Highway 101 project, oked several weeks ago and now under construction, received the largest cut as Works Frogress Administration officials scaled down original cost estimates. Apitial amount of \$110,499 .-58, as passed by the administration, was reduced to \$86,461.75.

Lateral road project in commissioners' precinct 2, already under construction, was scaled down from \$16,-073 to \$4,469. Project approved several weeks ago calling for the expenditure of \$16,000 in improving 34 city blocks in Colorado was cancelled construct a gym building for the Westbrook school.

County sanitation project, launched only a few days ago under direction of C. R. Farris and to cost \$21,937, was reduced to \$7,313. Street surfacing project in Loraine, pending for weeks, was not listed in the projects affected. Hopes are being expressed by citizens there that an appropriation will yet be author-

The Colorado street lighting system, now under construction, was not affected in the general reduction edict. Neither were the sewing room projects in operation here and in

"We were not consulted in any of the scaling down orders and the first news that such was planned was received Monday by the county judge who went to Abilene for conference with WPA officials on projected works that we were anxious to have passed," the statement outlined.







For example, underlying a parent's care to protect the child, individually, against diph-Logan Spalding went to Abilene theria should be his demand that the entire community in which his family lives shall be protected against to her home by a severe cold the diptheria by immunization. An epidemic of diphtheria is a threat to all. The way to prevent this is by general immunization.

Maintaining an adequate public health service means spending more money, both tax funds and private funds, to safeguard health. The average annual expenditure today in the United States for this purpose. including money appropriated from taxes and money supplied by private contributions, is about one dollar per person. With an annual expenditure of \$2.50 to \$3.00 per person we could be reasonably assured of cdequate public health services. We spend \$4.52 per person each year on police protection, and \$3.32 each year on fire protection. Is not health protection deserving of at least an amount equal to either of these public services? Health can be purchased. In 1900, 170 out of every 1,000. babies in this country died during their first year. Within thirty-two years, because of advancing community health standards that rate has been so reduced that in 1932 only 58 out of 1,000 babies died during their first year. It is also true, that besides lessening the Infant Mortal ity rate the average length of life for all inhabitants of the United States has been greatly increased in the past two decades. There are two factors which contribute to these causes besides the increase in better knowledge by most every one in the care of the human body. First, medical and scientific advancement has accomplished great things in the very recent past and will continue at an even greater speed of advancement in the near future. Secondly, improved methods of home sanitation n recent years have aided medical


