#### ELECTION RESULTS

The election passed off quietly here Saturday, there not being a cross word that we heard; this being made so, we think for the reason that the crowd was made up of near half ladies, and every body conducted themselves as they should. At times there was almost a rush, and it reminded us of the thickly populated towns in Central Texas. There was twice as many votes as ever polled before in the county, this being partly because 253 ladies participated, making up all and more of their sons and brothers who are now helping Uncle Sam clean up on the Kaiser.

And the next time you hear anyone say that they are willing for the ladies to vote if they want too, he either was not here Saturday, or is against women

voting. The Hobby Ferguson issue seemed to attract more attention than any other matter, but that has now been settled, and we hope for good, and we believe every good Democrat in Terry will support Mr. Hobby in the primaries. Mr. Hobby, we are proud to say, got the biggest majority of any man on the ticket that had an opponent. There was 595 votes cast in the county, of which 342 men and 253 women. The vote follows:

District Attorney, Wicks, 150, McGuire 341. County Judge, McGowan 263, Price 327. Sheriff and Tax Collector, Lewis 320, Barclay 267.

### CONSUMERS RELEASED FROM WHEAT SAVING

Washington, July 29.—Another step toward partial resumption by the Nation of its old habit of eating was taken today by the food Administration in releasing housewives from voluntary pledges to curtail the consumption of wheat. This follows closely the release of hotels, restaurants, clubs and dining services from their pledge effective Aug. 1.

No change has been made. The Food Administration announced in a half and half rule, and purchasers of wheat and flour will be required to continue the purchase of wheat substitutes. Bakers are still required to make "victory" bread, containing at 25 per cent wheat substitutes. Coming in of the new wheat crop has made it possible for the release of voluntary wheat saving pledges, the administration said.

The above applies only to those who pledged themselves to use no wheat products till Sept. 1st 1918.

This report is a brief telegraphic message on the condition of the local hog market as it has developed up to that hour and is designed to fill the gap between the 8.30 and 10.30 a. m. reports, which will be sent from the Chicago market as usual. ## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

### SPECIAL TAX FOR MAINTENANCE OF PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND FURNISHING FREE TEXT BOOKS.

House Joint Resolution No. 27.

Proposing an amendment to Art. 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by changing Sec. 3, providing for a thirty-five cent tax levy for the maintenance of the public schools of Texas, and providing free text books in public schools of the State of Texas, and making an appropriation therefor.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution, be so changed as to read as follows (creating a new section 3):

Sec. 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and a poll tax of one (\$1.00) dollar on every male inhabitant of this State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and, in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollar valuation, as, with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State, and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general or special law without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation; and all such school districts, whether created by general or special law, may embrace parts of two or more counties. And the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts, and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such district, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties. And the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school building therein; provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the district, voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax, not to exceed in any one year fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1918, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for the levy of a special school tax for the maintenance of the public schools of the State and to provide free text books in the public schools of the State of Texas," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for the levy of a special school tax for the maintenance of the public schools of the State, and to provide free text books in the public schools of the State of Texas."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. That the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

(Note.—H. J. R. No. 27 passed the House of Representatives by a two-thirds vote, yeas 108, nays 22; and passed the Senate by a two-thirds vote, yeas 23, nays 4.)

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

### Taking of Testimony in Criminal Cases.

House Joint Resolution No. 2.

To amend Section 10, Article 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for certain rights of accused persons in criminal prosecutions, and the manner in which the case may be prosecuted, and pro-

viding for the procuring of the testimony of the witnesses for both defense and prosecution.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section (10) of Article (1) of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended that the same will read and hereafter be as follows:

Sec. (10). In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall have a speedy public trial by an impartial jury. He shall have the right to demand the nature and cause of the accusation against him, and to have a copy thereof. He shall not be compelled to give evidence against himself and shall have the right of being heard by himself or counsel, or both, shall be confronted by the witnesses against him and shall have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, except that when the witness resides out of the State and the offense charged is a violation of any of the anti-trust laws of this State the defendant and the State shall have the right to produce and have the evidence admitted by deposition, under such rules and laws as the Legislature may hereafter provide; and no person shall be held to answer for a criminal offense, unless on an indictment of a grand jury, except in cases in which the punishment is by fine or imprisonment, otherwise than in the penitentiary, in cases of impeachment and in cases arising in the army of navy, or in the militia, when in actual service in time of war or public danger.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of this State at the next general election for State and county officers.

Sec. 3. The qualified electors for members of the Legislature shall vote upon said amendment at the said general election and at which election all persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot the following: "For amendment to Section 10, Article 1 of the Constitution, providing for prosecution of criminal cases by information, or indictment, and taking of testimony of witnesses by deposition, under certain circumstances," and those opposed to such amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "Against the amendment to Section 10, Article 1 of the Constitution."

Sec. 4. The sum of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds of the State Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of publishing, proclamation, and election.

(Note.—H. J. R. No. 2 passed the House of Representatives by a two-thirds vote, yeas 123, nays 4; and passed the Senate with amendments, by a two-thirds vote, yeas 21, nays 4; and the House concurred in Senate amendment by a two-thirds vote, yeas 123, nays 0.)

