Resident buyer for one e" the South's largest cotton factories stated Tuesday that his house had instructed him to buy no more short staple cotton.

Williamson pointed out that cotton of less than seven-eighths-inch staple was not tenderable on future contracts and that it was subject to severe discounts. Much of the cotton growers who produce short staple cot on are race in competition with cr p labor than are growers of

Var'ous specialists of the Extension have long worked on cotton Ser dization and improved methstand ods of producing quality cotton, and county agricultural agents have carried ca raigns for careful seedbed prepar. .on, clean cultivation, fertilization, one-variety cotton communities, and insect control to farmers.

It was their own idea, thought up without any prompting from their teacher, to make and sell valentines to raise their "bit."


They worked on the valentines during art periods preceding Valentine Day. Sale of the valentines brought in \$2.04, all of which was turned over to the Red Cross.

In the five-year period, 1932 to 1936, inclusive, trucks in Texas have participoted in 8,416 highway accidents in which 2,195 persons were killed and 11,962 injured. His landlord bears all expenses for repairs on improvements, tools and other equipment. The landowner's taxes build the schoolhouses, pay the tuition for the tenant's children, supply them with free textbooks and furnish bus conveyance to and from school.

With all of these advantages why are so few sharecroppers today in this part of the country failing to accumulate? Why does a majority of these renters either come out at the end of the year in debt, break even or with just enough funds to run another year The fact is they live too high. They will not pay the price of accumulation. They must have a car, which not only means the initial cost but also upkeep. The wagon and team furnished by his landlord will not suffice to take him to town on Saturdays to buy groceries, which often include delicacies that his mother and father did without when they were building their bank account. Kit and Beek are too slow for trips to the movies and other lures that claim his cash in near-by towns.

A careful check shows that today a large majority of the owners of farms in this fine agricultural region, acquired their property

Now comes Isaac Crawford of Paris, Texas, who writes:

I think V. L. Jones has correct ideas concerning tenant farmers. There is no reason why a share worker should not make a living, if

Any farmer can make more than a living if he farms on halves and has everything furnished, works and economizes. The second

I know a farmer in this county who a few years ago had two men, brothers, who came out in the fall in debt to the farmer. However, he kept them, thinking they would do better and pay out in the fall. He told them to make a garden, keep a pig and a cow. They said they had no money to buy a pig and a cow. The farmer being generous bought them a cow and a pig each, to be paid for in the tall. One of the men wanted a car like his brother's. His hog had grown to be a large hog, which he and his family needed, but he thought he needed a car worse than he needed meat for his family. He brought still in debt to the farmer.

It seems to me that a landowner would do better now to have his land worked on the shares and have it overseen

Next we have H. M. Wade of Rockwall, Texas, who writes: The conditions described by Mr. Jones are foreign to the conditions in this part and everywhere else that this writer had a chance to observe. The prevailing condition with farm tenants who have come under my observation is about as follows, and especially since The advantages and financial possibilities of farm tenantry of the farm relief program has been in vogue. The landlord farming on an average in this country of 500 acres allots to his tenant an tage of his situation and exercises industry and thrift, he can live average of fifteen acres on which he pays the landlord if he is a tenant one third of all he raises and requires him to plant exclusively cotton. Mr. Jones speaks of the tenant farmer as living too high and through his extravagance has brought upon him the dire conditions which oppress. There is not one tenant farmer in twenty-five that is able to own a radio. My idea is that as matter of economic virtue a tenant farmer is entitled to all the necessities of life and some of the luxuries the owner of the land which he tills. The landlord claims that he pays taxes, insurance and upkeep for his farms, but in the long run the tenant farmer pays these bills by increased rents heaped upon him. The tenant farmer has no option in the matter, for if he complains he is notified to move, and the chances are 50 to 1 that he finds no place to house himself and those dependent upon him. The neighborhood loses a good citizen. the farms a first-class farmer, the church an ardent supporter, the school a loyal patron, and the neighborhood to which he goes to hunt a job as day laborer gets an embryo criminal, because unfair treatment has planted Communism and Fascism in his soul and the only end of such a course is crime and degredation and ruine

They want the landowner to spend \$5,000 or \$6,000 for improvements when the land won't raise enough to pay the taxes and the same man could spend that much on other investments and not have to pay any taxes at all:

Tenants are as good as the landowners as a class and both are as good as anybody else and then some as a class.

I notice that a great deal is being said about long rental contracts have rented some land a long time and find that one year is too long in some instances to rent and in others twenty years is not too long. One trouble is that tenants, if they do buy land, when they hit it hard they give up too easily. They make one or two failures and quit or try to move.

Another reason is they buy automobiles and lay awake at nights studying some place to go. I don't blame them, for they should get a price sufficient to allow them to go places, but agriculture is loomed because they can't buy a car at a \$1-an-hour wage and pay for it at 10c-per-hour wage. The hourly wage in the different trade lines is a very great drawback to agriculture. You can put \$3,000 in improvements in town and get more rent out of it than putting it on land. If you improve a piece of land properly your rents won" pay a reasonable return on the improvements, let alone the investment in land.






