

A. Sadler told The Record. Delivery of the baskets will be under supervision of Mrs. Bonnie Burt, in charge of the office.

In addition to distribution of the food, toys, bags of fruit, candy and nuts are to be included as the citizensh'p of Colorado plays the role of Santa Claus this Christmas eve, the mayor continued. RANGE FEATURES TO BE CONTINUED THRU 1938

Range features of the 1937 agriultural conservation program in Texas will be continued next year, according to an announcement from the Texas Agricultural Conservation Committee.

A few changes have been made, but the program in general will be similar to that operating this year. Deferred grazing practice, whereby part of the range is withheld from grazing for a six-month period to allow natural reseeding, was popular with ranchmen. Next year 60 per cent of the range-building allowance may be earned by this practice instead of 33 per cent in 1937. The allowance has been changed from a straight \$1.50 per animal unit to \$1 a unit, plus 2c an acre of range land.
