

RED CROSS RELIEF GIVEN TO VICTIMS IN 103 DISASTERS

Tornadoes, Fires, Hurricanes, Floods, Epidemics, Make Record of Year

A history of the disasters in the United States in any year is written annually by the American Red Cross, according to Chairman John Barton Payne, commenting on the report for the year ending June 30, 1934, which has just been issued in Washington.

"Because of the charter provision which places upon the Red Cross the responsibility for disaster relief, our chapter and staff workers are notified of all calamities of storm and fire and flood," he continued. "The emergency period may prove to be brief, in cases. where the victims have their own resources to draw on. While it, lasts, however, whether it brings the fmmediate need of food, clothing and shelter for the homeless, or entails a program of investigation and rehabilitation, the Red Cross is the official director of all

A great variation in type, and a wide geographical distribution, characterize the 103 disasters reported last year. Tornadoes, burricanes, hallstorms and other storms made up almost one half of the total. Especially numerous were the tropical storms which swept in from the sea to the Atlantic and Gulf Coast region. There were 21 storms of this type, establish-

ing a new record for frequency.

Next in number to storms were disasters of fire, the report shows. Red Cross aid was given following 25 fires in the United States and insular possessions. The most spectacular was the Chicago stockyards fire, where Red Cross workers arrived shortly after the fire started, administering relief until the emergency period passed, giving first aid to about 1,000 persons.

Floods caused serious damage in some sections, 17 calling for Red Cross relief. Three explosions were reported, and three epidemics of malaria and typhoid fever. A school bus wreck was one of the year's tragedles for which Red Cross funds were needed for relief and rehabilitation.

"Technique acquired by the Red Cross in these disasters and the hundreds of others we have handled is at the service of the public," Chairman Payne said. "To make this possible the disaster relief service has issued a manual containing instructions for chapters interested in advance preparations for emergencies. Disaster in-stitues were held last year in 28 strategic locations, to enable Red Cross and civic workers to formulate plans for possible disaster emergencies in their communities."

Trained to Save Lives

First aid certificates were issued by the Red Cross last year to 180,973 persons who finished the course of instruction put on by the chapters. Included in this list were more than 70,000 foremen, time clerks and other key employes on Federal Civil Works projects. Further evidence of the government's endorsement of the first aid program is found in projects now under way where Red Cross chapters, at the re-quest of the War Department, are giving first aid instruction in CCC camps. Where it has been requested by Army engineers the same instruction is also made available to key men working on federal water conservancy and flood control projects.

War Veterans' Problems Intrease

Last year American Red Cross chapters dealt with the problems of nearly 400,000 veterans and their families. The workers find that as the years go on their responsibility increases rather than decreases. Changes in legislation, the increasing age of veterans and the consequent increase in physical ills, hring new needs for sympathetic treatment by trained Red Cross workers. In addition to this service to veterans the Red Cross served as the official medium between the people and the men in military and naval service, giving ald through this service last year to 6,979 men in the army, navy and marine

Fires on Morro Castle and at Nome, Alaska, Received Help of Red Cross Workers

A number of tragle and unusual disasters have recently called for

Red Cross relief.
Included in them have been a food in Kentucky, following a series of cloudbursts in August; epi-demics of disease which threatened several sections, including some caused by drought conditions. Red Cross workers found much to do for the survivors of the Morro Castle fire and for those engaged in rescue work; and Red Cross relief went by airplane to Alaska when the famous old gold camp. Nome, burned in September.

TINY MISSION BEGINNING OF BAPTIST CHURCH IN 1881

PROGRESS EVER ATTENDED HISTORY OF CONGREGATION THRU THE PASSING YEARS

Parishoners Pride In Their Achievement; Building Is Among Best In West

The fifty-three years that have passed since the First Baptist Church nad its beginning as a mission station in a new, tent-dotted, saloon-filled. and cattle-shipping railroad town will be reviewed by members of the church at the Reminiscence partie of their fifty-third anniversary cele bration Sunday afternoon.

The following brief history, compiled from stories written about the church when the new building, was formally opened six years ago, will give an idea as to what the sum of all the remembering on that occasion

The mission station was established in 1881 by George W. Baines. Patrick Turner, an Englishman, did the first preaching. In the first, small frame building standing exactly on the site of the present church, all denominations of Colorado worshipped for several years. 6

A cyclone destroyed this building in 1885, and with it went all early records of the church. Fire several. years later destroyed further church records, leaving only the memory of the church's older members, fast passing on, to go by in determining the succession of events in those first

There has always been some confusion concerning the early pastors came Rev. E. Z. F. Golden, Rev. A. J. Tant. Rev. J. C. Burkett, Rev. Pinky Harris, Rev. B. H. Carnoll, Rev. G. M. Harrell, Rev. Holmes Nichols, Rev. B. Broom, Rev. J. N. Campbell, Rev. W. L. Williamson, Rev. W. C. Garrett, Rev. John Pierce, Rev. M. C. Bishop, Rev. D. W. Morgan, Rev. W. C. Ashford, Rev. Oren C. Reid, and Rev. P. D. O'Brien.

From the time the first frame building was destroyed by cyclone until the structure that eventually gave place to the present church was crected in 1895, Baptists worshipped in a small box house on the alley corner west of the church.

Rev. B. H. Carroll, Jr., was pastor when the church building was dedicated in April, 1897. Those on the building committee were Judge J. E. Hooper, H. B. Smbot, and F. M. Burns, all dead now. It was built by L. W. Delling., stepfather of Mrs. C. H. Farnest and one-time sheriff of Mitchell County. The Sunday School rooms were added in 1912 while Robert M. Webb was Sunday school superintendent and the Rev. B. Broom was pastor. The basement was added in 1914 during the superintendency of J. H. Greene.

This building was torn down in 1927 under the pastorate of the Rev. D. W. Morgan to make way for the present edifice, which was built while the Rev. W. C. Ashford was here and which had its formal opening on Sunday, November 25, 1928.

Twenty members were listed at that time as having joined before 1900. Death has lessened their number in the past six years. The names listed were those of F. M. Burns, Mrs. H. B. 
