# PUBLIC VIEWS AIRED ON LOCAL AIRPORT

In an open meeting held Friday afternoon, City Councilmen attempted to discuss the general public their ideas in relation to the Muleshoe Airport. Mayor Wilber LeVeque told the approximately 40 persons attending that the special meeting was called so that new policies might be set by the Council formulated from constructive ideas of the public.

Councilman Irvin St Clair served as moderator. In his opening address, he stated that a contract was let by the City to Morgan Locker, present airport manager, in 1958 for a 10 year period. In further explanation, Cecil Cunningham, City Secretary, read the actual lease to clarify points before the general discussion got underway.

Councilman St Clair said the Council felt the current contract was the best for the city, inasmuch as Muleshoe has both a beautiful and adequate airport; one that is being operated without spending the tax dollar or voting bonds, either for building or maintenance.

It was pointed out that Locker has already constructed \$125,000 worth of buildings, including pilot's lounge, hangars and offices. Paving of the east - west runway was completed last year at a cost of approximately \$27,000. Maintenance of runway lights, hangars and general airport upkeep costs approximately \$2,000 annually.

Among the suggestions from interested citizens were ways and means to keep runways lighted on 24 hours basis and if there was sufficient traffic to justify. Another suggestion was lights on for 2 hours after dark.

At present, the runway lights are turned on on request as required and listed in Airman's

Guide. The construction of a taxiway alongside the runway was another topic discussed as a benefit to keeping planes off the actual runway until ready for takeoff. Safety rules and regulations which should be observed were discussed. Both local and FAA rules were discussed and methods by which they should be enforced and by whom.

Manager Morgan Locker, responsible for reporting all violations to Federal Aviation Agency, stated that steps had already been taken to control illegal maneuvers of planes in the air. He added that all pilots holding a license should know the rules and the importance of observing them at all times.

Suggestion was made that the Council set a fee for transit agriculture workers to use the runways, facilities, water for chemical mixture and gas; or was a fee feasible?

Herbert Griffiths commented that he thought a fee was definitely feasible since transit pilots were not taxpayers, yet took money out of the community through their operations here.

Former City Councilman and Mayor Houston Hart said "The past experience of the Council permitting transits to fly off the airport was that it cost about \$100, to clean the premises of cans, barrels and other debris left by the operators."

Other suggestions to the Council were the need for an airport attendant to park and service planes; a system or hook-up whereby the runway lights might be turned on during the night from City Hall; painting of the Wind T to orange color; designate different run - up spots and the permits to build private hang

ers, types, locations and fees. Among comments made concerning the airport, Jacques Baker said that he felt that the airport was of great benefit to the entire surrounding area and all decisions made should be based on its vital importance to the welfare of the taxpayer and future growth of the area.

Bill Jim St Clair stated that he had had a plane hangered at the airport for about two years and had had nice hangars and good service, but did feel the need for night runway lights. He also stated that the problem of illegal flights made was not a problem created by transit pilots, but by local pilots.

Herbert Griffiths suggested that an airport committee composed of about five disinterested persons be appointed by the council to examine complaints of violations before the pilot was reported to FAA.

Suggestion was made to the Council that they ask other cities how their airports were operated. It was brought out that this investigation had been made and found bond issues and tax money spent.

Speaking on behalf of the City Council, St Clair said all terms of the present contract would be met by all parties concerned and the Council would continue to control airport business. Additional local rules will be compiled by the Council and all pilots and operators will be required to observe them or remove their planes from the property.

Attending the meeting from the Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association were: Ernest Locker, Clarence Hamilton, Chester Setliff, L. E. (Bud) Warren, and Jessie Clayton; member Earl Hamilton; and D. B. Lancaster and Joe Harbin employed by the Coop. Joe Harbin gave a

report on the Irrigation Research Project to the group on Wednesday night.

Some of the topics that were discussed during the three - day event were development of improved public and member relations, preparing for legislative activities, and events that have affected the rural electric program in 1964.

Prominent figures who addressed the meeting included Clyde T. Ellis, general manager of National Rural Electric Cooperative Association, and Nonan M. Clapp, administrator of the Rural Electrification Administration, both of Washington, D. C. More than 453,000 rural electric consumers were represented at the meeting by members of 104 rural electric systems serving in the three Region X states.
