What a New Comer, Mr. A. A. Larkey Thinks of Old Terry.

Located in the Heart of the Great Plains of Western Texas, Terry County has, within the past fifteen years, fully established her claim to good crops raised every year, having been the only county in West Texas that made a general crop in the year 1918, and furnished grass, also, for 10,000 cattle shipped in from other parts of Texas. During this extremely dry year, 25 cars of corn, 40 cars of headed maize and kaffir corn and more than 20 cars of baled feed stuff were shipped out of the county, besides retaining a sufficiency for home consumption. Besides the above cellent combination for general farm- Terry County has many advantages shipments, two cars of threshed seeds were furnished to other counties for planting purposes. During the year 1917, Terry County won second prize on cotton and third prize on broom corn at the Texas State Fair, as well third on corn,-"WORLD COMPETI-TION." At this time Five blue ribbons were also won on apples. Now comes the announcement that Terry County has won ten more blue ribbons at the Texas State Fair for the Cotton, Junecorn, Apples and feed crops.

Terry County has never made a complete failure. Cotton, Corn, Maize Feterita, Sudan, Broomcorn, Peanuts, Sorghum, Potatoes, Pumpkins, Watermelons and Cantaloupes are all successfully grown. Fruits of all kinds do exceedingly well, including Apples, Peaches, Plums, Grapes, Pears, Apricots and Cherries.

The following is an exact copy of the official ballot to be voted on at the special election to be held November the fourth. Study it carefully and vote according to your own notion.

FOR amendment to Section 49, Article 3 of the Constitution proposing to amend Section 49, of Article 3, relating to the power to create debts by or on behalf of the State, so as hereafter to authorize the Legislature to enact a law directing the inssuance of bonds by the Govenor of the State in a sum not to exceed Seventy-five Million (\$75,000,000) doilars, the proceeds of said bonds to be used in the construction of durable hard-surfaced roads upon public highways of the State; and providing for the levy of a tax, not to exceed 20 cents on the One Hundred Dollars valuation, on taxable property in the State.
