Authorizing One and One-Half Per Cent Ad Valorem Tax by Cities and Towns of Five Thousand or Less Population

Senate Joint Resolution No. 12.

Proposing and amendment to Section 4 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by increasing the total tax rate that may be levied by a le be levied by cities and towns having a population of five thousand or less than one-fourth of one per cent to not exceeding one and one-half per cent, and making appropriation there for.

Texas, providing for compensation of public officials." And the result of the election shall be published and declared acording to the majorty of the votes cast in such an election. Sec. 3. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars, or so much thereof as may be presented in the public officials.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas. Section 1. That Section 4, Article

XI of the Constitution be so amended as hereafter to read as follows: Section 4. Cities and towns having a population of five thousand or less may be chartered alone by general They may levy, assess and collect such taxes as may be authorized law, but no tax for any purpose shall be lawful for any one year which shall exceed one and one-half per cent of the taxable property of such city; and all taxes shall be collectable only in current money, and liscenses and occupation taxes levied, and all fines, forfeitures and penalties accruing to said cities and

towns shall be collectible in current

money.
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1920, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the their ballots the words, "For the amendment to Section 4, Article XI Constitution increasing the total tax rate that may be levied by towns and cities having a population of five thousand or less from onefourth of one per cent to not exceed-ing one and one-half per cent of any one year," and all voters opposed to said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, Against the amendment of Section Article XI of the Constitution increasing the total tax rate that may be levied by towns and cities hav-ing a population of five thousand or less from one-fourth of one per cent to not exceeding one and one-half per cent of any one year.'

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT Relating to the Manner of Compensation of Public Officials

House Joint Resolution No. 7.

A joint resoulation by the Legisla-ture of the State of Texas, proposing an amendment to the constitu-tion of the State by adding to Article 16 thereof a new Section, to be known

lo thereof a new Section, to be known as Section 60; providing for the compensation of public officials.

Be it resoulved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That there is hereby added to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, a new section to be known as Section 60 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, which shall read the State of Texas, which shall read as follows:

Section 60. Compensation of Public Officials: All State, district, county and precinct officers within this State shall receive as compensation for their services, a salary, the amount of which, the terms and the methods of payment and the fund out of which such payments shall be made, shall be ascertained, declared and fixed by the Legislature from time to time; provided that the Leg-islature may make such exceptions

as it may deem advisable.

This section shall supersede all other provisions of this constitution fixing and declaring the compensa-tion of officers by salary, fees or oth-erwise and all provisions for salaries or other compensation for public of-

the qualified electors of this State for adoption or rejection and shall make the publication required by the constitution and laws of the State. Said election shall be held under and in accordance with the General Election Laws of the State, and the ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon in plain letters. ten or printed thereon in plain letters

Senate Joint Resolution No. 17. Proposing an amendment to Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by exempting independent and common school districts from the limitation of a total tax of one dollar on the one hundred dollar valuation for any one year, and making an appropriation therefor. Be it resolved by the Legislature of

Section 1. That Section 3 of Artiof the Constitution be so amended as to hereafter to read as follows: (Creating a new Section 3.) Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and a poll tax of \$1.00 on every inhabitant of this state, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem state tax of uch an amount not to exceed thirt ive cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) iollar valuation, as with the available school fund arising from other sour ces, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this state for a period of not less

priated out of any funds in the Trea-sury of the State of Texas not other-wise appropriated to pay the expen-State and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general or special law without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation; and all such school districts, whether created by general or special law may embrace parts of two or more coun-And the legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties. And the legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school buildof the qualified property tax-paying voters of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the Finsitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to common or independ ent school districts created by gen-

eral or special law.

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1920, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the limitation upon the amount of school district tax of one dollar on the one hundred dol'ar valuation shall not apply to independent or common school districts created by general or special law," and all those opposed to said amendment shall write or have print-ed on their ballots "Against the amendment to Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the limita-tion upon the amount of school district tax of one dollar on the one hundred dollar valuation shall not apply to independent or common school districts created by general or special law."


