EMPLOYERS URGED GIVE NUMBERS TO WORKERS

Orville C. Carpenter, Chairman-Director of the Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission, today urged employers subject to the unemployment compensation act to review their employee records to make certain that all employees have obtained social security account numbers.

The numbers are available on application at any postoffice prior to June 30. Unless an employee has been assigned a social security account number, Carpenter said, it is impossible for his employer to report completely and it is likewise impossible for the Commission to make certain that the employee's earnings are credited to the right account.

The employee should report his account number to his employer, but the account card is the property of the employee to whom issued and should be held by him to establish his claim for benefits when they come due. Employers who have been given account cards by their employees are requested to return them at once.

State Cotton Crop Is Reported Late; Moisture Is Needed

Contrary to conditions prevalent in this section of the State, Texas cotton in other parts of the commonwealth made slow to fair progress and averages ten days to two weeks late, owing to drought, the Dallas News summary for the week ending Friday indicates.

The drought has started depredations by grasshoppers, scattered damage being reported in Northwest, North and Central Texas. In South and Southeast Texas emergency of flea hoppers, weevils and lice has increased, but damage is not yet serious. Although insects—excluding grasshoppers—are checked by a spring unfavorable to their development, they may be expected to increase if weather becomes showery.

Progress in New Mexico is average to good except in Otero county, where stands are poor. All of the crop is planted and 80 per cent is above the ground, with plants about four inches tall. Little has been chopped.

Sing Sing Official Pleads For Public Aid In Scoutcraft

Finance Youth's Attendance At National Gathering At Washington, He Asks

Lewis E. Lawes, Warden of Sing Sing prison for the past 18 years believes that the National Scout Jamboree to be held at Washington, D.C., June 30 to July 9, provides an unusual opportunity for Americans "to perform a constructive service for our future manhood."

"Today, in many communities of the country," Warden Lawes said, "boys are preparing to go to this great Jamboree. But, there will be countless others who through willing and deserving to attend, will not be able to do so because of economic reasons. Permit me, therefore, to make the following proposal, which I assure you is my own, and not suggested to me by the National Boy Scout organization."

Warden Lawes feels that in its 27 years the Boy Scouts of America has become a vital force in American life, having touched the lives of more than seven and a half million boys and men. He disclosed that an impartial survey of the Boy Scouts showed that while one of every 240 non-Scouts was a juvenile court delinquent, only one of every 978 active Scouts was a delinquent. While he believed it would be erroneous to conclude that Scouting itself accounted for this vast difference in ratio, there can be no doubt, he said, that "the favorable influence of the Scout Movement was to a large extent responsible."

"Children usually pattern their behavior upon that of someone with whom they come in contact, and respect. The ideals which are instilled in their minds represent an essential preparation for later life. The influence of trained social leaders is therefore of vast importance. I urge as many of our citizens who can qualify, to take up this task of educating our youth along lines of good citizenship."

"When the National Scout Jamboree convenes in Washington, Scouts from this country will take part in many activities. Those young men—of our country and of other nations—represent the leaders of tomorrow. We know that very often complications between countries arise because men lack an understanding of their fellow beings.

Local Dealers To Operate Stations Of Continental Co.

Selling Products Direct Will Be Continued, President Of Concern Announces

NEW YORK, N. Y.—Recent abandonment of direct operation of service stations by Continental Oil Company, in favor of selling its products through local independent dealers, has been a development of major importance to the consumer and the company, it was said here by Dan Moran, Continental's president.

"Under this plan the place of the former service station salesman has been taken by men engaged in a business they own and control, of the same standing as the local jeweler, hardware merchant or furniture dealer. He becomes a permanent resident of the community, takes his place among other merchants, and is more inclined to get out and hustle for the additional business that will give him a profit above that he earned as a company employee."

"Major operators who were somewhat skeptical about the outcome of this policy that wiped out the company-owned and operated stations are fast becoming convinced of its value in good will and public approval," concluded Mr. Moran. "Our experience indicates that the industry will find it has lost the administrative headaches of roadside retailing, and has gained the support of thousands of new 'mileage merchants' who will take care of the oil company's interests in taking care of their own."

