DEATHS

Two very sad deaths have taken place in Terry county in the past week, that has cast the gloom of sadness over the entire country.

Mrs. Grace Price, wife of Lense Price died last Thursday night near sundown at their home on the line of Terry and Hockley counties between Meadow and Ropes, after a lingering illness of almost two years, and was buried Friday in the Brownfield cemetery. Her pastor, Rev. J. E. Anderson of this place conducted the funeral services in the local Baptist church, after which a large concourse of people followed the body to its last resting place.

Mrs. Price was widely known all over this country, as she was practically raised on the border of the two counties, and if she had an enemy, we never heard of it. She was a faithful and constant member of the Baptist church, and leaves behind her a heart broken husband and two little children to mourn her departure, besides her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lee Cowan, several brothers and sisters and numerous friends.

The deceased was about 29 years of age.

Only the Lord of Heaven is able to comfort the bereaved.

showed the esteem in which she was held by the people of this county.

The body was immediately conducted to the Baptist church by a body of Odd Fellows, where her pastor, Rev. Heath paid the last sad rites to the departed.

Mrs. Johnson was about 61 years old when death came.

Mrs. Johnson was a fine woman, and a devout member of the Baptist church, and the writer joins the many friends of the husband and children in sympathy in this trying hour.

A. J. Stricklin was unanimously elected as Delegate from Terry County to the State Convention.

There being no further business to come before the convention, same was adjourned.

