DEATH ENDS CAREER OF DR. ROOT, OUTSTANDING PHYSICIAN AND CITIZEN

All Business Halted Here As Final Rites Held Saturday Afternoon From Christian Church

Death brought an end Friday to the career of Dr. C. L. Root, 67, outstanding physician of Colorado for the past quarter of a century and once voted the town's most useful

Dr. Root died in an Abifene hospital at 5:50 Friday morning. He had been in the hospital 10 days, having entered on November 30 merely to rest and recuperate from a threatened flu attack. His condition was not known to be serious until a few days before his death, which was attributed to heart trouble with complications.

His death occurred on the tenth anniversary of the formal opening of Root hospital here. Building of the hospital, which he still owned and where he continued to work until just before going to the Abilene hospital. represented the realization of a life-Jong dream. The opening was held December 9 and 10, 1927.

The body was brought from Abilene by a Jones & Russell ambulance Friday morning. It lay in state at the family home Friday night and Saturday, members of the Lions club sitting with the body during Friday.

All business in Colorado was suspened as the town paid final tribute to Dr. Root Saturday afternoon at 2:30. Rites were held at First Christian church with Dr. C. C. Klingman of Hamilton, former pastor of the church, officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. A. L. Haley, present pastor of the church, and the Rey. P. D. O'Brien, paster of the First Baptist church at Stamford and former pas-

tor of the First Baptist church here. The church was banked with one of the largest floral offerings ever seen here. The church building was inadequate for those attending the service. Favorite songs of Dr. Root were sung by a choir composed of selected singers from all churches.

Four Colorado doctors, Dr. Wm. S. Whitmore, and Dr. J. M. Crymes. acted as ushers at the church. Masons attended the service in a body, Dr. Root having been both a Mason and




