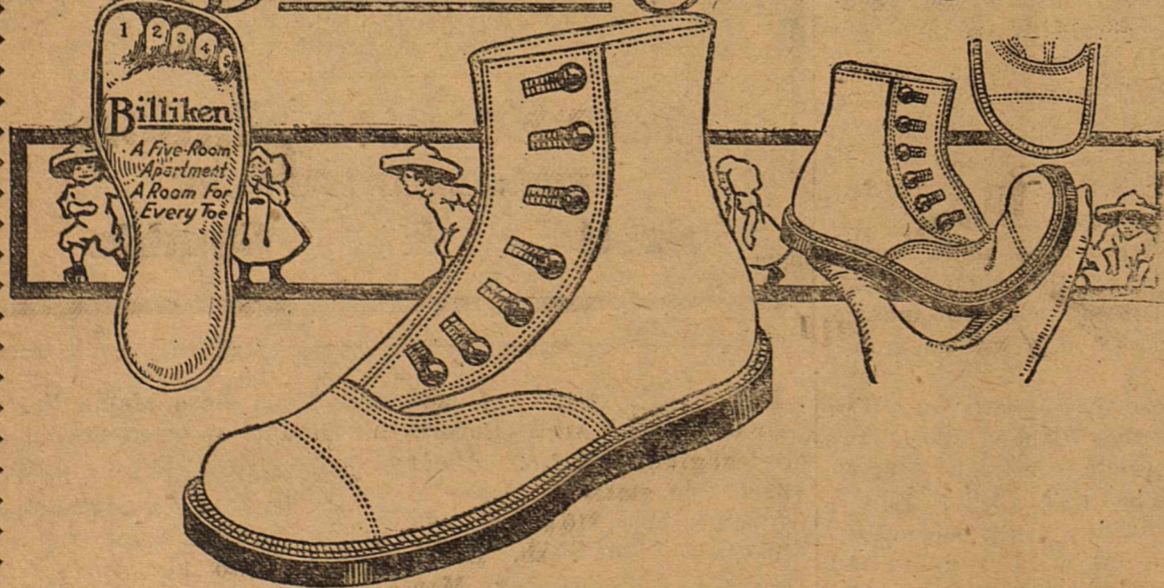

### AT SHEEP CAMPS

Tom May asked us Sunday afternoon to go with him out to his sheep ranch, as he had to carry his Mexican some supplies and in company with his father, J.T. May and our little son, we were soon on the road.

We sure did see some fine crops on the road, crops that would make anyone's heart glad to behold, and these people are rejoicing that they have them, and many of them are going to harvest a small fortune this fall.

Tom has 1488 as fine sheep as one need want to see, of the Rambolla breed, for we counted them while there, and if you never saw a real sheep herder count sheep it is worth your time to watch the process once. The herd was counted in less time than 25 minutes, and it was a nearly correct count, for Tom announced that he should have 1490 sheep, before we began the count.

The idea is to cut out a few small bunches from the main herd let them pass between the four, or any number of men, lined up on either side, and count them in pairs. Finally the whole herd will want to go to the other bunch, and all you have to do is keep lined up and the whole herd will pass between the lines of men; not over a half dozen will go around you.

These sheep were very poor when they landed here two months ago, from New Mexico, which had received little rain up to that time, but they are getting rolling fat now on grass and weeds that are almost knee high.

Besides the good crops and sheep, grass, etc; there are lots of cattle down there that are rolling fat.

## TEXAS WILL STAND BY OWN FLESH AND BLOOD

By Governor W. P. Hobby

Approximately 100,000 men have gone from Texas into the various Branches of the United States Army and Navy.

These men must be fed and clothed and supplied with the necessary equipment for carrying forward to a successful culmination the task to which they have dedicated themselves, their lives and fortunes.

The work of maintaining an army 200,000 men is a stupendous task, and the cost is in proportion.

As an individual as private, non-commissioned officer, the American soldier costs approximately annually per capita \$2,000. Of this amount \$130 goes for sustenance; \$280 for personal equipment; \$650 service; \$180 goes for pay (general average); \$80 housing, contentment, etc.; \$120, transportation here and abroad.

Of this computation of \$2,000, it will cost Texas \$400,000,000 annually to maintain her army of 200,000 men, not including guns and ammunition. Nothing less is expected of Texas.

In his report to the House Appropriations Committee, General March said there are now about 3,200,000 men under arms. Sixteen per cent of this number came from the Lone Star State. To the everlasting glory of a big state that does big things, it can be said that Texas did her country in giving her man power to this big cause for which our country went to war. And her task of meeting the gigantic cost of feeding, clothing and maintaining this huge representation of the great est commonwealth in the great est country in the world, will be accomplished with the same spirit of readiness with which she raised and sent into training and across the seas her army of 200,000 men, and with which she meets all big situation.

