'WHITE WAY' CONTROVERSY BE SETTLED AT BALLOT BOX

'SOLDIER BONUS' PAYMENT WOULD ASSURE \$200,000 CASH TO LOCAL VETERANS

Total 350 Mitchell County Citizens Would Share In Distribution

Mitchell county veterans would receive in the aggregate \$209,596.38 in liquidation of the so-called soldier bonus in event the measure being advocated in congress by Wright Patman of Texarkana and other congressmen who are making the issue one of the major objectives around the capitol at Washington ..

Figures showing that veterans of this county would receive that sum were recently compiled by Congressman Patman. Payments to all veterans in the country would total more than two billion dollars, the congressman states. \$3,696,221.25 would be distributed to holders of the adjusted compensation certificates in Texas.

Enactment of this bill into law. according to Mr. Patman's argument would result in the following:

"It will save the government more than a billion dollars, or \$112,000,000 a year for 12 years.

"It will save the government more than \$10,000,000 in administration expenses of the Adjusted Compensation Act between now and 1945.

"It will prevent the veterans from losing a valuable equity by releasing them from he payment of compound interest on their loans. Veterans, who have borrowed 50 per cent under the present law, will have very little coming to them in 1945.

"It will require no bond issue, no increase in taxes, no additional interest payment by the government. The debt must be paid some time. Everybody will be helped if it is paid