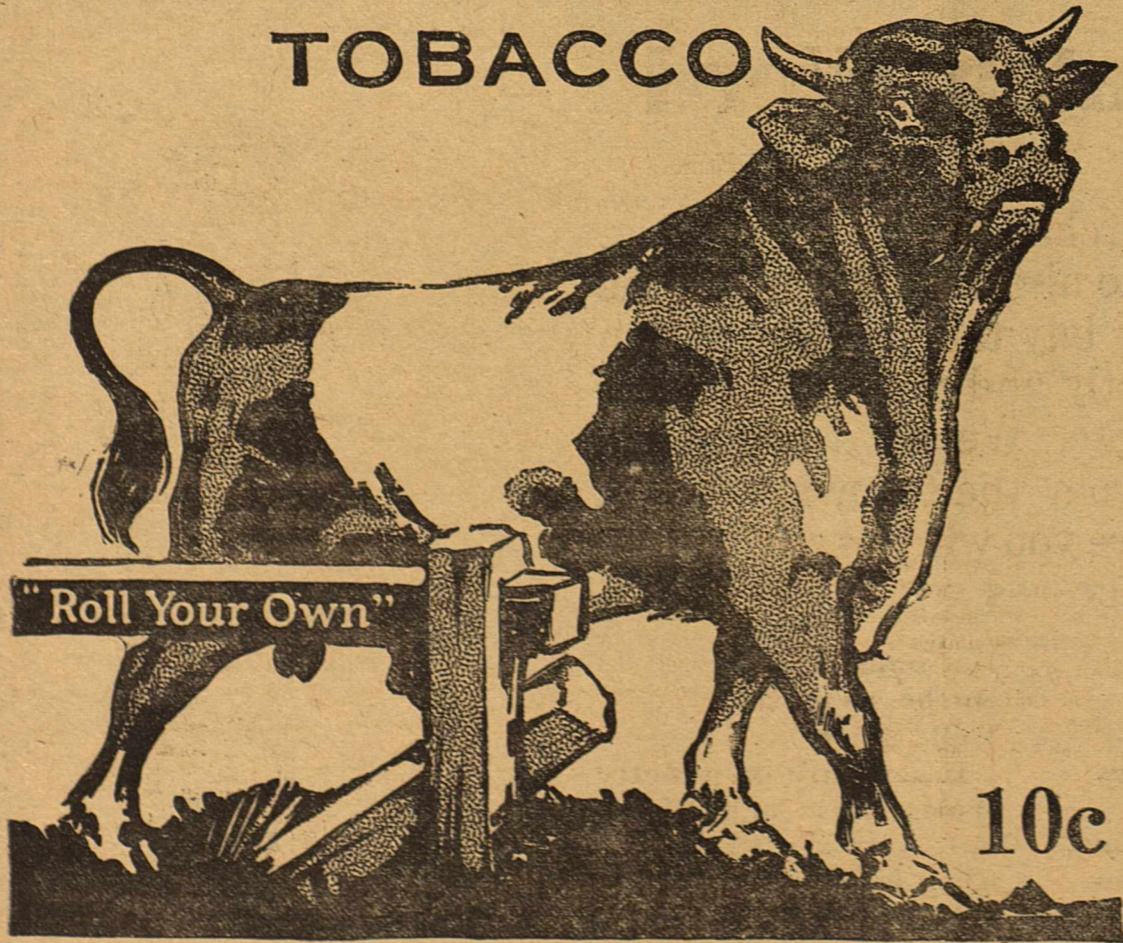

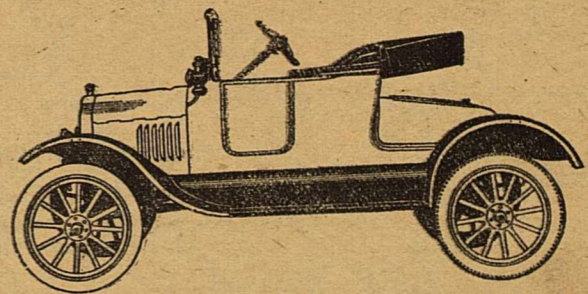

DR. LLOYD DECLARES HE CAN STOP THE WIND

By cultivation of the land of West Texas, leaving only a small portion in grass, the wind will cease to blow in the strong gales of the past, according to Dr. O. H. Lloyd of Vega, well known scientific farmer, who was here this week.

Sounds reasonable at least. He claims that on the grass or unbroken land, during the day when the sun rays are strong against the earth that down only an inch or more, a thermometer test will prove that it is cold. He says this unbroken ground acts on the sun rays as a mirror, resulting in the rays rebounding, causing the mirages of which West Texas is well known. Another test is that the thermometer in the unbroken ground will show a low temperature and one placed in broken ground will test a much higher temperature. In other words, the broken ground will absorb the heat of the sun rays to a much greater depth during the day, and of course would have more heat to throw off during the night. By this cultivation, according to Dr. Lloyd, the days would be made cooler and the nights warmer, thus bringing the two extreme temperatures closer together, which he says is the cause of the high winds of this country.

"We cannot make it rain," says Dr. Lloyd, "although we can conserve the moisture, by cultivation of the land, this in years to come will be made because of cultivation. People then will say that the rainfall has increased."

THE PARTING OF THE WAYS

The parting of old friends brings regrets and the separations of households causes great heart pangs but in the course of human events this is oftentimes necessary and the inevitable result of growth, expansion and the difference in individual desires and ambitions.

Texas holds so much formative history and sentiment that the suggestion of a division of the State raises a storm of protest from a large number of the people of the State. Yet there is occurring year after year incidents and a growth in conditions that is further pushing east and west Texas apart.

Until recent years the great bulk of the State's population lay east of a line running north and south through Tarrant county. In recent years, however, the center of population has shifted far west of that line. In former years West Texas held the place of "Little Orphant Annie" in the Texas family, having little or no voice in administration affairs, appropriations and public advantages. Now, however, West Texas has gained sufficient voting strength to make herself heard and her influence felt and as West Texans are not a servile people, they will not much longer stand for the injustices and discriminations that have been and are still being practiced against this section.

There are so many matters of State policy and practice that work for the east and against the west that it would make a voluminous book to barely mention all. There are a few questions however, that West Texans would like to propound to their brothers on the east, not expecting any of course but an evasive answer.

Why should every 100 citizens in some east Texas district have a representative and west Texans have only one for each 1000?

Why should East Texas have an A. & M. college located 500 miles from the western border and deny West Texas such a college which could not be possibly located further from the east Texas line?

West Texas is getting fed up on

playing the part of the suburbs to east Texas and something is going to happen one of these days.

We must have justice in representation. We must have justice in educational institutions and the expenditure of state money. And we must have a square deal or there will be a parting of the ways.—Rotan Advance

POTASH DEPOSITS IN TEXAS

Austin, Texas, April 5.—Results of recent investigations of potash and bromine deposits in West Texas which were concluded by the United States Geological Survey and the Bureau of Economic Geology and Technology of the University of Texas are contained in a press bulletin just issued by the United States Geological Survey. The report shows that brines which contain potash and bromine are found in alkali lakes in Gaines, Lynn and Terry counties in the South Plains. The feasibility of producing potash and bromine from these brines at a cost that will permit competition with potash and bromine produced from other sources depends on many factors, including the quantity of available brine in the region and the development of an economical process of extraction, it is pointed out. The salts of these brines contain a smaller percentage of potash than that yielded by the potash material of Germany, Alsace, Nebraska and Searles Lake, but, on the other hand, they contain a relatively high percentage of bromine, which is comparatively scarce and is now produced in this country principally from salt and calcium chloride brines in Michigan, Ohio and West Virginia, it is stated.
