Bank to Buy Brood Sows

In conversation one day this week, Mr. O. T. Halley, cahier of the local bank informed us that he was busy with the organization of a hog club, and if he could succeed in getting a car load, he would go to the hog country and buy a car and let the farmers of the Brownfield trade territory have them at cost. He asked us to help him get the matter advertised, and he never struck more willing help in his life.

Heretofore or big corn crops have found a ready sale in central west sively on cotton, but this year these people have cut their cotton acreage almost half in two, and as a consequence have devoted that portion cut yet been made up and will be dicinto feeds, and reports coming from there tell the same story—that they are going to make bumper crops.

We ask you then Mr. Terry county corn grower, what are you going to do with your surplus? This is a serious question, and we want you to ponder it well in the next few days, and reach your conclusion, for the sooner these brood sows are laved down in Brownfield, the better for all concerned, for they are not going to be any cheaper. Many have already come in and signified their willingnes to take from one to five, so you will have to hurry.

If these hogs are brought in here right away, it is safe to expect the first litter by not later than the first of August, which can be put on the market by the following February or March, and before Christmas, there ought to be a second litter to help eat up the big corn crop, and any one with any knowledge of market conditions will tell you that there is going to be no cheaper meat soon.

Now, if you are interested, come in at once and let Mr. Halley know how many brood sows you will take. He

To The Constitution.

There will be four constitutional amendments submitted to the people in the special election called for May 24th.

Governor Hobby has said that he will call the Legislature in special session about June 17th to vitalize the amendments which may be adopted on May 24th. The amendments are embraced in the following

House joint resolution No. 1: To make Texas dry by prohibiting the maufacture, sale, barter, exchange and transportation of intoxicating liquors.

House joint resolution No. 19: Empowering the Legislature to enact laws permitting the state to lend money to heads of families to acquire and improve rural homes for farming and stock raising. It is the Governor's land for the landless platform.

Senate joint resolution No. 7: To permit women to vote in elections held in Texas. It is the Equal Suffrage Amendment. It imposes the obligation of Amerian citizenship to vote and requires women to otherwise be qualified electors.

Senate joint resolution No. 13: Increasing the salary of the Governor from \$4,000 to \$10,000 each year. At this time there are several state officials who draw more salary than the chief executive of the State .-



BRIEF HISTORY OF THE NINETIETH DIVISION

In Two Parts: Part Two.

The Meuse-Argonne Offensive .-Commencing with the counter offensive in Julywhich cleared the Marne Salient, the Allied Armies, particularly the British Army, had steadily driven the enemy back until nearly all the ground gained in his great offensive of March, April, May, 1918, had been recovered. It be came evident that the enemy was planning, if not already executing, a general retreat with the Meuse as his pivot, and that if the Allied Armies could continue their offensive and particularly if they could break the enemy's pivot on the Meuse, a de cision might be reached. With this in view the great attack of Sept. 26th which developed into the Meuse-Argonne Offensive, was planned and the First American Army was given the honor position on the Meuse with the all important task of breaking the pivot of the enemy's retreat. Produce Fertile Eggs

Poultry experts in a position to know whereof they speak estimate that \$15,000,000.00 are lost annually be cause of the production of fertile eggs during the summer months.

Fertile eggs will not keep well in warm weather at a temperature of above 60 degrees, and few people in the fural districts are in a position to keep their eggs below this temperature. Infertile eggs will keep for about two weeks in edible condition, which gives time to gather the eggs and get them to market.

Furthermore, during the spring and summer when eggs are plentiful it is customary to eat eggs morning noon and night until one can scarcely stand the sight of an egg, simply because they are plentiful and may spoil.

It would be much better to save these eggs for use when the hens are not laying so bountifully, at which time eggs are at a premium.

This may be done by producing infertile eggs. Drive the rooster from the flock. This will not interfere with the production of eggs. In fact expert poultrymen seem to feel that it helps the production. Kill the scrub roosters, and isolate the pure breds until fall. Do not place them in a small pen, but rather in a roomy, shady inclosure, where they may get plenty of exercise, grass and in-

Eggs may be preserved in water glass and kept until winter.


