On February 29, 1936 another referendum vote on the question was held and again the county electorate turned thumbs down on the proposition. 1,676 votes were polled in that election with the drys boosting their lead to 140. Colorado voted 529 for the proposal and 312 against.

In precinct election held June 1. of the lightest votes to be polled at The Rev. Mr. Naylor is pastor of both Colorado and Buford. The vote was 300 for authorization of the sales to 192 against. Beer was dispensed here legally until January I of the following year when under ruling of the Attorney General's department the sales were outlawed.



Livestock Industry Gradually Adopting This Method, As Better Machines Built

The gentle art of driving cattle in to market has undergone an important and far-reaching change, according to a report recently made public by the U. S. Department of Agricul-

The old way was for the rancher to take his cattle out on the road and ride herd on them with the aid of dogs and horses, driving them along the highway to the market center.

For larger markets, the ranchers would drive their cattle into town and load them on railroad cars. Any way you look at it, a cloud of dust was the almost inevitable accompaniment of the market.

But today the truck has shown itself to be so economical and so effective that it now transports a large percentage of all livestock. The Department of Agriculture report shows that during last year, 56 per cent, or more than half of all cattle; and 67 per cent, or more than twothirds of all calves, received at the principal markets of the country arrived by truck.

Truck deliveries of hogs represented a greater proportion of total hog receipts than did those for all other kinds of livestock, with more than 70 per cent of all hogs coming to market arriving by truck. The Chicago stockyards was the only major market in the Corn Belt where more hogs came in by rail than by truck in the last two years.

A little more than 30 per cent of the sheep and lambs arriving at major markets last year came by truck. The proportion of truck arrivals was smaller in these categories because of TO THE CITIZENS OF THE CITY the longer hauls involved, the department's report stated. The vast majority of these shipments, however, originated in truck hauls from the ranch to the freight loading point.

Twenty years ago, arrivals of livestock at market by truck amounted to less than two per cent of the total received at the country's major markets. The gradual introduction of the light truck in special models peculiarly suitable for use by ranchers is credited with the rapid change in methods of cattle transportation that has occurred particularly during
