Patrolmen will assist examiners of the Driver's License Division, and at the same time will engage in their regular patrol duties, assisted in them by the Ex-

"In preparing the schedule," Buell said, "we have allowed ample time to move from examination point to examination point to allow patrolmen to carry on their regular traffic duties. For instance, if the average running time from one county seat to another is 30 minutes, we have allowed at least one hour and fifteen minutes for the trip. With this overallowance, Patrolmen will be able to police the highway, investigate acci-

dents and all that sort of thing." Some 24 examiners of the Driver's License Division will be engaged in aproximately 26 members of the Highway Patrol, it is estimated. This force will cover approximately one million miles of Texas highways annually on regular schedule. With these men on the road every day in the week, covering the main highways of every patrol district, patrol captains will be able to release men from sections covered on certain days, and to assign them to strategic points within their districts, it was pointed out.


