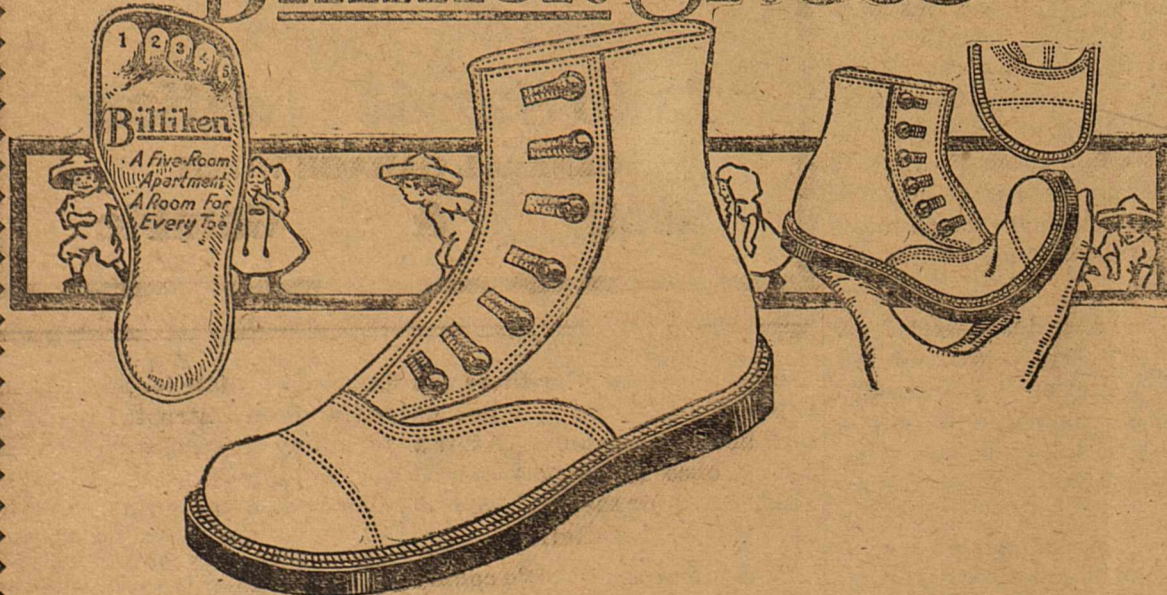

WE CAN OUTRUN AMERICANS

American soldiers in France see the funny side as well as the serious side of war. This is proved by a letter which R. J. Thorn of the Metropolitan Barber Shop has received from one of the American fighters, says the Star Telegram.

The letter follows:

"Dear Papa—I am writing on der run, as der brave and glorious soldiers under my command have not seen der Rhine for so long dat they have started back dat vay and of course I am going mit dem. Oh, Papa there has been some offel dings happened here in France. First I started in my big offensive which was to crush the fool American, but they know so little about military tactics dat dey will not be crushed just like I vant 'em. I sent my men in der fight in big waves and ven dey got to de Americans dey all said 'Boo' as loud as dey could heroler. Vell according to vat you half always told me, de Americans have turned and run like blazes. But vat do you think Dem fool Americans don't know anything about war, instead of running the odder vay, dey came right toward us. Some of them was singing something about 'Ve Vont Come Back Till It's Over, Over Dere,' or some odder fool ish song, and some of dem ver laffing like fools. Dey are so ignorant. "And dey talk blaspemy too. Vot you tink dey said right in front of my face? One big husky from a place they call Arizona he said—Oh papa I hate to tell you vat an offel ting he said—but I cant help it; he said 'To Hell mit der Kaiser!' Did you ever hear anything so offel? I did't think any body would say such a offel ting so I turned

around and run mit der odder boys. Was I right? And oh Papa you know dem brest plates vot you sent us—can you send some more to put on our backs? You know we are going de odder vay, now, and de brest plates are no good, for de cowardly Americans are shooting us right in der back. Some of our boys took off der brest plates and put 'em on behind, but de fool Americans are playing 'Der Star Spangled Banner' mit machine guns on dem plates.