## SHERIFF'S NOTICE OF ELECTION

The State of Texas; County of Terry: Notice is hereby given, that an election will be held on the third day of August A. D. 1918, at the Meadow store, in Common School District No. 16 of this county, as established by order of the Commissioners Court of this County on date the 11th day of February A. D. 1918 which is recorded in Book One at page 569 of the minutes of said Court, to determine whether a majority of the legally qualified property tax paying voters of that district desire the issuance of Bonds on the faith and credit of said Common School District in the amount of \$2500.00 the bonds to be of the denomination of \$100.00 each being numbered consecutively from one to Twenty-Five, both inclusive, payable 20 years after date from their date, and bearing five per cent per annum payable annually on April 10th of each year, to provide funds to be expended in payment of accounts legally contracted in building a school building and furnishing same in said School District, and to determine whether the Commissioners Court of this County shall be authorized to levy, assess and collect annually while said bonds or any of them are outstanding, at tax upon all taxable property within said District sufficient to pay the current interest on said Bonds and provide a sinking fund to pay the principal at maturity. All persons who are legally qualified voters of this State and County, who are resident property tax payers in said District shall be entitled to vote at said election. Said election was ordered by the County Judge of this County by order made on the 8th day of July A. D. 1918, and this notice is given in pursuance of this order.

## HISTORIC PRECEDENTS

"Four thousand years ago Food Commissioner Joseph, in the land of Egypt, countermanded one fifth of the wheat crop of Egypt each year for seven years and stored it in the cities nearest the wheatfields. His drastic action at that time saved the world from starvation.

"Two thousand five hundred years ago Nebuchadnezzar, King of Babylon, instructed that certain men whom he wished to have attached to his court be fed on king's food and wine to give them a well nourished look. One of these men, named Daniel persuaded his caterer that himself and friends could be better nourished on pulse and water, and requested that he make a test covering a sufficient length of time, the others be fed on king's food and wine. The test showed that those fed on pulse (lentils) and water were better nourished than those fed on king's food (luxurie) and wine.

"Two thousand years ago Bible history records the miracle of feeding five thousand with a few barley loaves and fishes. The people were commanded to sit in rows of 50 to the row, and the servers passed before each and gave to every one his portion, so that all were served. It was an instance where a little food went a long way, and the fragments that remained were gathered up so that no food was wasted."—Hotel Monthly.

We don't know who started the idea of early closing, but we would bet that it was none of the boys who are bending their backs to the sun on the farm, or the ranchmen who must conserve every moment of daylight, owing to the shortage of labor. We know that it is bad on us town fellows that we must either refrain from taking our cool evening drives or miss the profits on many large sales, but don't let us question a man's loyalty to his country if conditions demand that he stay at his post and help the farmers and ranchmen win this war. We read Mr. Peden's letter very carefully, but there are local conditions that even a food administrator don't know anything about.—Littlefield News.

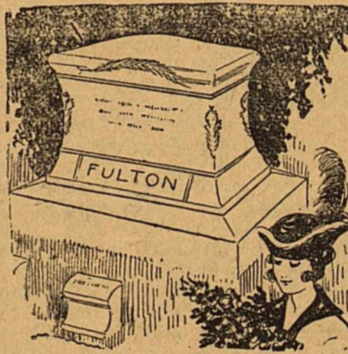

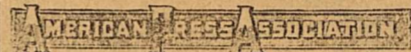

### CATTLE DIPPING BREKAS RECORD

Reports to the Bureau of Animal Industry disclose that May set a new record in the work of eradicating the cattle fever tick. In that month the number of cattle dipped was 5,468,600, the largest number reported in any one month since the campaign began actively in 1906. The big figures are believed to indicate the unanimity with which southern live-stock raisers have joined in the fight to free the South from the tick by 1921. The number of dipping vats available in May was 25,911 and 338 Federal inspectors, 284 State inspectors, and 1,126 county inspectors supervised the work.

### SOUTHWESTERN CATTLE MOVE TO MARKET

The annual movement of cattle from the grazing districts of the Southwest is in progress, as indicated by the receipt of 20,000 head on July 15 at Kansas City market. They were shipped from Kansas and Oklahoma. This movement, which ordinarily begins about July 20th to August 1 and ends about November 15 to December 1, is a little earlier than usual, according to a report of the Bureau of Markets of the United States Department of Agriculture. The report indicates that many of the cattle, which have been grazed in the Southwest this year and are now being marketed, are a year younger than these handled heretofore and their condition when they reach the market is slightly better than usual.

### SAVING AND SAVING AND LENDING

Sir Williams Goode, of the British Food Ministry, says that from July, 1917, to April, 1918, the United States exported to the allies 80,000,000 bushels of wheat products. Of this it is asserted that 50,000,000 bushels represented voluntary sacrifices by the American people in their consumption of wheat.

There is a triple economy, a triple aspect to this saving of wheat. It saved wheat for our Army and the armies of our allies; it saved money to the American people, and for the part this money went for the purchase of Government war securities.

There is another saving still; this sort of sacrifice and economy is helping win the war—shorten the war—with the resultant saving of soldiers lives.

## FREEZE OR BE SOBER

Nation wide prohibition for the period of the war is absolutely essential, in the opinion of the National Coal Association, representing bituminous coal operators with an annual production of nearly 400,000,000 tons to make effective any plan for speeding up the mines sufficiently to get the 100,000,000 additional tons of coal the country will require this winter.

This Statement is made by the association.

"A definite program for increased coal production," the statement continues, "placed formally before the United States Fuel Administration as the best thought of the industry, carries with it the recommendation that nation wide prohibition be put into effect at once. The coal production committee of the national association, which formulated the program, also has addressed a letter to each member of Congress, advising him of the recommendation.

"In the opinion of a representative committee of operators, which comprises in its membership delegates from virtually every large coal-producing field in the nation, the country cannot have

both booze and sufficient coal this winter."
