Buying Of Farms On Increase, Says Federal Authority

Pleasing Trend Expected To Continue Through 1937, Is Belief Expressed

The steady increase in the purchase of farms during the last 18 months may be expected to continue during the balance of this year and all of 1937, W. I. Myers, governor of the Farm Credit administration, stated at Washington. He based his prediction, he said, upon four facts: (1) that the land banks sold nearly 60 per cent more farms in the past nine months of 1936 than in the corresponding period of 1935; (2) that they have been doing an increasing amount of financing of farm purchases; (3) that long-term loans at very reasonable rates will be available; and (4) that there will be a continued general improvement in he position of agriculture.

Responsible for part of the increase in farm purchasing financing, the governor explained, is the fact that second mortgage loans by the land bank commissioner are now being made in addition to the federal | land bank first mortgage loan to assist in farm purchasing, thus making it possible for a person with character and farming experience to finance 28, wife of E. The purposes for which farmers are placing mortgages on their farms are changing rather rapidly, Myers stated. While approximately 90 per cent of the proceeds of the federal land bank and commissioner loans in 1933 and 1934 were used to refinance debts, in 1935 the percentage so used the continued rains will improve the first seven months of this year to about 79 per cent. This means that a larger proportion of the loans are being used to purchase farms. In the 12 months ending October 1 this year, the federal land banks and commissioner extended credit in the approximate amount of \$50,000,000 to finance the purchase of nearly 20,-000 farms, including acquired farms sold by the land banks on mortgage or contract terms.







"The people of America will face a most serious problem, once war reaks out in the restless countries of Europe, and let us insist that we as citizens of this country shall do all within our power to keep out of that war, if and when it comes. The speaker mentioned Germany, England, Italy and Japan during his address, to suggest that Americans were offering undue criticism, perhaps, of those peoples.

"There are 40,000,000 living in England today, in an area less than one-fourth the size of Texas. I wonder what we would do under similar conditions," he bantered after charging there were citizens in this country who believed themselves to be super-

"The people of Germany, of Italy and of Japan, are bottled up, so to speak," he said after reviewing the mportance of world commerce as the stabilizer of peace, "and when we place a man with his back to the wall he usually comes out fighting.' Mr. Mahon recalled that the 65,000, 000 citizens of Germany lived in territory smaller in size than the State of Texas.

He charged that selfishness often incubated personalities that grew into serious international problems. 

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POLITICS

A lot has been said about the wonderful Democratic landslide and we shall endeavor to explain and give some of the reasons.

The positive aids to Democratic victory were not the only aids the President received. He was helped a good deal by some negative influences, although of course these were small as compared with those that were positive.

Some of the negative aids were the desertion by some members of the party which had for years been the party of their choice, and which party had honored them many times. For example Al Smith of the "Sidewalks of New York." Heretofore he had tramped upon these sidewalks, this time the sidewalks tramped upon him. It is not believed that his joining the Republican ranks was the sole cause of Mr. Smith's present unhappy political position. That was bad enough in the eyes of many but when he not only deserted his party but his best friend, one who had aided him in all his political ambitions, that was just too much, and made Smith's opposition a help to the party and the

To the voters and his friends it seemed amazing that he could not only desert his party and his friend, but should find it necessary and satisfactory to himself to abuse his friend, the Democratic candidate, and denounce some of the measures inaugurated by him which constituted a part of the means by which the country was brought at least a long way toward normalcy. The President, subject of Mr. Smith's derisive remarks, which at times were almost contemptious in their implications, had not only been his friend for many years, but such a friend. Among other things he nominated him for the exalted office he himself has held for the last four years, both at Chicago in 1924 and Houston in 1928.

Mr. Hoover's manifest resentment and apparent effort for revenge, was another negative influence which worked favorably toward the President's reelection. He and Al Smith yoked up in the same cause, they were "strange bedfellows," but it is said politics make such.

Another negative help to the Democrats was the pastor of the flock of the Shrine of the Little Flower. Father Coughlin not only did not gain any votes for his own aggregation but his open denunciation of the President, but gained some for Roosevelt, and disgusted many of his friends and fellow members of the faith of which he might be a powerful exponent.

The negative forces also probably were augmented by young Teddy Roosevelt and his sister, Mrs. Nicholas Longworth. not because of who they were, but because of what they did and said.

And Jim Reed's influence did not help Roosevelt, it didn't do Landon any good.

Other negative helps were the Liberty League, the effort to velt. gain votes by enclosing fear-creating slips in pay envelopes of workers, the Literary Digest poll, Wm. Randolph Hearst's choosing and supporting Landon, and other sources of opposition which effect became helpful to the Democratic nominees.

Very few elections, of whatever importance, are gained by campaigns of abuse and denunciation. As Robert C. Winthorp said half a century ago, "There are no points of the compass on the chart of true patriotism."



Whereupon the gentleman protested in vigorous and emphatic language not usually used in church when the lady replied, "Sir Walter Raleigh laid his cloak down on the ground for Queen Elizabeth to walk over," and here you flew off the handle because I sat down on your \$1.50 hat.

For many years certain interested politicians have tried to confuse the people about the principle and application of religious liberty. When the church people would consider and assert their opinions concerning moral issues they were accused of trying to unite church and state.

Prior to 1776 the people were taxed, against their will for the support of religion, and sometimes for the support of particular sects to whose tenets they could not and did not subscribe. Punishments were prescribed for a failure to attend upon public worship, and sometimes for entertaining heretical opinions. What would Baptists say now if they had to pay taxes to support the Presbyterian church? And what would the Methodists say if they had to pay taxes to support the Church of Christ?

Finally it was provided that no taxes should be levied to support religion and no punishments for non-attendance on public worship. This was called the separation of church and state. For 150 years there has been no effort in this country to reunite the church and the state. Those who asserted, that when, religious people united to support moral legislation, they were trying to unite church and state, were just trying to confuse and deceive the people for their own material benefit,

He was the founder of the Great Baptist Church in America.

A ripple widening quietly outward from a Bradshaw banker's kind thought has brought a prized gift to a Colorado blind man whom that banker has never seen.

Antonio Lomeli, blind Mexican of Colorado, is to receive the Reader's Digest, Braille edition, for a year as a result of that Bradshaw banker's idea. And the same gift will go to around gift. Illustrations were used. a number of other blind persons in

The banker's name is Ocie Hunt, who is also an insurance broker; The history of his "help the blind" idea was given in a Sunday Abilene Reporter-News article by Max Bentley, staff correspondent.

Mr. Hunt, according to Mr. Bentley's article, is a subscriber to the Reader's Digest. Reading it, he learned about the magazine's Braille edition for the blind and learned that requests from the blind for free subscriptions have far outrun the available funds. Subscriptions cost \$10 each and therefore are out of the reach of most blind persons, who are unable to follow gainful employment. That gave Bradshaw his idea -send the Digest's Braille edition to some blind person somewhere.

"On September 27 Hunt wrote to the Texas school for the blind asking Willie Geigher of Westbrook, Mr. for the name of a blind person. preferable residing in West Texas, who would like to receive a subscription to the Reader's Digest in Braille. but who was unable to pay the \$10 subscription fee. On the same day he wrote the Digest, announcing his intention of enlarging the plan by taking up a collection among the Westbrook Sunday. bank's customers . . . Hunt's original impulse had been to personally make one \$10 subscription for one blind person . . Learning how great the demand was, he decdied to organize a series of "subscribers' clubs" and charge each member dues of 50 cents a year.
