An \$8,000,000 construction schedle will be put into effect by Lower Colorado River authority at once on flood control dams in the Colorado above Austin, under contracts just completed by officials of the authority with Harold L. Ickes, public works administrator.

The program does not conflict with a temporary restraining order secured by utility companies in a suit against government financing of power program, under which trial of the utility suit has been reset for ext Dec. 1.

The \$8,000,000 program includes he return of \$5,000,000 to the au thority of its loan and grant fund which had been matched with \$5,-000,000 given the reclamation bureau directly, and which now will be used by the authority itself to complete Buchanan dam and to start work on Roy Inks dam.

It also includes arrangements for eclamation bureau to build the Marshall Ford dam in Travis Coun ty, on which \$2,000,000 can be spent under terms of the injunction, prior





Soil Program Is Given New Name Baskin Informed

Agricultural Conservation Program' Has Been Given As Title

'The Agricultural Conservation Program" has been given as the new name for what was formerly known as the soil conservation program, Ben Baskin, county farm agent, has been advised. In the future the State committee will be known as the State Agricultural Conservation Committee and the county committee as the Mitchell County Agricultural Conservation Committee.

The program has been called the 1936 soil conservation program since the passage of the Soil Conservation and Allotment Act. The change in name has been brought about by revision of material in the program. A bulletin from the state conser-

vation office gave an interpretation of the establishiing of a cotton soildepleting base for a farm. The conditions under which the base may e established are:

"If one whole acre or more cotton was planted on such farm in 1934 or 1935 or both, or

"If the entire base cotton acreage vas rented in both 1934 and 1935 the Secretary under a Cotton creage Reduction Contract, or

"If failure to plant thereon in 934 or 1935 was caused by flood, drouth, or excess rains, which, for he same period of time, prevented he commercial production of other egricultural commodities on the land affected, provided that cotton was lanted in either or both of the years of 1932 or 1933."

TEXANS SUPPORT FIGHT TO RETIRE DUST FILM

One of the most important actions taken by the Texas delegation at the Democratic National Convention is Philadelphia Tuesday was the unaninous approval of a resolution presented by Eugene Worley, Shamrock, asking that the motion picture showg the Panhandle as a dust bowl be withdrawn.

After Worley spoke briefly, Mrs. olney Taylor, Brownsville, declared he is in sympathy with the Worley resolution and knew the picture vere unfair.

"Those pictures try to make out that the entire Punhandle is as baren as a desert." Worley said, "which entirely incorrect. But the propaganda has so spread out that at times tourists write to the Panhandle to nquire whether they may get suffi cient water for cars in traversing that section."

"The socalled dust bowl is splashing in welcome rains with many akes dotting its broad plains," the esolution reads, "with generous and bountiful crops at hand, with thousands of sleek, fat cattle grazing on every ranch, with fine and hospitable itizens in high optimism and spirits."

The resolution directly demands that the Department of Agriculture withdraw the films and make new pictures truly representative of the area. The resolution will be offered to the convention's committee on platform and resolutions.


