Quick Action.

Three little children in Texas, orphaned and crippled by the tornado that swept the state last week, will soon have the comforting presence and protection of their big brother, through the speed with which the emergency discharge from the Navy was obtained for Seaman John I. Branch.

On the same day that the father, mother and two brothers of Seaman Branch were instantly killed by the tornado and three smaller children seriously injured the Titus county, Texas, Red Cross wired the facts to American Red Cross at Washington asking that a furlough or discharge be obtained for Branch without delay. Branch was stationed at Bay Ridge Naval Barracks, Brooklyn, N. Y., and within forty-eight the Red Cross bureau of camp service had arranged for his discharge and immediately came to his destroyed home and the helpless little ones.

Southwest Leading as Usual.

Washington, April 28. The Southwestern States have assumed the lead in making Thrift a national custom, despite the traditional thrift qualities generally credited to New England. The teaching of thrift in every educational institution supported by the State is required in a law recently passed by both branches of the Oklahoma legislature.

Resolutions urging the inculcation of Thrift habits as a matter of self interest and endorsing the Government's 1919 campaign for the sale of Thrift and War Savings Stamps have been adopted by the legislature of Texas while similar resolutions, now pending before the legislatures of New Mexico and Louisiana, will be adopted at an early date, according to information received by the Savings Division of the Treasury Department.

War Savings Societies are being organized in every section of these four States and it is hoped that every man, woman and child in the southwest will be a member of a Savings Society within the next few months.

—Whereas, on the 19th day of May, A. D. 1919, a petition was presented to me for an election in Common School District No. 3, of this county, on the question of authorizing a tax of and at the rate of fifty cents on the \$100.00 valuation of taxable property in said district for the purpose of supplementing the State School Fund apportioned to said District, said petition bearing the requisite number of signature of property tax paying voters of said District, and being in every respect in conformity with law.

Now therefore, I, W. W. Price, in my capacity as County Judge of Terry County Texas, do hereby order that an election be held on the 14th day of June 1919, at the Schoolhouse in said District No. 3, of this county as established by order of the Commissioner's Court, Terry County, the record of which being recorded in the minutes of said court Terry County, to which references are here made for boundaries of same To determine whether a majority of the legally qualified property tax-paying voters of that district desire to tax themselves for the purpose of supplementing the State School Fund apportioned to said District and to determine whether the Commissioner's Court of this county shall be authorized to levy assess and collect annually a tax of and at the rate of fifty cents on the \$100.00 valuation of taxable property in said District for said purpose.

N. Bell is hereby appointed presiding officer for said election, and he shall elect two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding the same, and he shall within five days after said election has been held make due return thereof to the Commissioner's Court of this county as required by law, for holding a general election.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

For School Tax Against School Tax

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this state and of this county and who are resident property tax payers in said district shall be entitled to vote at said election.

The Sheriff of this county shall give notice of said election by having the same published in the Terry County Herald for twenty days before said election.

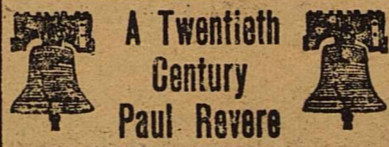

And petted his nose, all sweaty and damp;

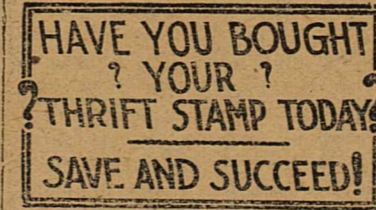
"Our work is done," he said, "old man,

A NERVOUS WRECK

From Three Years' Suffering, Says Cardui Made Her Well.

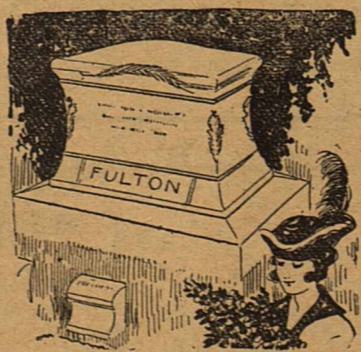

Senator Morris Shepherd
Answers Mrs. Wells

When Senator Morris Shepherd, who is Chairman of the Advisory Committee of the suffrage campaign in Texas, had his attention called to the fact that the State is being flooded with misleading literature, the clear intent of which is the defeat of the Suffrage Amendment by associating it with bolshevism, negro rule and socialism, he authorized the following interview, which was wired to the campaign headquarters of the Texas equal suffrage association at Austin:

"I am indignant over discredited outside opponents filling Texas with anti-suffrage propaganda that is so viciously misleading. Woman suffrage is no experiment; it has been tried out fully in fifteen states.

"Bolshevism has not held sway in States where women have had a say in the governments.

"As to socialism, figures do not lie, and here they are: Only 5 percent of the 408,000 women voters of New York City enrolled with the socialist party; 32 percent enrolled with the Republican party; 54 percent in the Democratic party; 1 percent in the Prohibition party, 8 percent being independent.

