Air Conditioning **Assures Pleasure** For The Traveler

Western Railroads Offering Comfort In Crossing The Hot Sections Of America

CHICAGO.-The long, hot reaches of the Western desert country no longer bring perspiration to the traveler's brew. The railroads have solved the problem of summer travel in the desert country-air-condition-

This year air-conditioning will be one of the primary factors in an increase in Western vacation travel. These statements were made here today by Harry G. Taylor, Chairman of the Western Association of Railway Executives.

In making his statement, Mr. Taylor pointed out that the Western Railroads have \$27,000,000 invested in air-conditioning equipment of all classes. He said: "We have a tremendous investment in air-conditioned cars, but we feel that our investment will justify itself in increased

Mr. Taylor's report showed an increase of nearly 50 per cent in the in service. For 1935 the railroads and the Pullman Company operated 2,500 cars, representing in investment of \$19,000,000 on the Western Railroads. At the present time there are 3,669 cars of all classes being operated as air-conditioned units in the western territory. The increase means, according to Mr. Taylor, that the "hot train" has virtually been eliminated from first class travel He said: "Travelers no longer need fear the excessive heat of a crosscountry train ride. The air-condi tioned cars make the trip with less than a two per cent variation in cool temperature. And more, hay fever and asthma sufferers can be assured a safe haven on the sealed, air-conditioned cars, for the pollens of the goldenrod, the rag weed and the rose are all taken out of the air that is filtered and purified before being released in the cars."







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THE ELECTION 1873

Uncle Bill Kellis, editor of the Sterling City Record and this column writer both fought, bled and died in the Civil War. At least we were old enough to remember the carpet bag days of E. J. Davis and "nigger" rule. Uncle Bill gives a sketch which we reproduce for young democrats to

I can remember every general election in Texas since Lincoln was elected president on the Republican ticket. Having sold their negroes to the people of the South at a good profit, the people of the Eastern and Northern states set out to soak the people of the South by setting free the negroes that they had sold

As long as they owned negroes in the East and North, slavery was a mighty good thing. Didn't the Bible speak of slave owners and give directions how to treat slaves? Did not the Bible countenance slavery Sure it did, and these people were believ ers in the Bible.

But after New England and the other states sold their slaves to the poor suckers of the South, slavery became a mighty bad thing. After they had gotten rid of their negroes they set out to make a lot of losers out of the people to whom they sol i their negroes, so they organized the

Republican party for that purpose. Lincoln was the first Republican candidate for president. He was elected because the Democrats like a pack of suckers split their vote and got the hot end of the election. Lincoln being by birth and nature a Southerner, told the boys that the South had bought and paid the North for these negroes and that it would not be fair to free the negroes. without paying for them. Lincoln got himself very much disliked for this idea of his. They wanted to take the negroes, make them free and set them over their former masters. "Time about was fair play" they

The memory of that four years of otten nigger and Republican rule was like a horrible nightmare. That the purpose of its organization was for the destruction of the South, and when the South lay bleeding at its feet, unlike the magnanimous Lincoln, it kicked us and heaped indignities upon us


