WORK ON TABERNACLE TO BEGIN THIS WEEK

We stated last week that work on the tabernacle for Brownfield was an assured fact, and this week before the Herald reaches any of its readers we expect to see actual construction work begun on the building, and by the end of the week, the building will be well under way.

The three ministers we mentioned last week as having the solicitation of funds under way, have now raised close to \$900.00 and the going is still good.

Everything was moving so nicely that it was thought best to give it a more business shape, and a meeting of the citizenship of the town was called together Friday afternoon and the following business was transacted:

Meeting called to order by Rev. J. E. Anderson, purpose stated, and the election of a chairman of the meeting was stated, resulting in A. J. Stricklin being put in charge. Mr. M. L. Copeland was elected secretary and assumed the duties.

The chairman proceeded to place the proposition before the assembly, setting forth ideals of the same, the necessity and subsequent asset to the community of the project. Discussion was called for; sentiment zealous and favorable; method for the proper control and care for the tabernacle was considered.

It was proposed to create a board of trustees, in whom the construction management, care and trust of the proposition should be placed.

It was unanimously decided to place the two bank presidents and the president of the Terry County Fair Association, and they in turn should name two other members to serve on the board with them.

Further business matters were deferred and turned over to the discretion of the Board of Trustees for their solution and proper execution.

From Minutes of the Meeting

Between the holding of the above mass meeting and Monday morning of this week, the above named gentlemen named John S. Powell and A. J. Stricklin as members of the Board of Trustees, the others being W. H. Dallas, Pres. of the Brownfield State Bank, and R. M. Kendrick, Pres. of the First National Bank, and Wm. Howard, Pres. Terry County Fair Association.

At a meeting of the board Monday morning the following business was transacted with the absence of one of the members, R. M. Kendrick: Rev. J. W. Baughman was made temporary chairman, and the election of the following officials ensued:

W. H. Dallas was elected Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and A. J. Stricklin, Sec.

The soliciting committee then made report of their progress, and showed that better than \$800.00 in cash was already in sight. Plans and specifications were then discussed with the help and suggestions of carpenters, and about the following was arrived at: Building to be 50x76 with 8 foot walls and hipped roof, the supports to be of strong materials and put down in concrete. G. C. Douglass was made Supt. of Construction and John S. Powell Supt. of building operations.

Material was put on the ground Tuesday morning and actual construction started, and all the people of Brownfield and surrounding country are throwing in at a lively rate, and we are soon to realize the reality of our past dreams.

Prof. G. L. Farrar and his junior boys and girls are going to put on a play Thursday night at the school auditorium to go toward construction, and Dock Powell and Sheriff Jim Lewis are going to get up a real old negro minstrel.

GRASSHOPPER POISON

Grasshoppers are at work in Terry County, and as this poison was tried out last year and found good we are printing it and hope every farmer in Terry county will clip it out and if they have no use for it this year, it may come in handy some other year. The gentleman that handed the recipe to the Herald says however that as there is generally lots of wind in Terry county that it is best to put it in small heaps along the ends of the rows, or in the path of the hoppers.

The poison bran mash can be easily and cheaply made as follows: Bran 20 pounds; Paris green, white arsenic or London purple 1 pound; syrup or cheap molasses 2 quarts; oranges or lemons 3; water 3 1-2 gallons. Or in smaller quantities: Bran 1 pound; either of the above poison 1 ounce; syrup or cheap molasses 3 ounces; 1-4 orange or lemon; water 1 1-2 pint.

In preparing the bran mash mix the bran and Paris green, white arsenic or London purple thoroughly, in a wash tub while dry. Squeeze the juice of oranges or lemons into the water and chop remaining pulp and peel into fine bits and add them to the water.

Dissolve the syrup in the water and wet the bran and poison with the mixture, stirring at the same time so as to dampen the mash well.

The Paris green is preferred to any of the other poisons, but the price of it this year is very high, and in some cases it may be well to substitute the white arsenic or London purple. If these are substituted, use the same amount and prepare the bait in the same manner as when using Paris green.

The bait when flavored with oranges or lemons was found to be not only more attractive, but was more appetizing and was eaten by more of the grasshoppers.

The bait should be put out early in the morning as above directed, or about the time the hoppers begin to move about from their night's rest. It should be put out in such a manner as to cover four or five acres with the amount of bait made by using 20 pounds of bran. Since very little of the bran mash is eaten after it becomes dry, scattering it broad cast and sparingly in the morning places it where the largest number will find it. Sowing it in this manner also makes it impossible for birds, barnyard fowls or live stock to secure a sufficient amount of the poison to kill them.

To make the fight successful against the hoppers says Prof. Dean, too much emphasis cannot be laid on the necessity of beginning promptly as soon as the insects are present in sufficient numbers to threaten the crop and continuing it vigorously as long as the grasshoppers are present.