"Can't you help us? You remember in your speech you said nothing could stand before the brave German soldiers? Oh Papa, I don't believe the ignorant Americans ever read your speech for dey run after us just like ve vas a lot of rabbits. Vot you tink of dot? Can't you send us some of your speeches right away? 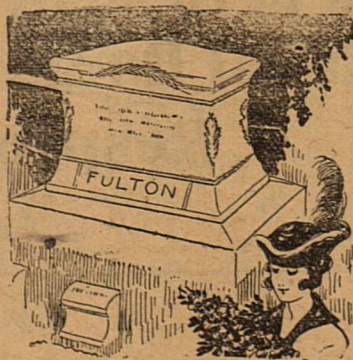

At that time sugar will come on the market from Western Kansas and Colorado. About Thanksgiving there will be sugar from the Louisiana cane districts. The Cuban crop will not be ready until Christmas or New Year.

How much relief could be expected then is uncertain. Indications for a bountiful crop of cane and beets are good, but it is impossible to make accurate estimates.

VELVET BEANS SOLVE SOUTH'S FEED PROBLEM

The feed question is being solved in many parts of the south by abundant yields of velvet beans which were sown on a large acreage this year. Owing to the increased acreage in Georgia, that State alone could take care of 50,000 to 100,000 head of cattle from states where forage is scarce, according to a report recently received by the Bureau of Crop Estimates. Large quantities of last years velvet beans also remain on hand and are being used extensively in feeding dairy cattle. In tests conducted by the United States Department of Agriculture on the Government farms at Beltsville, Md., it was found that velvet beans compare favorably with cotton seed meal, producing profitable gains when the beans are the sole concentrate of the ration; that a combination of corn silage and velvet beans form a satisfactory ration for fattening steers for market; that it is more profitable to feed soaked beans than it is to grind them; and that more beans will be eaten if soaked before they are fed than if they are fed dry.

BAD NEWS FOR BERLIN

The war news from the eastern front these days is bad news for the German people. Quotations from German news papers portray the gloom that overhangs the people in the large cities. That the people in the small towns and country are equally depressed is not to be doubted.

The Liberty Loan bond buyers of the preceding have their share in the success of the entente allies. They furnished the sinews of war not only to fight the U-boats and to build ships, not only to raise equip and send our soldiers over, not only to supply them and our allies with food and munitions, but more than \$6,000,000,000 of their money has been loaned to our allies so that they may prosecute the war with vigor and strength.

We here at home have the opportunity to send the Germans some more bad news. The Germans have a great respect for money; they know its vital value in waging war. They know too that the support of the American people give a Government loan measures largely the support they give their Government the moral as well as the financial support they give their armies in the field.

A tremendous subscription to the Fourth Liberty Loan will be as distressing to the German people as a defeat for them on the battle field, and it will mean as much. It spells their defeat; it breaks their moral; it means power to their enemies. A subscription is a contribution to German defeat and American victory.

President R. E. Vinson of the University of Texas is regional director for the States of Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arizona for the Committee on education and Special Training of the War Department. He is urging that as many young men from 18 to 21 years old, as possible attend the universities and colleges of this district next session. By voluntary induction they may enter the students' Army Training Corps of the educational institution of their choice. All such students will be paid \$30 per month and provided with uniforms and equipment by the Government. They will be required to pay for their own subsistence and quarters.

We were down at the gin yesterday, and the manager informed us that there was still a batch of lifting belting and a few small pulleys out that was shipped from Dallas, and the top of the huller that had to come from Chickasha, Okla., and even if they arrived on the Friday train, they would not get them completed in time to gin Monday. We will just have to exercise some patience, in this time of delayed traffic, and when the gin is in running order, there will be no further delays, as all the machinery is new, and is being put down right by first class workmen.
