THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS IN Eight Hundred To HANDS OF RURAL PATRONS

As Third Monthly Event Is Held At Colorado Monday; Sale Location Changed

Literally thousands of dollars in "auction money" have passed to hands of rural citizens throughout the Colorado territory as time for staging another trades day and auction sale approaches. The event here next Monday is to attract a record crowd, according to prediction coming from members of the chamber of commerce trade extension committee, sponsor of the program.

The auction sale will be held from Walnut street between First and Second, opposite the chamber of commerce offices as a convenience to the public. The city council Monday night in called session voted the chamber of commerce permission to use the entire city block for staging the sale and instructed the street commissioner to have the block closed to traffic during the sale.

The chamber of commerce Tuesday issued appeal to Colorado merchants to continue active support of the trades day as an acceptable means of extending friendly relations between the interests of surrounding communities and those of the city.

Livestock and other trading, already a leading feature in the trades day programs, are to be held on lots south of the court house lawn, as usual, and farmers and ranchers bringing entries for the swap arena should take them there. Representa-

The auction sale is to open at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon and continue until Sam Wulfjen, official crier of the donated merchandise, has disposed of his collection. Starting at 3:45 a band concert is to be given by the junior school band at place where the sale is to be held.

Merchandise to be offered for sale is on display in windows of the Levy building, corner East Second and Elm, "Auction money" coupons, given patrons of cooperating merchants complimentary, will apply as cash in bidding in the items.

Hints To Gardeners By Gordon Morrison Breeding Expert



Good Start Important

THE value of a garden plant, A vegetable or flower, depends greatly upon the start it gets; so

give your seedlings ample care. Begin cultivation as soon as rows aré visible, if soil is not wet. Work close to the small plants, cultivating shallower as they grow, to

avoid injury to root growth. Cultivate often, at least once a week. Three days' delay almost

doubles the work. Watering should not be necessary the first week or ten days after seeds have sprouted. If ground is baked hard and sprouts do not appear, the surface may be disturbed slightly to help the

sprouts through. Seedlings may best be watered two ways: Mark a shallow trench about four inches from the row and run trench full of water, or, using a fine spray, apply water from directly above plants. Watering is most effective when it close-

ly follows cultivation. If garden is definitely backward, it may be aided by a light application of ammonium sulphate or a nitrate fertilizer. Ask your dealer for a recommended preparation for your type soil, and get definite instructions. Apply sparingly. Too much nourishment causes heavy

foliage at the expense of flowering. With fertilizer application and with weeding, however, the best time for action is before planting. not after. If it is too late this year, remember it next Spring.

Small plants should be thinned, as directed on packets, to allow proper development. Certain vegetables may be used as thinned. For instance, onions thinned may be used as green onions, and lettuce may be picked for immediate use, leaving smaller leaves to develop.

Fighting Vegetable Pests

THERE are two major classifications of insect pests-chewing and sucking. Chewing insects, such as beetles, leave telltale holes in leaves. Control by dusting or spraying plants with arsenicals (poisons with arsenate of lead as a base) or pyrethrum. These remedies are known as stomach poisons, for they must be eaten by the insects. Plants commonly attacked include cucumber, squash, other vine crops, mustard, tomato and pepper.

Presence of sucking insects, such as aphis or plant lice, is indicated by a general lack of vitality in the plant. Control by dusting or spraying, directly on the insects, nicotine sulphate or pyrethrum. These insects do not eat exterior plant texture and must be killed by a contact poison. Among plants attacked are peas, pepper, cabbage and related crops.

All seedlings may well be treated early with light application of an Special treatment should

given two pests cutworm and leaf beetle. The former (a chewing insect) is very fond of tender pepper, tomato and cabbage plants, and is controlled by spreading about a spoonful of "poison bran bait" near each plant. This should be done at nightfall. Leaf beetle (also a chewing insect) is found on tomato, pepper, turnips and other plants. It can be repelled by a

Bordeau mixture spray.

Remember this important "don't": Don't use arsenicals on the edible portion of vegetables within 14 days of the time they are to be used. Pyrethrum sprays, however, are equally effective and may be safely used at any time.



Flower Pests and Diseases

SURE-FIRE way to defeat cer-A tain flower diseases is, of course, to plant disease-resistant strains such as rust-resistant snapdragon and wilt-resistant aster. But the only way to combat insect pests is to spray or dust plants with insecticides.

An early season pest is leaf beetle, a chewing insect whose presence is indicated by discolored or dropping leaves. It is found most often on alyssum, zinnia, marigold, and annual phlox. Bordeau dust is an effective repellant. Principal victims of the cutworm,

a chewing insect which cuts plants off at the ground, are the snapdragon, aster, petunia and verbena. To combat it, place about a spoonful of poison bran bait around the base of each plant, Aphis, sucking insects, bother

almost all the popular flowers with the exception of the zinnia. They promote wilting and cause light spots to appear on the upper side of the leaves. A contact poison (pyre-thrum or nicotine sulphate base) should be sprayed on the insects. Downy mildew is a Fall disease. It shows up white all over the plant and discolors to black, killing leaves and causing stems to rot. Zinnia is its particular prey, although petunia, phlox and others also are affected. As a remedy, flowers of sulphur should be dusted on, very lightly, and the treatment

repeated.
With roses, don't wait for pests. but spray before they are visible. Take a big step toward elimination of all pests generally by burning garden waste and trash, especially any diseased stalks or leaves, at the close of the season.





The resistance of this plating to being "wiped lout" is so great that the film continues to lubricate under greater heat and stress conditions than were formerly possible, and cannot be entirely removed by any process short of actual grinding.

The scientific principles behind the formation of the film involve the molecular structure of lubricants and grew out of the discovery that cer. chain" molecules, with a greater power of attraction at one end than at the other. The forces which are present on all metal surfaces and are responsible for the phenomenon known as friction, dissipate themselves by attracting and holding the 'magnetic', or polar, ends of these molecules.

The orderly arrangement of the nolecules, with their polar ends practically buried in the surface of the metal, appears to have a disciplinary effect, described by chemists as "regimentation", on the molecules of the oil itself, resulting in a surface that approaches the principles of selflubrication and needs new oil only to keep it "alive" and to repair the effects of scratches, grit and other

The chemical used in field tests of the new oil is a lubricant itself. It is artificially made and was selected from among more than 1000 compounds tested in the laboratory and the field over a period of several years. Conclusions on the behavio of molecules, which are far too small to be seen, even with the best microscopes, were determined by x-ray ditfraction, which produces photographic patterns of the reflecting or splitting of x-ray beams as they pass through


