## GREAT HAIL DAMAGE IN EASTERN PART OF CO.

One of the most danerous looking clouds that we have seen since our residence in this county begin about eleven and one-half years ago, formed in the northeast part of the county last Saturday afternoon and swept south throuh the east part of the county leaving destruction by hail in its wake, though in town, and for four or five miles east there was not much rain and no hail to speak of.

For the four or five mile strip that the storm was at its worst, which strip was about 15 miles long, the crops are practically all to plant over and many of the farmers and ranchmen will have to re-cover their roofs, and put in new windows on the north side of their houses, and where it struck screaned in porches, they were simply ripped out and piled up in broken masses. Those that saw the cattle on Burnett Brothers ranch all describe them as looking as if some one had given them a severe whippinn with a barbed wire. All the pulp was cut off the baregrass, leaving only the tough fibre, and one farmer said it was ready now for making ropes.

We have talked to some of the oldest farmers in the county that are in the belt, or have been in it since the disaster, and they say it beats anything they ever saw in the way of a hail and winstorm. While the wind by itself would not have done any damage by itself, accompanied by the big hail stones, and it was terrific.

Very few, in fact only one of the farmers in the hail belt that we have heard of had hail insurance, and petitions for the relief of some of the worst sufferers were circulated here Monday morning. One of the local lumbermen informed us about noon Monday that he had already sold better than \$1000 worth of roofs, and had given 10 percent off the price of each bill from the regular price.

## DEMOCRATIC EXECUTIVE COM. MET MONDAY

The Democratic Executive Committee of Terry county, met Monday and transacted the usual order of business that comes before such bodies. Those present were the chairman; M. V. Brownfield, representing No. 1. W. D. Winn representing No. 3, and W. H. Black representing No. 4. Wm. Howard, representing No. 2 was unable to attend. It was found that W. D. Winn was disqualified for the reason that he holds an office in the county, and Will Pool was elected in his stead, and was called in to take his seat in the meeting.

A careful estimate of the cost of the election was made after it was decided to hold two primaries and the following assessments were made of the different offices: County Judge \$15 each; County Clerk \$15 each; Assessor \$15 each; Sheriff \$15 each; County Treasurer, \$5 each; Co. Commissioners \$5 each; Public Weigher and Justice of Peace \$5 each.

This is a very low assessment, but the reason for that is the unusual number of candidates to be assessed. Heretofore it has cost the candidates almost this amount for one election.

It was decided to leave the State Candidates like they were certified to the committee by the State Secretary, and the following is the way the district, county and precinct candidates will appear on the Terry Co. Official Ballot:

For State Senator; Jessie R. Smith, of Stephens County, and John A. Russell of Eastland County.

For Representative 122nd district, R. A. Baldwin of Lubbock county, T. G. Marks, of Lynn County.

For District Judge, J. H. Moore, W. R. Spencer, both of Lubbock Co.

The district attorney has no opponent, neither has Cong. Marvin Jones, or Mr. Hall of Amarillo, who is running for his old place as associate justice of the Court of Civil Appeals at Amarillo.

For County Judge, R. L. Graves, D.

J. Broughton, County Clerk, J. R. Burnett, Homer Winston.

The candidate for assessor has no opponent.

For Sheriff, W. A. Wooley, R. E. Burnett, Wood E. Johnson, A. M. McBurnett, J. J. Whitley, B. W. Stinson.

For Treasurer, Mrs. Lula Smith, Mrs. John Raymer, H. F. Adams.

For Commissioner Precinct No. 1, A. E. Graham, D. S. Cunningham.

For Commissioner Precinct No. 2, W. F. Stewart, Jay Barrett.

Only one candidate for Commissioners Precinct No. 3., and no candidate for No. 4.

J. A. Gamble was the only candidate that filed application for Public Weigher, and T. A. Faucett was the only candidate for J.P. of the Brownfield Precinct.

Candidates have until next Monday to pay assessments, otherwise their names will be left off the ticket.

The following presiding officers for the election have been named:

Voting Precinct No. 1, A.M. Brownfield; No. 2; J. E. Shelton; No. 3, Will Moore; No. 4, O. L. Jones; No. 5, I. A. Lowe; No. 6, H. H. Timmons, No. 7, Boon Hunter; No. 8 Brit Clare.

These gentlemen are expected to get their own help, consisting of a judge and two clerks.

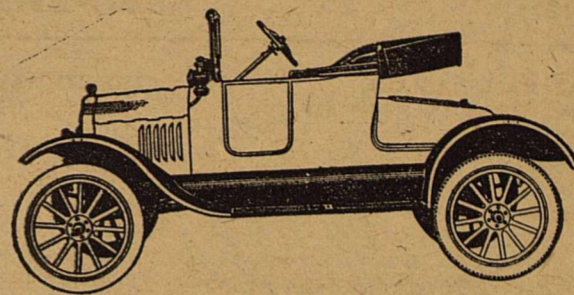

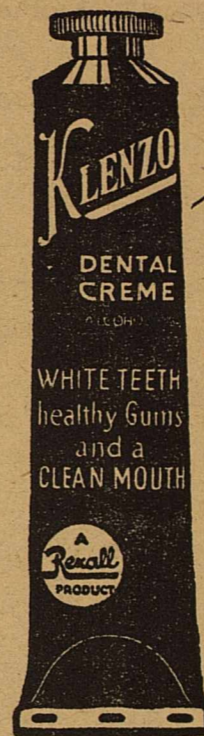
The big two-day affair promises to be something extraordinary, according to the plans of the different committees appointed, and events will have a place on the program that have never before been staged in this country.

