MORE ABOUT FARM TENANCY

We might not be so seriously concerned with farm tenancy if it were a passing or transient condition, if it were simply a stage by which the farmer reached a higher level. But tenancy as it exists in Texas and Oklahoma tends to be a permanent stratication in which the greater part of our farmers are permanently imbedded. Financial returns to the tenant farmer are ordinarily so low that he is prevented from accumulating the reserves which would enable him to shake loose from that condition

At a conference of southern agricultural research leaders held at New Orleans, a large amount of new material was made available, which included a study of 700 share croppers in Alabama. It showed that only one out of ten of them ever became owners. Only one out of four ever rose to the condition of a third-andfourth renter in which he owned his teams and equipment. Seventy-five per cent of them remained their whole life as share croppers.



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


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