The message sent back to this country by the boys who are now in the thick of the fight is this: "we can do your fighting to a victorious finish, if the folk back home are willing to stand the gaff."

Texas is going to "stand the gaff." She has never admitted defeat. Conditions in the western sections of the State have been deplorable by reason of an unprecedented drouth. The answer to an appeal for relief of the drouth sufferer was spontaneous throughout the State. And just as Texas arose to a situation that demanded the immediate financial assistance to citizens within the confines of the State, so will she lend the necessary backing for those boys, 200,000 strong, who have uncomplainingly cheerfully, and with a smile on their lips shouldered the respon-

sibility of this war, which is your war and my war, as well as theirs. I appeal to the patriotism and to the honor of Texans.

Do your part by these boys who are fighting for you. "Stand the gaff," and back them up to your last dollar, in order that they may soon return to us, having fought a good fight, to a victorious end.

He says there are more than a dozen of our boys at Travis, and they are all getting fat. Clyde Lewis and Clifford Graves, and they were roaring because they could not put on additional flesh like the other boys.

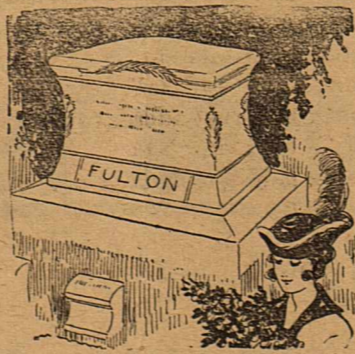

**A SOLDIER'S LETTER**

Camp Dix, N. J., 9-21-18  
Mr. and Mrs. H. F. Adams,  
Dear Uncle and Aunt,

I'm cooking today, but will steal enough time before supper to tell you of my trip, and how I am getting along. I have a pass from 6 p. m. this afternoon, till Monday, to visit Philadelphia, Pa. I have rheumatism in my hip and legs and my kidneys hurt all the time since I came here.

On August 24th, we left Camp Cody, at 12 a. m., and I met one of my boy friends as I left Deming, N. M., that I had not seen for six years, but he recognized me. El Paso was the next stop, and the Red Cross was there giving postals to the boys; I mailed one and had the lady to put the street address on for me. We ate dinner and stopped an hour at Almagorda, N. M., reached Carazozza, at 11 p. m., where we spent the night, and went to bed but could not sleep. We passed through Tucumcari, and stopped at Dalhart, Texas, where we took on ice and water, and I wrote a letter to mother (one that I shall never forget) headed Texas. At Liberal Kansas, the good people gave us a 5 gallon packer of ice cream, which was fine, and Kansas made the fourth State I was in in one day.

We arrived in Kansas Tuesday morning, where I saw my first steam boat on the Cove river. Kansas City is a fine place but a soldier cannot beg or buy a drop

of whiskey, for I saw numbers turned down. Saint Louis was a good stop, but I was cooking that day, and did not see the city. While in Saint Louis a lady wanted to see our stoves, and I invited her in the car to inspect our cooking, and she was surprised to see creamed potatoes, salmon salad, pies and coffee that we army cooks put out, and she was carried away with our field range. Here the Red Cross ladies served coffee and sandwiches. There are oodles of people working in factories here.

We passed through Illinois, but did not make any stops that I remember, but stopped at Indianapolis, Ind., and the Red Cross was there with cigars, matches and candy. The next stop was Columbus, Ohio, and as usual the Red Cross met us with open hearts. We then crossed part of West Va. into Pennsylvania, and stopping at Pittsburg the Red Cross served cream candy, cigarettts, matches and ready stamped post cards. We stopped at Harrisburg, the Capital, and a man and lady gave me and my pal a hand full of cigarettts, and said we were a fine bunch of boys. We thanked them and told them that they would find all the Sandstorm Division that way. They replied that it looked like we could get the Kaiser if anybody could. We stopped at Philadelphia only a few minutes, where we were met with cream, cigarettts and matches, and in another hour we

were in Camp Dix.

If I forgot to tell you of the tunnels we passed through before we got to Pittsburg; taking as long as five minutes to pass through, and the sulphur fumes from the coal made us wish for our gas masks.

We have good eats in the army; something that is good and wholesome, such as potatoes, beans and beef cooked any way; eggs, pork, bacon, rice, oatmeal, pies and cakes.

We leave here before long for some foreign land, and may your prayers be for the U.S.A. and its defenders, "The Boys in Khaki."
