The conference revealed that plans have not progressed to the point where an individual farmer can tell exactly what his reward will be for following the government's suggestions as to the use of his land.

The program is designed to divert 30,000,000 acres from soil depleting crops to soil conserving, soil building, and soil improving crops, all having different technical meanings. In rough outline this is how the program will be accomplished.

1. Each farmer who applies for a payment will have his "base acreage" determined-the acreage he planted to soil depleting crops last year. Soil depleting crops are defined as corn, cotton, tobacco, Irish potatoes, rice, sugar cane, sugar beets, cultivated sunflowers, com-

2. For each acre of those crops which he diverts to soil conserving or building, he will get \$10 up to 15 per cent of the base acreage. Special base acreages will be established for cotton, tobacco, peanuts, flax seed, rice, sugar beets, and sugar cane.

3. Another payment of \$1 an acre will be made for soil building crops, contingent on certain soil practices not yet formulated.

The different rates of pay for soil conserving and soil building crops led immediately to a request for definitions. Tolley gave these:

"A soil conserving crop is one that holds the present fertility of the soil; a soil building crop is one that adds to the fertility of the soil."

"Wait," said Wallace. "I'm not sure that's right. Isn't a soil conserving crop a crop for which the farmer gets \$10, and a soil building crop one for which the farmer gets \$1?" Tolley did not reply to the question and Wallace added: "Well, that's the way it is."
