



CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT Providing for an Issue of Bonds by the State for the Purpose of Con-Struction of Highways. House Joint Resolution No. 13.

A Joint Resolution proposing to amend Section 49, Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the power to create debts by or on behaff of the State so as hereafter to authorize the Legislature to enact such laws as nay be necessary directing the Governor of the State to issue in a sum not to exceed \$75,000,000; providing for the lev, of a tax to create the necessary interest and create the necessary interest and sinking fund therefor; and provid-ing that the proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be used in the construction of durable, hard sur-faced roads upon the public high-ways of the State.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. Amend said Section so as to read after its adoption as fol-
