the denomination of \$100.00 each being numbered consecutively from one to Twenty-Five, both inclusive, payable 20 years after date from their date, and bearing five per cent per annum payable annually on April 10th of each year, to provide funds to be expended in payment of accounts legally contracted in building a school building and furnishing same in said School District and to determine whether the Commissioners Court of this County shall be authorized to levy, assess and collect annually while said bonds or any of them are outstanding, at tax upon all taxable property within said District sufficient to pay the Current interest on said Bonds and provide a sinking fund to pay the principal at maturity. All persons who are legally qualified voters of this State and County, who are resident property tax payers in said District shall be entitled to vote at said election. Said election was ordered by the County Judge of this County by order made on the 8th day of July A. D. 1918, and this notice is given in pursuance of this order.

S. O. S. CALL TO TEXAS WOMEN

To the women of Texas:

The woman's ballot is the testing time in Texas. If we do not vote and vote in large numbers and vote for the right men we will no doubt have our franchise taken from us. We must vote for men for State, Nation and county officers who are known to be men whose record stands out clear for political reforms.

We may say we have no right to question death-bed repentance, but we have a right to doubt any man whose whole life and record and political affiliations are against us. We do not want men who are today pretending to want us to have all these things "Because we want them." No; if those men in the past is in direct opposition to our principles please say to yourself the following well known wise and true little couplet:

When the devil was sick the Devil a saint would be;
But when the devil was well;
Ah! a real devil was he.

And as sure as you vote for such characters and place them on the throne of political power you will soon see the hoofs and feel the talons.

You will see the State-wide law repealed; you will see woman's ballot taken from her; you will see submission again defeated, and you will see Texas the dumping ground for the criminals and the unfit of the States that are today driving them from their bounds.

The influence of the German war spirit is strong in Texas and and it is stealthily working under cover to capture our legislature and to hold our courts so that these things we have been able to place on our statues will be declared unconstitutional and thus repealed.

Our boys at the front and in the camps are respecting their mothers to help them fight the the battle of Democracy, while they direct their guns at the enemy they expect us to direct our ballots at the political corruptions of our State. Instead of going to the court and testing said action, which he says illegal, he is deliberately running in opposition to all precedent to all laws of our country and shows his usual defiance of law and decency, hoping to mislead the people by such subtle methods and again assume arrogant control of our government, which would be a sad day for our State and Nation.

The time is short. A crisis is at hand. The people must know the truth. We must thoroughly organize to prevent any further wrong. Every true American is against Kaiserism in the world. Every true Texan must help to down Kaiserism in Texas.

The very fine constructive legislation enacted under Mr. Hobby's administration will be upset if Mr. Ferguson and the other candidates who are backed by his crowd and the German brewery and propagandists should through some unfortunate circumstance get control of our government, a reign of political anarchy would ensue. The Prohibition legisla-

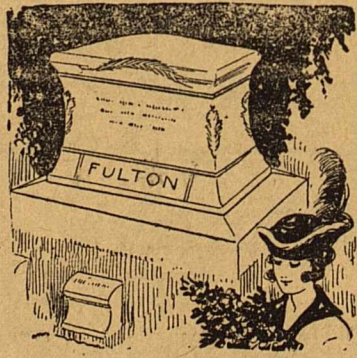

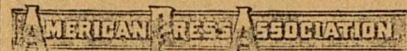

State for the year 1917 based on a population 4,429,566 was only 22 cents while the average income for all State universities of the United States per inhabitant was 46 cents. In other words the average family of Texas contributes less than \$1 per year for the support of the University.