"It is a fact that the socialist vote in New York State in 1917, with only men voting was 169,364, while in 1918 when both men and women voted, it was only 123,071. This record can hardly be said to indicate

a reign of radicalism for other commonwealths if they give the women the vote.

"How is the opposition's bugaboo of negro domination to come about in Texas when there are only by actual count more white women than there are negro men, women and children combined? Even if this were not so, does history record an instance of an inferior race dominating a superior race? Is the white race of Texas inferior?"

"Antis do not claim social immorality has increased in other states where women vote, but the very disseminating of certain literature in our state is insidious insinuation that it will when Texas women do vote. The men of Texas will never believe this. We do not believe the women of our state are one whit inferior to women of other states which have already enfranchised

REDISTRICTING OF TEXAS SHOULD BE DONE NOW

Governor Hobby has promised a committee from the West Texas Chamber of Commerce that he will submit to the special session the question of a senatorial redistricting of Texas.

We anticipate at the outset that we shall now hear from certain quarters that inasmuch as the matter has gone over this long, the State should not redistrict until after the 1920 census. It will be pointed out that this may necessitate another change.

The answer to this is that it is precisely because there is to be a census in 1920 that the Senate should be reorganized on the basis of the present population figures. For Texas may be given new representation in congress on the basis of the 1920 census and the question of Congressional redistricting may come up again. West Texas does not propose to have the present equalities of representation to continue longer than it takes to change them. West Texas had to wait six years for justice in the matter of Congressional representation and to this good day it has not obtained its proper representation in the State Senate. West Texas should not permit the present state Senate to have anything to do with the reapportioning the state on the basis of the next census, and unless we misjudge the temper of the people of West Texas it is going to be insisted that full representation in the Senate be given to that section before the figures of the 1920 census are touched by that body.

This is only one aspect of the injustice done West Texas, which should be corrected, but it is an absolute reply to the plea for further delay on the ground that another census is to be taken. Such a plea is adding insult to injury which the State Legislature has permitted to continue against West Texas for more than eight years already. West Texas now has an organization through which to speak. Such injustice will not be permitted to

continue without vigorous and constant protest in the future. And from now on, not only State officials but the West Texas members of the Legislature themselves are going to be made aware of the fact that the studied neglect of the fundamental interests of that rapidly developing and constantly growing section will not be tolerated in silence. We are not suggesting that the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is going to become a political organization, for that is precisely what it will never become. But it is going to see to it that those who make politics their business give due and proper consideration to the valid and just claims of West Texas at all times. It will not ask for more than justice to the people and taxpayers and the various legitimate interests of West Texas. But upon that it will insist. —Star Telegram.

If the people of the eastern part of the State will give the people living west of the 90th meridian anything like a square deal, you will not hear of any back firing over here—but if they don't, you will see the question of division come up so strong that the better class of people of the eastern part of the state will unite with the west to see that justice is doing by giving them a new state. We believe it.

The Summer Garden.

Most of the gardeners have a good garden during the spring, but do not have one during the summer. There are quite a few vegetables that will go through the summer producing food, or they will keep growing and put on edible fruit sooner than if planted in the fall, says G. D. Everett, Garden Specialist, Extension Service, A. & M. College of Texas. The following vegetables will go through the summer:

Kentucky pole beans; Henderson bush, speckle bush and pole, and Sierra pole Lima Beans; carrots; parsnips; salsify; Swiss or beet chard; New Zealand Spinach; tomatoes; peppers, hot and sweet; egg plants; parsley; collards; okra; horse-radish; and sweet potatoes, while Blackeye, Lady and Cream field peas, and tepary, soy and pinto beans will go through the summer with the proper season, in most sections of Texas.

It is not too late to make another planting in the central or northern part of Texas of snap beans, beets, corn, Kohlrabi, mustard, leaf lettuce, radish, cucumber, pumpkin, squash, cantelope and watermelon. There should be a good season in the ground before the planting of these seeds. If possible, soak the seed over night in water, except the beans, which should be soaked only for several hours.

The garden should not be watered too often during the summer. It is best to give the soil a good soaking at one time and then a good mulch should be kept at the surface by cultivating. A small canvas hose, made out of eight or ten ounce duck will save a lot of water, put the moisture where it is needed, and the soil will not crust so badly, as it does when put on by the furrow system. This hose can be used only in a small garden.

