TWO HUNDRED MILLIONS IN TEXAS RELIEF FUNDS

SAN ANTONIO .- Texas received \$199,928,874.42 during the period April 8, 1935, to March 31, 1937 from funds provided in the emergency relief appropriation acts of 1935 and 1956 as of March 31, according to a report received by H. P. Drought, state director for the National Emergency Council.

Expenditures incurred in prosecutng the works program totaled \$169,-108,503.36, leaving an unexpended balance of \$30,820,371.06.

The report shows that \$63,544,-54.37 has been expended for personal services; \$13,655,715.09 for supplies and materials; \$3,170,597.89 for rent; \$1,776,501.92 for construcion, maintenance and repair con tracts; \$62,874,235.76 for grants \$5,578,663.58 for contractural ser vices; \$1,640,362.65 for equipmen purchased; \$768,208.44 for land \$15,880,309.30 for loans; and \$219. 754.36 for employes accident compensation.





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
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MOTHER'S DAY

Irvin S. Cobb's letter will take its place among Mr. Sandusky's reasured possessions, among which are his memories of the part he played in developing the oil business in West Texas.

Although ill health has kept Mr. Sandusky from active work during the past few years, there was a time when he was one of the busiest men in West Texas. Born and reared in Versailles, Kentuckey, he received his first degree from the University of Virginia, then his LDB, from the University of Louisville-both before he was 21. He had to wait two months after graduation before he was old enough to begin practicing law.

In September after his graduation from the University of Louisrille he moved to Oklahoma City, and from there, in 1902, he came to Decatur, Texas, to work in the office of the county attorney, who was Frank J. Ford at that time. In September, 1905, he came to Colorado and has lived here ever since.

Mr. Sandusky's ability as a lawyer had won him the widely-used title, "Silver-Tongued Orator of the West," a long time before West Texas' oil boom days, but it was his work in promoting oil developments in West Texas that made him really well-known.

He has been called the "father of the West Texas oil fields." His interest in oil development began in the war days when the government was sending him over this section to use his speaking talent in getting people to buy Liberty bonds. This part of West Texas was in the grip of a devastating drouth and there was little money for bonds. He did most of his selling in the oil boom section

Through the contacts he made there he built up the interest of oil men in possibilities farther west. It was a great day for him when Mitchell county first gave definite promise of oil in 1921 and then burst forth with a "boom" when the Morrison No. 2 came in early in 1922 This section of West Texas was never called the "oil man's graveyard" after that.

With oil a reality, Mr. Sandusky went after an oil refinery for Colorado. His untiring work helped the Colorado chamber of commerce put over its drive to secure the site for the Col-Tex refinery, now Colorado's largest single industry. He was instrumental in organizing the first refining company which, after several reorganizations, became the Col-Tex Refining company. He still draws a retainer's fee from the company.
