
Doughboys Celebrate.

Coblenz, July 4- American troops whooped it up along the Rhine during the first Independence Day celebration Germany has seen. The doughboys celebrated with noise, long distance running,, boxing, baseball and more fireworks to the acre probably than were seen in any other place in the world. All enjoyed ice cream, peanuts, light wines and beer. Persons living near the Coblenz bridge head went to bed tonight dizzy, but impressed with the Fourth of July as some "event" however that is expressed in German. In the morning the citizens were awakened from their beauty sleep by the boistrous music of a full fledged band at reveile. At 11 o'clock the citizens crowd Clemensplatz to admire the parade of a battalion of the fifty-eighth Infantry. At noon they were alarmed when old FortressEhreitsein, across the: Rhine, came to life as four pieces of artillery, poking their noses over the lofty parapit, thundered the national salute of forty-eight guns. The people trembled and asked, "vas ist los?'

Then they took a deeper interest in the proceedings and what they know about independance and what it means. The Doughboys told themthat 143 years ago the Americans de clared their independance of England, laying the foundation for a government under which every one has an equal chance.
