Last year motor vehicle registrations in Mitchell county up to that date totaled 2,125, 140 less than the aggregate for 1937. Car registrations, however, for last year were larger with a total of 1,900 listed. Truck registrations for a year ago reached only 225.

## No Recourse For Texas Lands Sold Under Federal Act

Stonercad Gives Facts For Information Of Mitchell County Borrowers

Texas farmers whose land has been actually sold under foreclosure prounder the Frazier-Lemke Act, upheld by the Supreme Court this week according to T. W. Stoneroad, Jr., Chairman of the Farm Debt Adjustment Committee of this county.

News dispatches from Wasnington carried by the larger dailies stated that the decision would help farmers whose land had been foreclosed. The Deot Adjustment Committeeman stated that this is true in states where there is a period of redemption provided by the state laws, but that no such redemption period is provided in Texas. He urged farmers who were threatened with foreclosure to take prompt action as they must avail themselves of the moratorium privilges provided in the Frazier-Lemke Amendment before actual foreclosure has taken place.

Farmers interested were invited to get in touch with the county supervisor of the Resettlement Administration, or directly with the Farm Debt Adjustment committee, which is comcosed of volunteer, unpaid workers. his committee will endeavor to bring cout an agreement between the ebtor and the creditor, under which he debt will be adjusted and posibly refinanced. If a voluntary agreement cannot be reached, the Debt Adjustment committee will assist the farmer in placing his care with the Conciliation Commissioner.

The Conciliation Commissioner holds a hearing with the farmer and his creditors in further effort to bring about an agreement which will provide a composition of debts and a further extension of time. If this ails, the farmer is allowed to amend his petition and ask that he be left in possession of all or any part of his property, and that appraisers be This rental must be paid into the Conciliation Commissioner for the account of mortgage holders, and disclaim. 

#### Special, Had Left Colorado Short Time Before; Broken Flange Caused Trouble

Fifteen tanker cars carrying Col-Tex gasoline, fuel oil and distillate in a 41-car special oil train created a spectacular fire three miles west of the train derailed and the cars piled up in a huge spectacle of wreckage along the right-of-way. A broken flange is said to have caused the

The train was made up at Colorado and had left out of the local yards for the east about two hours before. As the cars began to buckle and pile up a deafening explosion rocked the countryside and immediately flames leaped high into the air. Heat from the inferno was intense. Seven curs that left the track were not burned.

It was twenty-four hours before wrecking crews, sent out of Fort Worth and Big Spring and intermediate points, cleared the wreckage and passenger and freight traffic on the Texas & Pacific was restored. The wreck was near Highway One and Spring next month. motor traffic over this thoroughfare was detoured over a country road by way of Tuscola.

State highway patrol officers kept constant vigil at scene of the wreck to keep spectators away from the danger zone while the highly inflammable cargo was burning and later as some seventy-five laborers set themselves to the task of clearing the


