TERRY ATTRACTING ATTENTION AT THE STATE FAIR

She Takes Twelfth Place in County Exhibits Out of Twenty-nine on Exhibition... May Get First Prize on Cotton

Those returning from the State Fair at Dallas, and we have talked to both J. E. Shelton and Earl Alexander, say that there never was a time any country was talked as much as the South Plains and especially this particular section of it, as right now, not only at the Fair, but in hotels, eating houses and on the trains, from those who have attended the Fair, or saw people from there.

In the county contest, Terry stood 12th, not because of quantity, but from quality of different products, for products that we could not get to the fair on account of inaccessibility, such counties as Ellis, Hill, and Cook, could easily do so.

The last report we had from the fair, Terry had already strung four blue ribbons and several reds, and was going good. It was easily the best exhibit from the South Plains section as Lubbock and Hale lost most of their products in transit, and what was left was almost a joke. Dawson stood 21st in the list.

In an issue of last week, the Dallas Morning News said:

"Terry County, South Plains district, is back as usual, with William Howard, also as usual in charge. Mr. Howard is lamenting that a watermelon, weighing ninety pounds or more spoiled before it could be exhibited. However he is showing five one that appears to be a close relation to the one that perished on the long run. Mr. Howard says the Terry county exhibit is far better than ever before and visitors appear to agree with him. Maize, kaffir corn and cotton, South Plains staples comprise the bulk of the showing." A telegram was received this week

from Homer D. Wade, Secretary of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, asking the local Chamber to send our exhibit to the Cotton Palace at Waco, by all means. We understand that an effort will be made to do so, if a man can be found to take it in charge at that place, as Uncle Billie Howard and W. D. Winn will be worn out by the time the exhibition is over at Dallas. It is thought that nearly enough money will be won at Dallas to pay expenses at Waco. Who will volunteer to carry it to the Cotton Palace at Waco? We have never exhibited there.

The Sunday edition of the Dallas Morning News had this additional to say about glorious old Terry:

"William Howard of Brownfield is here on his sixth annual trip with the Terry County exhibit. The one this year is the best the South Plains county has ever sent in his opinion. "In sixteen years Terry County has seen but one corn crop failure on my farm," Mr. Howard said. "Notwithstanding we are in the heart of the grain sorghum belt, I believe Terry is one of the best corn counties in the State."

Mr. Howard has been complaining of the heat and humidity of Dallas as he comes from a district where the altitude is nearly 3,000 feet. He said there is a pronounced shortage of farm labor in Terry County to handle big cotton, corn, and grain sorghum crops. Cotton is making one-half bale to the acre on an average, with maize and kaffir running easily a ton to the acre. Some fine watermelons, pumpkins, kershaws and vegetables are shown in the booth.

"Within the last two or three years Terry got its first railroad connections, the Santa Fe extending a line from Lubbock to Seagraves, through Brownfield," said Mr. Howard. "Our town is growing rapidly. Many farm-

ers are coming in. Unimproved land sells from \$10 to \$25 an acre, the price varying with the distance from the railroad."

GEOLOGIST FINISHES SURVEY OF SALT LAKES

From Expressions Heard Will Report Favorably.—Enough Potash to Last Almost Indefinitely Here

We mentioned last week that there was a geologist here in the interest of the United States Government to determine whether or not the United States had enough potash in its own borders for its farmers without the aid of German products. In its stress to obtain these products as cheap for its farmers as possible, Congress was on the eve of letting the German potash into this country free of duty for the farmers, but the bill was held up by Hon. Marvin Jones, member from this district, pending an investigation by the U. S. Geological Survey. As a consequence, Mr. Orby C. Wheeler, of Amarillo, representing both the national and the State Governments was sent here. He was accompanied in all his investigations, which included the Rich Lake, Salt Lake, Brownfield Lake and the Cedar Lake in Gaines county, by Mr. Jessie Ainsworth, of Wichita, Kans., who has under lease all of the lakes mentioned above, the combined area of which, amounts to well near fifteen sections.

Mr. Wheeler says that the supply is almost inexhaustible and probably enough to run the United States a thousand years. Among the new chemicals found was iodoform, and one of the deadly poisons, and it is thought the latter is responsible for the water's deadly effect upon animal life. These lakes are rich in several of the essentials of the chemist.

One main cause we understand of free German potash bill being railroad through so fast, is that the big packer and fertilizer magnate, Mr. J. Ogden Armour was pushing it, he being the president and owning the controlling interest in the German potash beds, and he is afraid that the

big South Plains lakes are going to tear down his play house.

We understand that Mr. McRhea, who was promoting the lake leasing end of the Texas Nitrate Co., of Ft. Worth, has been arrested for alleged embezzlement, and is out of the business, at least for the time being, but we understand that the organization of capitalist forming the company, are all good men, and are still paying their lease on Salt Lake. As to the Ainsworth company, it is too well known in financial circles to need any comment, Mr. Ainsworth, himself being many times a millionaire.

We have been asked several times lately why there was nothing doing. The only reason we can assign is that these companies are awaiting the report of Mr. Wheeler, and then the action of Congress. We have been informed by reliable parties that a representative of a big engineering and construction company has already been over the grounds, as that company have been figuring on the plants and pipe lines. In fact he let it be known that his company had constructed works for one of the chemical companies before.



Seagraves will also likely get a factory, as we understand the companies are planning to get all or as many of their factories as possible on the same railroad line.




West Texas in the Saddle.





STATE OF TEXAS; County of Terry.—To the Sheriff or any Constable of Terry County:


You are commanded to summon Hattie Winn, by making publication of this citation once each week for four consecutive weeks previous to the return date hereof in some newspaper published in your county, if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in any newspaper published in the 72nd Judicial District, but if there be no newspaper published in said district then in a newspaper published in the nearest district to the said 72nd Judicial District, to appear at the next term of district court of Terry County, Texas, to be holden in the courthouse thereof in the town of Brownfield, Terry County, Texas, on the twenty-seventh day of October, A. D. 1919, then and there to answer a petition filed in said court on the 29th day of September, A. D. 1919, in a suit No. 634 on the docket of said court, wherein R. L. Winn is plaintiff and Hattie Winn is defendant, said petition alleging that plaintiff and defendant were lawfully married on July 20th, 1918 in Beckham county, Okla. That shortly thereafter was this plaintiff entered the army. That while he was absent the defendant unlawfully and adulterously co-habited with various men whose names are to him unknown, but that on one occasion in particular she went to Amarillo with a man and adulterously co-habited with him while there. That the plaintiff does not know the whereabouts of the defendant. Wherefore he prays judgment dissolving the bonds of matrimony between him and defendant.

Herein fail not, but have you then and there your writ with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.