## UPPER COLORADO PROJECT SURVEY ASSURED, FEDERAL ENGINEERS TELL VISITORS

### West Texans Contact Army Officials In Washington; Interest In Improvement Reflected There

A West Texas delegation received army engineer's assurance in Washington Friday that a comprehensive survey of the upper Colorado river will be made when the next army appropriations bill is passed.

In the group sent to Washington on the project were Mayor Dorsey of San Angelo, Mayor McConnell of San Saba, L. T. Youngblood of Bronte and Marvin Nichols of Fort Worth. They were accompanied to the war department by Senator Tom Connally of Texas and Congressman Charles L. South of Coleman.

Saturday the group conferred with Assistant W. C. Loudermilk of the soil conservation service to urge that branch of the government cooperate to the fullest extent in flood control program of the river, with special reference to the local project.

Tentative surveys looking to location of a dam site were made several months ago and engineers recommended that a site between Colorado and Robert Lee be accepted. Communities along the river below Colorado have maintained strong interest in the proposed improvement since the government first indicated favorable consideration to petition that the dam be built and water conserved for the dual purpose of conserving ranch and farm soils and placing thousands of acres of fertile lands along the river under irrigation.

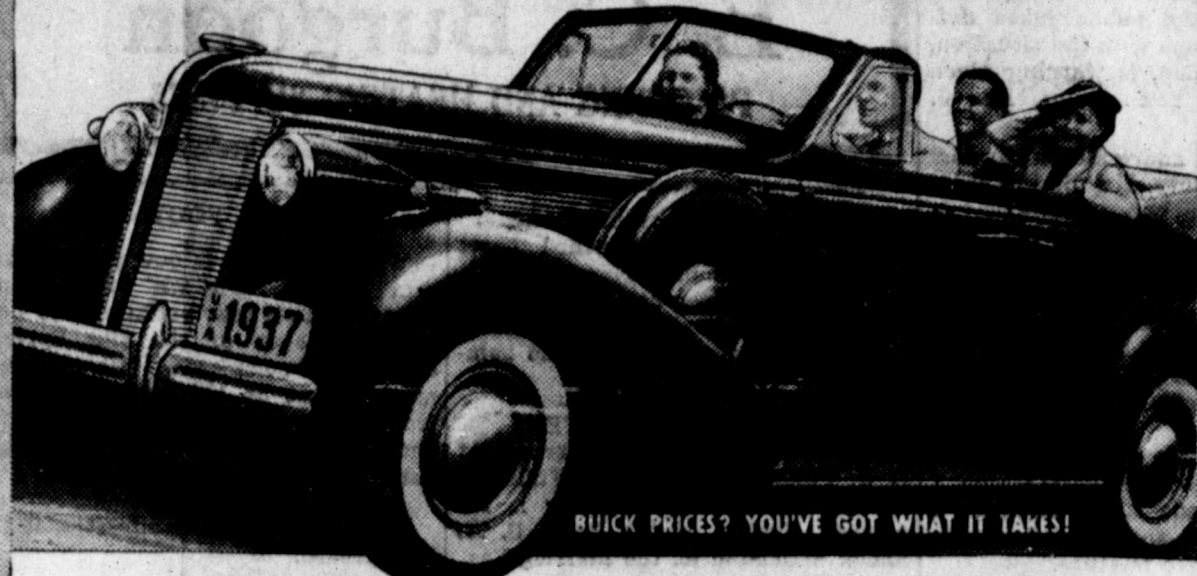

### School Session Is To Open June 7th For The Summer

**USE LIME SULFUR NOW**

Those farmers having orchards should make an inspection of their peaches to determine if Brown Rot and Scab are present. Such diseases may be controlled by spraying with lime-sulfur at this time.

Commercial lime-sulfur may be purchased and will save quite a bit of time. 7 pounds of the commercial lime-sulfur added to 50 gallons of water will spray 15 to 20 trees at a cost of about 5c to 10c per tree.

Lime-sulfur may be made at home by mixing 8 pounds of lime and 8 pounds of sulfur, then adding 10 gallons of boiling water. Stir for 10 minutes and then strain into a tank or barrel. Add enough water to bring this mixture to 50 gallons, and then spray. Spraying of peaches for Brown Rot and Scab should first be done when the peaches are about half grown, and the spraying repeated when the color begins to show in the fruit.