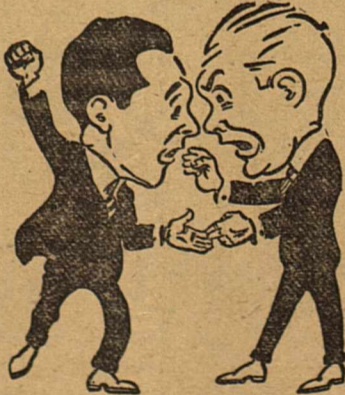

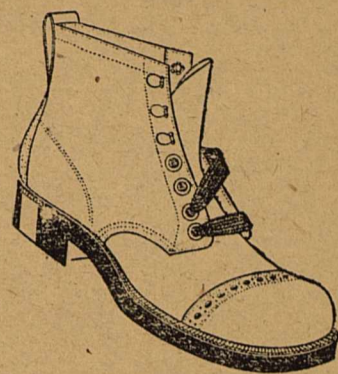

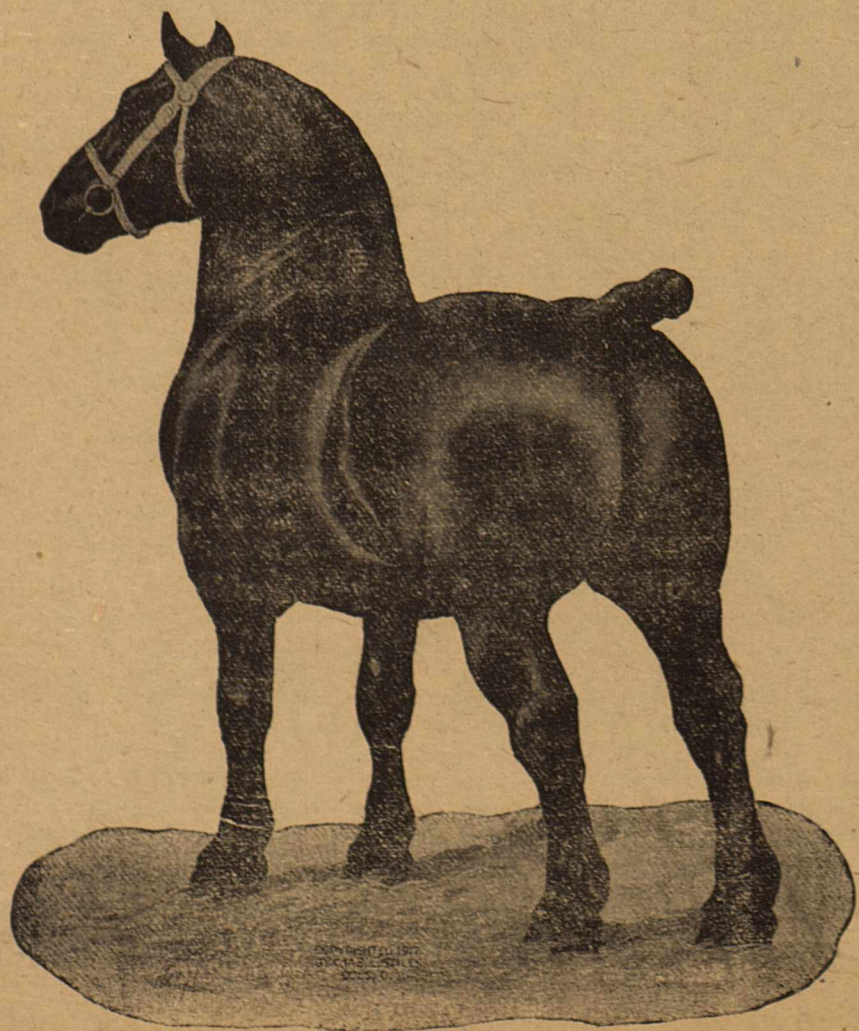

#### T. H. SEARS DEAD

Amarillo, Texas June 14, 1920

The remains of T. H. Sears were taken to Attawa, Kansas for burial this morning after funeral services in the St. Andrews Episcopal church here. Mr. Sears died Saturday night from pneumonia after an illness of ten days.

Mr. Sears was sixty-seven years of age and had been in the railroad service for fifty years, beginning as a brakeman in 1870. He came to the Santa Fe railroad in 1886 and remained with the road for that time except for four years during which he was division superintendent of the Colorado & Southern at Denver. Mr. Sears became general superintendent of the southern division of Western lines of the Santa Fe with headquarters at Amarillo, Texas, July 1, 1914. This district includes the lines from Wellington, Kansas to Belen, N. M., and the Pecos Valley and the Panhandle lines.

Mr. Sears is survived by his wife, three sons, and three daughters. He was married in August 1870, and he would have celebrated his fiftieth wedding anniversary this summer.

Mr. Sears was a capable and conscientious official. Frank and straightforward, he was liked and respected by his superiors, the employees and the public. His passing is therefore generally regretted by all who knew him.
