#### ALLOWABLE IS BOOSTED FOR HOWARD CO. FIELDS

Daily crude allowable for fields in the immediate Big Spring area during October was boosted 1,172 barrels in a new proration schedule authorized Tuesday by the state railroad commission. Daily allowable for both the Howard-Glasscock and Iatan-East Howard fields was increased.

The Howard-Glasscock quota was increased by 464 barrels to 17,941 daily; and the East field figure was set at 7,644, an increase of 708 barrels.

Increases were general for West

Texas fields, as the commission set a state daily allowable of 1,179,948 barrels, an increase of 54,274 barrels over the September basic allowable and 73,048 barrels more than the federal bureau of mines estimated demand for Texas oil in October. two excellent food routes, for ambi- The new figures are effective Oct. 1. The factor of 2.32 per cent of the hourly potential, on which production of the big East Texas field is figured, was left unchanged. On September 26 allowable production was 436,281 barrels daily, having increased slightly from the 434,000 barrels authorized on September 1.



When watering is begun, lay the hose on the ground and soak the soil between the rows. Sprinkling requires the use of more water and







#### THE NEW DEAL


