

# But Little 'Red Tape' Ahead Of Ginners In Meeting Requirements Bankhead Act



# **NEW HIGH RECORD SET BY** MITCHELL COUNTY VOTERS

#### Several Changes In Official Roster Written As Public Nominates Choice

. Marching to the polls Saturday in an unbroken parade from time the voting booths were opened until closed, Mitchell county citizens numbers ing 3.400 exercised their right of suffrage in determining nominees of the democratic party for precinct county, district and State offices. The total is said to have been one of the largest ever polled.

The vote of 3;400 votes registered Saturday exceeded by over one-third the 2,205 total cast in July primary election two years ago. "

The vote of 1,619 reported from the Colorado box is believed an alltime record. Ideal weather prevailed throughout the day, a fact that aided in bringing out the large number of voters.

In writing their verdict at the polls Saturday Mitchell county citizens called for some changes in official roster. A few of the party nominees were definitely identified Saturday while others were paired for four weeks of additional campaigning in the run-off contest.

The almost yard-long bailot, offering with few exceptions strong competition among the array of candidates for the varied presinct, county, district and State offices, slowed uppace of the voter in marking his preference and subsequent tabulation by the clerks and election teller.
