MITCHELL SCURRY BAPTIST ASS'N STARTS DRIVE WITH 900 CONVERSIONS AS GOAL

Total of 36 Revivals Will Be Held In The Area, Rev. J. J. Strickland, District Missionary, Announces

Campaign to win 100,000 converts in Texas within a prescribed period. opening June first and closing August 31, as adopted during sessions of the Texas General Baptist Convention in Mineral Wells last October, started in the Mitchell-Scurry Baptist association this week, the Rev. J. J. Strickland, Missionary for district 8, announced here Monday afternoon.

Rev. Mr. Strickland stated that a total of 36 revivals would be held by churches within the two-county association during the period of four weeks beginning last Sunday. A total of 58 of these special evangelistic drives are scheduled within the association during the three-month cam-

Goal to which Baptists of the two counties are building is 900 converts and the placing of rural and larger churches on a firm spiritual basis, the missionary noted. Much of the preaching is to be done by ministerial students brought into the territory from Wayland college, Plainview, and Hardin-Simmons university, Abilene.

Paving of this thoroughfare, extending approximately nine miles, along with continued progress on grade and drainage construction in Scurry county, have brightened hopes of local enthusiasts that the highway is soon to be completed between Colorado and Snyder to open an important traffic artery to those communities. Prospects for realizing an extension of the road to the south from here are made more promising as paving on the local segment is started, it is

That the road is soon to be improved for handling traffic from the county line into Dunn is being considered with a considerable degree of assurance here. At present there is over a mile of the Mitchell county road not open due the dead end at county line. Engineers have found that asphalt paving deteriorates rapidly when not subjected to the "ironing out" process of traffic.






