Range Conditions Better Than Last

Rain Needed In This Part FIELD MEETS FOR Of State, But Cattle And Sheep Are Fat

Prospects for spring and summer March 1, the monthly range and live- and 28. stock report issued Saturday by the Department of Agriculture showed.

The condition of ranges is rated at 76 per cent of normal on March 1, 1936, compared with 77 per cent a month ago, 47 per cent a year ago and 76 per cent of the ten-year average on March 1.

However, continued dry, cold weather over most of the State, coupled with high winds and dust storms through the northwest portion of Texas, has caused a further deterioration in range conditions. Grain fields en's Study club in 1926. have been damaged by freezing temperatures, high winds and dust storms, and only in a few favored areas are

they furnishing grazing for livestock. In most cases, however, with the exception of the northwestern and western districts, subsoil moisture is adequate and only surface moisture warm weather are needed to

start spring grass and weeds. Due largely to supplemental feeding, cattle have about held their own during February. Some shrinkage occurred following the cold weather early in February, but an abundance of roughage and other feeds were available and feeding was general. Warmer weather has brought greatly improved conditions for cattle in nearly all sections. Heel flies are becoming bothersome in some counties and cattle in these counties are not making normal gains. Condition of cattle is reported at 80 per cent of normal, compared with 81 per cent a month ago, 61 per cent a year ago

These materials will be furnished on request to State Highway Departments so they may be tested in widespread use under all climatic conditions. If the results are as favorable as preliminary trials have indicated, these new fields of use would require large quantities of cotton in the future, Howell. said the announcement.

Under the program, cotton fabric for bituminous surfaced roads will be provided for a maximum of 1,000 miles of this type. 