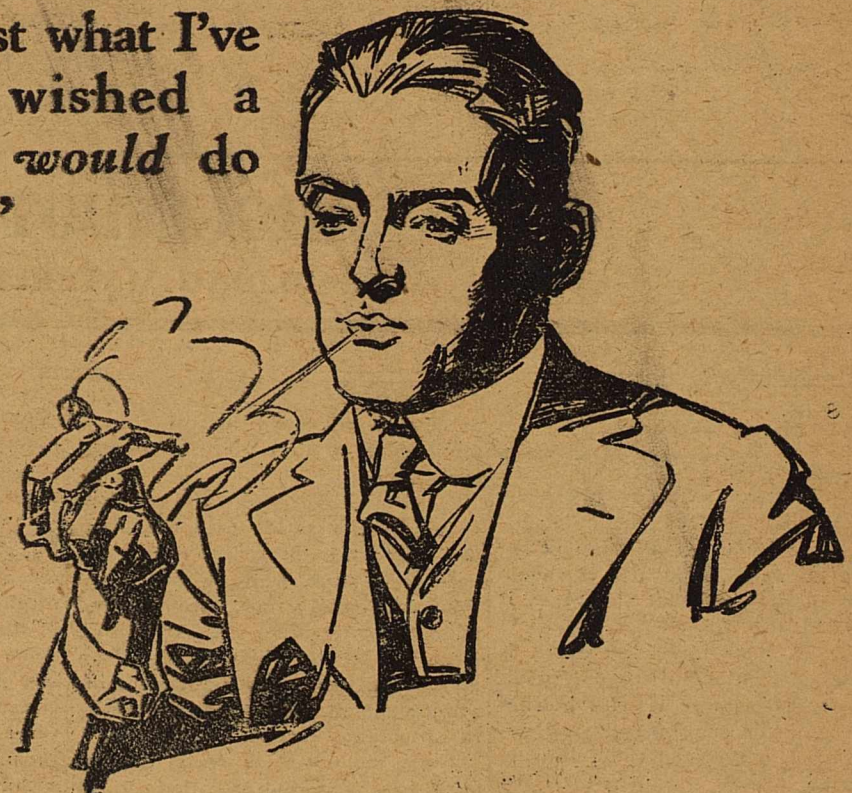

To Settle The Soldiers

The forth coming May issue of the Reclamation Record, published by the U. S. Reclamation Service of the Department of the Interior, contains an article showing the nation-wide interest in and approval of Secretary Lane's plan to provide work and homes in soldier settlements on reclaimed for our returned soldiers, sailors and marines. It is stated that already over 35,000 inquiries regarding the plan have been received from these men and that additional inquiries are coming in at the rate of five or six hundred a day. Many of the State legislatures have enacted soldier-settlement legislation in anticipation of similar action by Congress at the coming special session. In many of the States the Governors have appointed special committees to work in cooperation with the Federal Government in connection with soldier-settlement plans.

The American Federation of Labor has endorsed the plan in its reconstruction program, and the Daughters of the American Revolution approved the plan by formal resolution at their recent convention.

Scores of chambers of commerce, boards of trade, and similar organizations, as well as hundreds of newspapers have placed the stamp of their approval on the plan.

The last page of the record is in the form of a poster, with the caption "Attention! Soldiers! Sailors! Marines!" which describes the plan and requests every man interested to write to the Department stating his name, age, occupation before enlistment, whether he has had previous experience in farming,

what kind of farming he would like to take up, and where he would be willing to work, whether in his own or some other state.

Individuals receiving this copy of the Record are requested to tear off the back page poster and post it in a conspicuous place. Secretary Lane hopes, through this and other means, to get in touch with every returned soldier, sailor, or marine who is interested in his plan to provide work and farm homes for them.

The Best Bug Killer

Arsenate of lead is one of the best poisons for bugs. It can be used on any crop has a high killing power, sticks well and does not burn the foliage. Extensive tests at the Wisconsin college of agriculture have led them to recommend the arsenate of lead above all other poisons such as paris green, arsenate of zinc and calcium arsenate. Paris green burns the foliage. Arsenate of zinc should not be used on any crop but potatoes. The calcium arsenate has a lower killing power and a tendency to burn the leaves. If paris green or calcium arsenate is used, add an equal amount of good air slacked lime, which will prevent the burning. For the potato bug use the arsenate of lead at the rate of two and a half pounds per fifty gallons of water and of the arsenate of zinc two pounds. Apply when the bugs begin to hatch.—Campbell's Scientific Farmer.

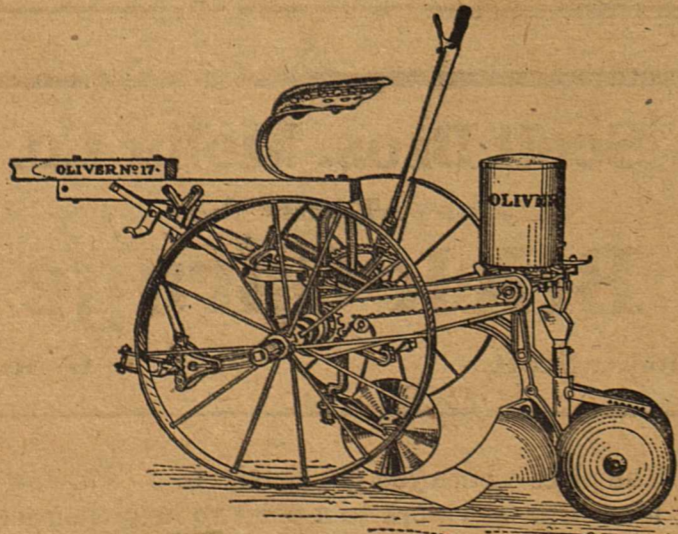
