The Jailer

It is only natural that Paul did not tell the jailer to "Join a church", because Paul knew that there is only one church and you; cannot join it. Eph. 4:4-5; Acts 2:47. But let's read about baptism. thirteen for a smile. "And brought them out (Paul and Silas) and said. Sirs what must I do to be saved ?" And they said, Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved and thy house. And they spake unto him the word of the Lord, with all that were in his house, and he took them the same hour of the night and washed their stripes and was baptized, he and all of his straightway. Acts 16:30-30. Now who failed to read the rest of it ? ?? After this, he "rejoiced greatly with all that were in his house, HAVING BELIEVED IN GOD." Vs. 34. Notice that the rejoicing was after the baptism, not before.

The Thief

It is doubtful if the thief were saved since two divine writers say that both thieves railed on the Lord and reproached him in his death. Matt. 27:44 and Mk. 15:32. But saved or unsaved, he was baptized. He was a dweller of Jerusalem, or at least of that region, and John baptized, "All Jerusalem, all Judea, and all the region around the Jordon." Matt. 3:5. Did that mean every living being. No, for the Pharisees and lawyers "rejected themselves the counsel of God being not baptized of him." But the thief was not a Pharisee or a lawyer and more than that, Jesus made and baptized more disciples than John. John 4:1-2. Together they must have baptized all, including the sinful thief. But baptized or unbaptized, the thief lived during Jesus life on the earth, in which time he had "power on earth to forgive sins." Matt. 9:6. Since we are not thieves on crosses during Jesus day on earth, let us not try to be saved that way, but accept Christ's message for us.

Will Uncle Fred affirm that man must receive the baptism of the Holy Spirit in conversion? If he receives the baptism of the Holy Spirit he ought to speak with tongues as these did. Acts 10:46: He is not consistent to claim one without the other. But the baptism of the Holy Spirit was never given for remission of sins, directly. It was given to guide, to instruct, and Peter being guided by that Holy Spirit said, "Can any man forbid water that these should not be baptized-, then he commanded them to be baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus." Acts 10: 47-48. But baptism in Jesus name is for the remission of sins. Acts 2:38, hence the reason for the command. Can a man be saved disobeying a command of God?

Now to get back to his "faith only salvation" our friend comes back to his socalled "spurious" passage, but it reads just the same, sensitive it can be set off by a fly lighting on it. If Jesus used useless language like that one might believe the passage to be spurious.





Those Coloradoans who can renember when Dr. B. W. Dodson was astor of First Methodist church here ome 25 years ago had a special inerest in stories about his death on Saturday morning in an Abilene ospital

Dr. Dodson, who had been head of he McMurry Bible department since 1933, died after a long illness. He vas 71 years of age and had been a ninister for over half a century. He vas born in Missouri and was licensd to exhort in the Methodist church t Hot Springs, Ark., in 1885.

In January, 1886, he entered Vanlerbilt university, where in 1891 he eceived the bachelor of arts degree. He was licensed to preach in the North High Street church in Nashtille Tenn in 1887, and the year that he graduated from Vanderbilt he was admitted on trial in the Ten nessee Methodist conference.

After mine active years in the ministry in Tennessee, Dr. Dodson ransferred to the Northwest Texas Methodist conference-in 1900, beore it was divided from the Central Texas conference. He served as pasor in Amarillo, in Clarendon, Colorado, Cisco, Memphis, then from 1914 to 1918 as presiding elder of the old Hamlin district. In 1918, he transferred to the North Arkansas conference, but after two years at Harrison e was back in Northwest Texas preaching in Slaton, Snyder and Quanah pastorates. From 1927 to 1928, he was in Las Cruces, on transfer to the New Mexico conference but in 1929 he came back, filling pastorates in Brownfield, Baird, and Anson.

He started to school again, grad uating with the master of arts degree from Southern Methodist university in 1932. That fall he came to Mc-Murry, where in 1927 he had been honored with the doctor of divinity degree.

Dr. Dodson was married to Miss Julia Etta Davies, June 21, 1888. They would have observed their golden wedding anniversary next June, had he lived.

He leaves five children-Mrs. A. A Youngblood, Amherst; Ethel Dodson, Houston; Roy Dodson, Detroit; Warren Dodson, Snyder, and A. C. Dod son, Abilene





Cookies are: 1/2 cup butter 1/2 cup flour

1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup sugar 2 eggs 1 cup Quick Quaker Oats 2 squares of chocolate (melted) 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Cream butter, add sugar, and cream thoroughly. Add well beaten eggs and melted chocolate. Add flour and salt, then Quaker Oats and vanilla. Drop from a teaspoon onto a buttered baking sheet and bake in a very slow oven 30 minutes. Yields 24 cookies.


