CHIEF JUSTICE LESLIE MITCHELL COURT RECORDS **REFLECT TREND TO HIGHER APPRECIATION FOR SOCIETY**

Little Business Pending As **Date For Opening Term Of** District Tribunal Is Near: Session Begins Monday

The criminal docket in 32nd judicial district court reflects a higher regard for law and order in Mitchell county, District Clerk J. H. Ballard suggested Wednesday afternoon as he sat at his desk on third floor of the court house and discussed matters pending consideration at Spring term of the court, to be opened Mon day morning.

"There are few criminal causes pending and in so far as records in this office are concerned there are few notations charging alleged law violations for investigation by the grand jury," Mr. Ballard stated. "It is evident that attention to criminal cases in this court is gradually growing less, from one term to another, due to fewer violations of law."

While the court, to be presided over by Judge A. S. Mauzey of Sweetwater, may not be called upon to devote much attention to matters of criminal tenue, it is a different story as to civil causes. Docketed in this division of the court are a number of important cases, Ballard stated, some of which may require several days in which to be disposed of The term is to be opened for four weeks.

An even \$14,000 has been saved to the property taxpayers of Colorado through contract closed at the municipal building Monday night under the terms of which \$83,000 in outstanding sewer and water bonds are

to be refunded. The bonds were bought and refinanced by a Dallas brokerage firm. The bonds, issued in 1921, were


bearing interest at the rate of six per cent per annum. Under the rerefunding contract an interest rate of four and three-fourths per cent is to obtain. The last maturity date will fall in 1961.

Members of the city council are well pleased in the new contract and it was due to Colorado's splendid financial rating that the Dallas concern was induced to take over the bonds, Mayor J. A. Sadler stated Tuesday morning.


