Ben J. Baskin, Mitchell county farm agent, Wednesday issued the following statement to cotton grow- yard line in the second quarter led ers of the county:

Regular Government Receipt Forms C. A. P.-1 for all cotton sold prior to November 1, 1935, must be turned into the office of the county agent by 5 p. m. Saturday, November

Regular Government Receipt Forms C. A. P.-1 for all cotton sold after November 1, 1935, must be turned into the county agent's office within seven days after sale of such cotton.

These forms are necessary for the farmer to secure the difference between the average daily price of middling 7/8 cotton on the ten designated markets and 12c. All cotton buyers in Mitchell county have been furnished with the necessary forms.





Tobacco and not cotton should be the chief money crop in West Texas, thinks P. A. Buntin of Clarendon, who raises his own smoking tobacco.

"I see tobacco as a commercial One Of Tests Bottomed At cotton 10 to one," he said. "Unlike the crops in Kentucky and the old tobacco country, insects do not molest the crop here. It is far easier

Probably the only tobacco raiser in West Texas, Buntin cultivated 120 plants this year. They were about four feet high and produced leaves two by three feet.

After drying the plants he distributed choice tobacco to his friends and had more left than he knew what to do with. "I don't know that I ever will smoke it up," he commented.
