



"In order to produce an adequate supply of eggs for home use, Florida needs to increase its production 341 per cent; Georgia 313; Louisiana 352; North Carolina 250 per cent. Other Southern States are in almost as bad condition. With reference to dairy products, the production requirement is met in only the state of Kentucky, with other states requiring percentages of increase from 30 per cent for Tennessee to 403 per cent for Georgia. Other low states are Louisiana, 224; South Carolina, 198; North Carolina, 139."

Educational Criefs Here Interested In School Levy Fight

Legal Procedure Looking To Slicing Per Capita Rate Watched With Interest

Controversy over the scholastic apportionment for next year, developed at Austin shortly after the State Board of Education fixed highest per capita apportionment in history of Texas, is being watched with considerable interest among educational leaders at Colorado. Proposed reduction in the allocation would affect every school district in the county, it is pointed out. An injunction against the board has been granted.

The temporary injunction was granted in San Antonio by District Judge W. W. McCrory and forbade the board, pending a hearing on whether the order should be made permanent, to change the apportionment, recently set at \$22, or \$3 more than the amount for this year.

In moving to ask the attorney general's department for advice on the law involved, John W. Laird of Lufkin, a member, said he believed the board had done "the right thing" in setting the \$22 rate, but otherwise there was no discussion of the sub-

Shortly after the education board had set the apportionment, the state automatic tax board, of which Governor James V. Allred is a member, reduced the ad valorem tax levy for school purposes from 20 cents on the \$100 valuation to seven cents. The governor voted for the reduction.

The comptroller's department had estimated that to sustain the \$22 rate it would be necessary to continue the 20-cent levy and that the sevencent rate probably would allow an apportionment of \$20 in addition to providing for textbook purchases.
