'SWEETHEART' CONTEST SALE OF BIRTHDAY TICKETS TO BEGIN EARLY NEXT WEEK

Because Mrs. Ed J. Hamner was among Colorado's pioneer citizens, the following account of her death appearing in the Sweetwater Reporter will be of interest here:



MORE ABOUT BAPTISM

This column does not care to go into a scriptural argument but here are statements made that should be corrected.

Minister J. C. Taylor of Georgetown jumps on The Snatcher in the Georgetown Sun. Here is his letter:

The Editor of "Snatches of here and there" gets back on the subject of baptism in The Sun of Dec. 24.

If I were he I certainly would let that subject alone so far as denying its place in the plan of salvation is concerned until I met the arguments based on plain Bible teaching which I set forth in "The Sun" last spring.

However, I am glad he has come out again, for it gives me an opportunity to show how far from reason and Bible teaching he goes in his statements. He said: "Persons can believe on the Lord and be saved without baptism." Jesus Christ said : "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." Mark 16:16. And Peter said: "Repent, ye, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of your sins." Acts 1:38. Christ and Peter make baptism a condition of pardon in the age in which we live.

Shall we believe Christ or the Snatcher ? He knows nothing about the covenants and the changes in plan since the old covenant was taken away and the new became operative, for if he did he would not make such statements as he made in the discussion last spring or those he made in the recent issue of the paper.

He says: "Belief and salvation open the door to the triumphant church." But that "Salvation and baptism open the door to some branch of the militant church.

How about a little proof for such a statement, Mr. Snatcher! Where do you read about a branch or branches of the church in the Bible? Do not go to John 15th Chapter and say that these branches referred to are churches or denomination. Jesus said they are men. You say, "Persons can not be baptized and saved without belief on the Lord." Certainly not. But will you tell us just what your position is concerning the relation of faith to salvation? What about the non-elect as per your doctrine? If your doctrine of election and unconditional salvation is true, I want you to tell us if a non-elect baby could die in infancy?

Too, what about your practice of doing what you call baptism to babies? Do they get salvation before baptism? I am talking about your position now. I do not believe little babies are lost. They are safe till they reach the age of accountability and go astray. But your church teaches they are born lost. When you baptize a baby is it saved ? If so it was saved and baptized without belief, for it is for a long time and after sitting upon it for an hour, whatever shape too young to believe

If you will just continue with me I will make you deny the doctrine of your church or say that people can be saved without faith. You do not believe that people have to believe to be saved.

Tell us, can a non-elect baby die in infancy?

JOHN C. TAYLOR

Here is the answer: Mr. Taylor does not quote all of Mark 16:16. He quotes only the part of the verse which he thinks supports his particular creed. The remainder of the verse reads: "But he that believeth not shall be damned." Thus, salvation is a matter of belief and condemnation is a matter of unbelief. Besides, all Bible scholars know that Mark 16:9-20 is not included in the oldest manuscripts. The New Testament was inspired by the Holy Spirit in the Greek language. We must accept it that way. In regard to Acts 2:38 (he) has it Acts 1:38 which is incorrect), the Greek preposition translated "for" is sometimes translated "because of." Without a doubt, people who have been saved ought to be baptized "because of the remission of sins." Baptism does not save them, but because they are saved, they ought to follow Christ in baptism. If anyone doubts the answer of a good conscience toward God), by the resurrection no memory for the beautiful things, the things of gladness. of Jesus Christ." Surely this Scripture ought to settle the matter once for all. Baptism is a figure. It does not and cannot save, but it does symbolize the great experience of salvation, that one has died to sin and has arisen to new life. He is cleansed by the blood of Christ. Baptism is a figure of these things. The only place in the New Testament where the specific question is asked "What must I do to be saved?" is in Acts 16:30. The question is answered immediately. Paul does not tell the jailer to join a church, to be baptized, and etc., but "believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved." In Ephesians 2:8 we read, "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God : not of works, lest any man should boast. The thief on the cross was saved (Luke 23:43). He had no choice to be baptized or join a church. In the tenth chapter of Acts we have political exploitation of the Negroes. "He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life : and he that believeth not the Son shall not see life; but the wrath of God abideth on him." John 3:36. My good friends, Jno. A. Thompson and H. L. Baker, who are always jumping on me, and all others who preach that we are saved in the Act of Baptism, quote with great acclamation a portion of Mark 16:16 as positive proof of their position. But they only quote one half of the verse, which reads: "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved," remainder of the verse, "he that believeth not shall be damned." Why leave out the last clause? It spoils his doctrine. Who is to be baptized ? The believer. What is the condition of the believer ? He hath everlasting life (John 3:36). He is justified (Rom. 5:1). His soul is saved (1 Pet. 1:9). He is born of God (1 John 5:1)! Christ said, "Thy faith HATH SAVED THEE, go in peace" (Luke 7:50). That is the person to be baptized, being saved at faith, "shall be saved" throughout life. Note this parallel sentence: "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." He that entereth the train, and is seated shall reach his destination. Suppose a man enters the train, but does not take a seat, will he not reach his destination? The taking a seat involves his comfort, but does not involve his getting there. It is Faith that gives salvation. Baptism is for him who obtains salvation through Faith.


