DIVORCES ARE GRANTED ON CIVIL DOCKET


Spring term of the Mitchell county session of 32nd district court ended this week, leaving behind it a record of fourteen convictions out of fifteen criminal cases tried during the four weeks.

Prison sentences were passed in seven of the convictions, and suspended sentences in zeven others. The only acquittal was in the case of D. Selvidge of Hobbs, N. M., on a charge of driving while intoxicated. This case was tried Friday.

Two of the prison sentences were given to the Williams bothers, Nat and Edd, on Monday. Each was sentenced to two years in Huntsville on burglary and attempted burglary charges. The two were charged with entering the J. D. Woods filling station here on the night of March 3 and attempting to enter other business houses. They were indicted by the grand jury within less than 24 hours after the alleged offenses. Both have previously done time in IN HOWARD COUNTY Huntsville, according to Dick Hickman, chief of police.

YOUTH

Future Farmers, Boy Scouts, 4-H Clubs

None of the civic and industrial activities of life has been neglected in the matter of Youth organizations. Possibly the success attendant upon the work of the religious bodies suggested the idea of organizing civic and industrial bodies in order that unified and cooperative power of the Youth of the land might still further achieve in constructive effort.

One of the most notable Youth organizations that has ever existed, is the Boy Scouts of America. The Boy Scout movement was originated in England, founded by Sir Robert Baden-Powell, a General in the British Army, in 1908; and the Boy Scouts of America was incorporated Feb. 8, 1910. It was still further authorized by an act of Congress in 1916. The number of Scouts increased in 1937 more than from Turkey. Although a vegetable had replaced an animal material, 260,000; total membership is rapidly approaching 3,000,000.

Its purposes, teachings, activities and accomplishments fully warrant the use of the adjectives magnificent and splendid in reference to it as an organization. Many of the celebrated men and women of America take personal and active interest in this wonderful Youth organization. Among these is the President of the United States, who is honorary president of the national council. Their motto, "Be Prepared," not only means be prepared for success in whatever vocation in life the Scout may follow, but also to be prepared for good influence, for patriotic service, for good deeds and exemplary citizenship.

The promise made by every boy who joins the Boy Scouts of America is so significant of the ams and purposes of the organization, so fine in its suggestive implication for everyone, so impressive to those who make it and so meaningful to those who are interested in them that it is here given:

"On my honor I will do my best-to do my duty to God and my country, and to obey the Scout law; to help other people at all times; to keep myself physically strong, mentally awake, and morally straight
